Herman Talmadge Reports From Washington

THE SAME OLD "divide-and-conquer" routine has won Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson his way for another year.

Because the Secretary has succeeded again in playing off the various commodity groups, regions and farm and consumer interests against one another, the high hopes which were entertained on all sides at the beginning of the 86th Congress for the enactment of a new and meaningful national farm program this year have been dashed on the rocks of disagreement.

Unless the various members of Congress wake up to the manner in which Mr. Benson is manipulating their self interest, there will be little prospect for the passage of any comprehensive farm legislation as long as he is in office.

WHILE IT WAS generally conceded that the Secretary likely would prevail upon President Eisenhower to veto any farm bill Congress might pass, the consensus among farm state legislators in January was that Congress should act this year to force the President's hand on the issue and thus to place the responsibility for the nation's worsening agricultural situation where it belongs—squarely on the steps of the White House. The overwhelmingly favorable reaction, both in Congress and throughout the nation, to the introduction of the Talmadge Farm Plan led most observers to the conclusion that it offered the best hope of being a basis for agreement on realistic new legislation.

It was with that goal in mind that I joined with several interested Senate colleagues in endeavoring to perfect my bill to give it the broad base of farm-consumer support necessary to pass it through both houses of Congress. That was when the whipping started to the drumbeat of provocative speeches and statements by Mr. Benson and

Complete, whole farm planning for soil and water conservation is a major objective of the Bulloch County Unit of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District. It is a method whereby the whole farm is considered as a unit and where all practices are considered in the light of the best good for the whole farm. Piece-meal application of certain soil conservation practices may result in the wrong thing being done, when due consideration is not given to the entire farming operation. Complete soil and water conservation plans have recently been made for the farms of John M. Turner of Portals and Joseph B. Franklin of Statesboro.

Mr. Turner purchased his farm last year and immediately requested assistance from the Ogeechee River S.C.D. in planning a pond and water disposal system. After a complete inventory of the soil resources on the farm was made (a land capability map) the Soil Conservation Service began assisting Mr. Turner in planning and applying the necessary soil and water conservation measures on his farm. A farm pond was surveyed and designed, a terrace and watershed system planned, and permanent pastures of pensacola bahia and cordoba bermuda planned. Crop rotation including corn, soybeans, and grass-cropping systems are also planned to round out his program.

Mr. Joe Franklin's farm is located south of Statesboro on U. S. 301. He is rapidly converting his cropland to pastures of coastal bermuda, pensacola bahia, and fescue and white clover. He is establishing coastal bermuda by planting with corn. In this way he is getting a corn crop while the bermuda is getting established. His results are very good. Last fall Mr. Franklin planted fescue and ladino clover on some wet class two land with good results. He is very pleased with his fescue and clover since it furnishes him grazing at a time when there is practically no other grazing.

Mr. Franklin is also planning a wildlife program for quail or bicolour, series and bahia grass. By planting these crops which make seed for the quail to eat when food is scarce on the farm he can keep the birds on his place the year around. He has noticed his quail leave after hunting season starts, which is the result of a scarcity of food. Mr. Franklin is also planning a farm pond for maximum fish production by fertilization which will not only make bigger and better fish but also control troublesome pond weeds.

TAKING SOIL SAMPLES

Downy mildew is reported to be attacking vine crops in South Ga.

In southern sections of the state Downy Mildew has been reported attacking cucumbers, watermelons, cantaloupes and other vine crops. With the warm weather the state had reported the disease is expected to move north. When the disease first attacks plants, irregular brownish spots appear on leaves. The leaves may eventually curl and die.

For controlling the disease, a fixed copper spray or one of the new fungicides such as Zineb or Dithane Z-78 can be used.

HOG MANAGEMENT
Hogs have been accounting for about 16.3 percent of the cash income from livestock in Georgia each year. By using better feeding and management practices, this income could be substantially increased. Listed below are a few answers to questions frequently asked by hog producers.

Q. How much water does a hog require per day?
A. At least two gallons.

Q. Are antibiotics necessary in broad-sown rations?
A. Not unless they are needed to control a specific disease. Otherwise, they merely add to the cost of the ration.

Q. What is a good standard for litter weights at weaning time?
A. A minimum number of 8 pigs per litter that weigh at 30 days of age 275 pounds head of cattle. Once rapid expansion is under way, it is hard to stop. Miss Woodcock called her parents from New York to assure them of her safe arrival. The party sailed at noon on the "Maadon" Dutch-American liner.

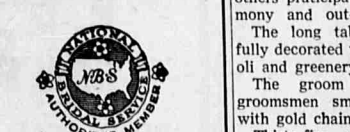
