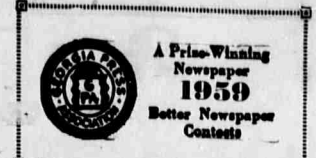

## Bulloch to get sweet potato curing plant

Announcement is made this week that Bulloch County is to have a new and larger sweet potato curing plant which will be constructed at an estimated cost of \$100,000.

The building will be constructed by the Georgia Department of Agriculture and has the approval of Governor Vandiver and Commissioner of Agriculture Phil Campbell. The site of the new plant had not been determined as of Tuesday of this week.

The new processing and storing facility will be an asset to the farmers of this section who plan to grow high grade sweet potatoes. It will provide modern facilities for processing and storing and sale at the best market condition.

It is expected that construction will begin soon. Mr. Campbell has stated that the Montgomery County plant is the model for the Bulloch plant. It is estimated that the building will be approximately 100 feet by 130 feet.

This is a project of the Bulloch County Growers Association. Roy Kelly is president, Milton Wise, vice president; Clarence Brack, treasurer; and Herbert Smith, secretary. The directors are E. J. Parrish, M. L. Taylor, Arnold H. Woods Sr., L. Smith, and W. C. Hodges.

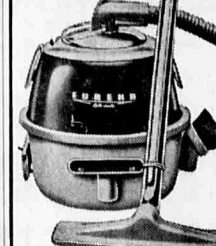

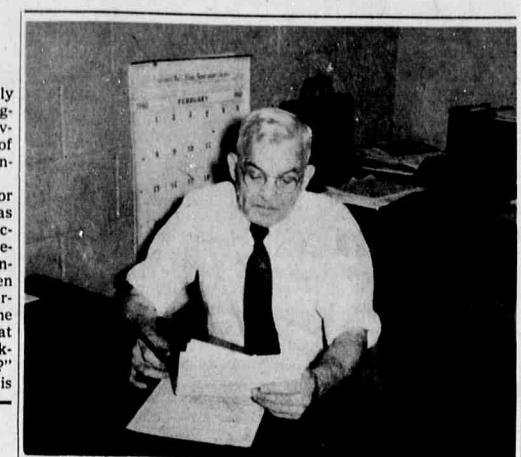

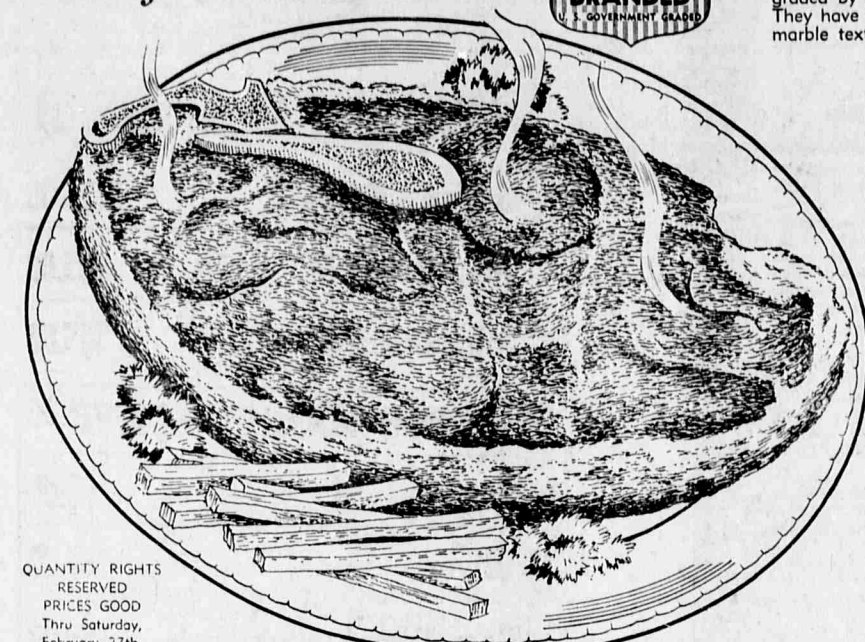

## Preston amends bill to provide Armory funds

WASHINGTON—Congressman Prince H. Preston announced that the House Armed Services Committee had amended, at his request, the Military Construction Bill to provide for a \$240,000 new National Guard Armory at Statesboro, Georgia.

The Committee wrote into the authorization bill its approval of \$120,000 to cover one-half of the cost of the building, which will be borne by the Federal Government. The state of Georgia would put up 25 percent of the cost, or \$60,000, and the City of Statesboro and Bulloch County would put up 12 and one-half per cent, or \$30,000 each.

Mr. Preston had assured local interests that if he could get the Armed Services Committee to include funds for the armory in the authorization bill, he felt confident the House Appropriations Committee on which he serves would provide the appropriations.

The Statesboro Congressman said he already had had a conference with the Adjutant General of Georgia, Maj. Gen. George J. Hearn, who promised him that as soon as the Federal funds are provided the state's share in the project would be available.

The Congressman explained that it was necessary to have the Statesboro project included in the bill as an amendment because the Army had not been assigned a high enough priority on the state's list of armories submitted to the Department of Defense.

There was a possibility that the Military Construction Bill would be acted on this week by the full House of Representatives, its passage was fairly certain.
