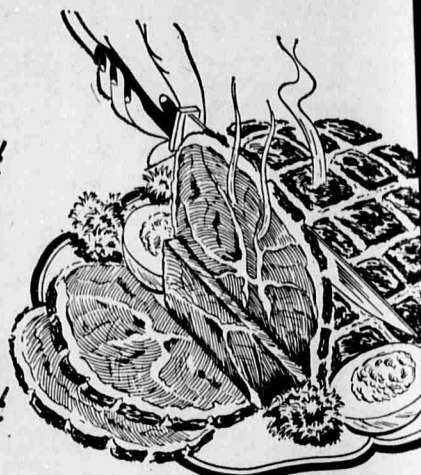

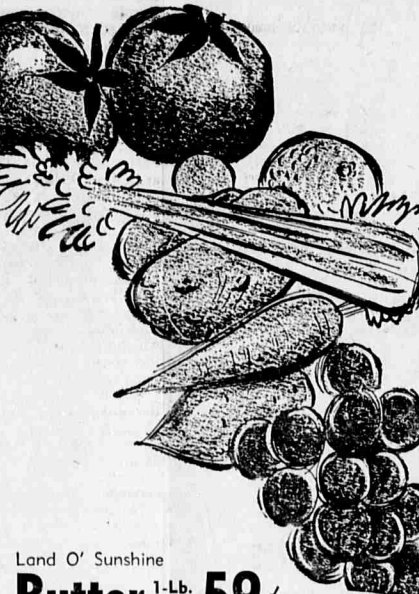

On Friday of last week Congress Prince Preston spent some time on the warehouse floors observing the sales and agreed that the buyers were not biding on high government-grade South Carolina tobacco the first two days of the 1960 market.

According to U. S. Department of Agriculture primings were down \$1 to \$3 a hundred on the first two days of the market from the first two days of the 1959 market, with the largest losses in low quality tobacco. Nondescript was off \$3 to \$7 a hundred, while leaf and cutters were unchanged to \$1 higher. The average top price for the state was \$66. There was more low quality tobacco and nondescript offered on the sales floor this year than last year. More lugs and less leaf was sold the first two days.

The blue tag law was sponsored by the Georgia Farm Bureau federation and growers who contended the identifying of out of state tobacco would prevent an influx of inferior tobacco from outside the belt.

Warehousemen opposed the bill saying it would discourage the marketing of tobacco from the Carolinas and hurt warehousemen and business.

Toombs Senator James F. Darby of Vidalia apparently was the only legislator who favored documents upon return of a bid in good condition within 30 days after date of opening of bids.
