Progress Abounds On GSC Campus

Construction recently completed, now underway, and planned for the future, should enable GSC to accommodate a student body of 1800, according to President Zach S. Henderson. Enrollment is now 1262.

Dr. Henderson stated that the new girl's dormitory, which is now under construction, will house 160 girls. He said that the \$500,000 building is expected to be completed by the 1960-61 winter quarter.

Another half-million dollar project to be completed by the winter quarter is the industrial arts building. The president said that this building will be composed of fully equipped shops offering courses in electronics, woodworking, mechanical drawings, sheet metal working and others.

A third building now under construction is the Home Management House located behind the student center. This building will provide girls with practical experience in managing a home. He said that a capacity of eight girls will live in the house for a quarter, doing their own cooking, sewing and washing. He

added that this \$85,000 building is expected to be in use during the winter quarter.

Dr. Henderson went on to describe other improvements made during the summer which included the addition of a fully equipped language laboratory on the ground floor of the Administration Building and complete remodeling of the second floor.

Dr. Henderson went on to say that Cone and Lewis Hall were repainted during the summer and the West wing of the second floor of Deal dormitory was remodeled.

Commenting on proposed construction and expansion in the future, Dr. Henderson said that proposals have been brought forward to build two more dormitories, one girls' and one boys', plus additions to Lewis Hall, the library and the Hanner Building.

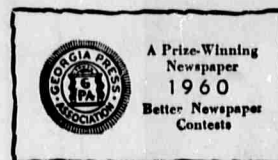

Charlie Nessmith is named 'Man of Year' for Soil work

In special ceremonies held at the Community House in Metter on Thursday night, October 20, Mr. Charlie Nessmith was named Bulloch County's "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" for 1960.

Agriculture Phil Campbell was the guest speaker at the ceremony. This was the tenth annual awarding of the honor. It is sponsored by the bankers and soil supervisors of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District. Bulloch County's "Man of the Year in Soil Conservation" for 1960 is a real dirt farmer. He has farmed all his life and would be completely lost in any other line of work.

He started farming in 1938 the year after he married. He farmed for two years standing rent before buying his own place. In 1940 he purchased the old Dan Atkins place in the Port Community which consisted of about 100 acres. The land itself was good, but there were no improvements. There were no houses, barns, or fences of much value.

With the financial assistance of the old Farm Security Administration, now known as the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Nessmith was able not only to buy the farm, but build a new home for his family. He began immediately to build barns and fences. He now has a large barn for livestock and feed storage, a modern implement shed, and completely new-fencing over the entire place. He also has a fine 4" deep well for home and livestock use.

In 1946 Bulloch's "Man of the Year" bought an adjoining farm of 98 acres known as the Pleasant Atkins place, and it was at this point that he began his Soil and Water Conservation program. He first had a completed Soil and Water Conservation plan made for his entire farm of 198 acres. The plan called for terraces with sodded waterways, a farm pond, pastures of coastal bermuda grass, and conservation crop rotations, in addition to proper woodland management.

Mr. Nessmith immediately began applying the plan to the land. Most of his 130 acres of cropland was good Tifton soil which was washing badly. He completely terraced all this land with conventional terraces. He planted 12 acres of coastal bermuda pasture and constructed a farm pond for livestock and fish. He planted two acres of Arlington Strain Sericea Lespedeza furnished by the Soil Conservation Service for trial and observation.

Then came parallel terraces which reduce the cost of all farming operations, and a motor man again requested assistance from the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District to do this work. The Soil Conservation Service staked the terraces and waterways out and the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District, operating a motor grader, leveled out the old terraces with 5 shaped and sodded waterways have been built in the past three years through this teamwork. These five waterways have been seeded to pensacola bahia grass. In addition to all this work, he completely rebuilt and deepened his old farm pond this year. And, in tune with the times, he tried his first match planted soybeans this year - about 20 acres and built new parallel terraces. A total of 6.3 miles of parallel terraces with 5 shaped and sodded waterways and enlarged the original home.

City political pot begins to simmer

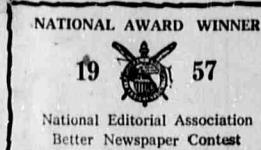

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Loan Program Applications Are Available Here

Georgia Southern College is one of many institutions of higher learning participating in the National Defense Student Loan Program.

The program is one of the provisions of the National Defense Education Act enacted in 1958 to enable scholastically able students in need of financial aid to go to college.

Requirements Listed

The eligibility requirements and provisions of the program are as follows:

1. Student loans available under provisions of this act are for persons regularly enrolled or admitted as full-time students. Beginning freshmen or transfer student will receive consideration when they have been properly admitted by the Registrar for full-time study.

2. The deadline for an application for any given quarter is thirty (30) days prior to the date of registration for that quarter. Applications may be filed on a yearly basis. Summer school is considered separate from the regular academic year.
3. Preference is given to students who are planning to teach in the elementary or secondary public schools or who will study in the fields of science, mathematics, foreign languages, or engineering. However, consideration is given to all other categories of able, needy students.

4. Loans are intended for students evidencing scholastic aptitude who cannot come to college without financial aid and who cannot stay enrolled in college without some financial assistance.

5. The college, acting through a President's Committee, must analyze carefully the financial need of the applicant and determine if the student has a financial need. This is a statement of the financial resources of the student and parent or guardian is required.
6. Proper evidence is required under Georgia law for applicants under 21 years of age.
7. Interest on this loan begins one year after the student graduates or leaves school.

8. Repayment of the loan begins one year following termination of full-time study.
9. For students who enter public elementary or secondary school teaching, half of all they have borrowed is forgiven or put in another way is converted retroactively into a scholarship. This conversion takes place at the rate of 10% of the total loan and interest per year of teaching, for a maximum period of five years.

Constitutional Amendments

CONSTITUTIONAL
AMENDMENT No. 12
Resolution Act No. 144
Senate Resolution No. 89

A Resolution proposing to the qualified voters of Georgia an amendment to Article VII, Section II of the 1945 Constitution of Georgia, authorizing the levy of a maximum of \$1.00 on the sale of every marriage license in Georgia for the purpose of paying pensions and other benefits and costs under an Ordinary Retirement System in Georgia.

Section 2. When the above proposed amendments to the Constitution shall have been agreed to by two-thirds of the members elected to each of the two branches of the General Assembly, and the same has been entered on their journals with the "Ayes" and "Nays" taken thereon, such proposed amendment shall be published and submitted as provided in Article XIII, Section I, Paragraph of the Constitution of this State.

The ballot submitting the above proposed amendment shall be in the form of a printed card to be known as Paragraph VI, which shall read as follows:

"VI. The State, through the General Assembly, may levy a maximum of \$1.00 on the sale of every marriage license in Georgia for the purpose of paying pensions and other benefits and costs under an Ordinary Retirement System in Georgia."

All persons desiring to vote in favor of adopting the proposed amendment shall vote for ratification of the amendment, and all persons desiring to vote against the adoption of the proposed amendment shall vote against ratification.

If such amendment shall be ratified as provided in said Paragraph of the Constitution, it shall become a part of the Constitution of this State. The returns of the election shall be made in like manner as returns for elections for members of the General Assembly, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of State to ascertain the result and

certify to result to the Governor, who shall issue his proclamation thereon.

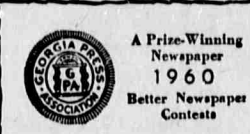

Statesboro postal receipts up from
\$69,000 to \$1200,000 in 6 years

A new all-time high in the nation's mail volume was reached during fiscal year 1960 ending June 30, which continued the steady upward trend of the past seven years at a rate which even exceeds the population growth, according to advance information from the Annual Report of the Post Office Department which has been made available to Postmaster Dennis R. DeLoach.

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 83.6 billion pieces of mail which includes about one billion pieces of parcel post. It was stated that this would mean an increase of nearly 25 per cent over the corresponding figures for 1959 when the total volume was 59.9 billion pieces.

During this same period, it was pointed out, the revenue of the Department also has shown an impressive gain with an increase from \$2,091,714,000 in fiscal year 1953 to \$3,276,800,000 for fiscal year 1960.

Here in Statesboro, receipts of the post office climbed from \$9,000.00 in 1953 to \$120,000.00 last year.

"There is not much we can do about how much mail we have to handle from day to day or how many people are making use of the postal Service," Postmaster DeLoach stated, "but the whole Department keeps busy in devising ways and means for doing the job not only more efficiently but more economically."

As I recall it, that was the way President Eisenhower outlined the principal objectives of the Department when Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield was sworn in back in 1953, and that's the way we have been operating ever since.

"We can't deny that we will make mistakes and that the human element still plays a vital part in daily operations, but the statistics in the Department's annual report offer positive proof that we are making progress on a nationwide basis. As an example, while the mail volume showed an increase of 16 billion pieces handled annually, the employment increase during this same period amounted to only 11 per cent."

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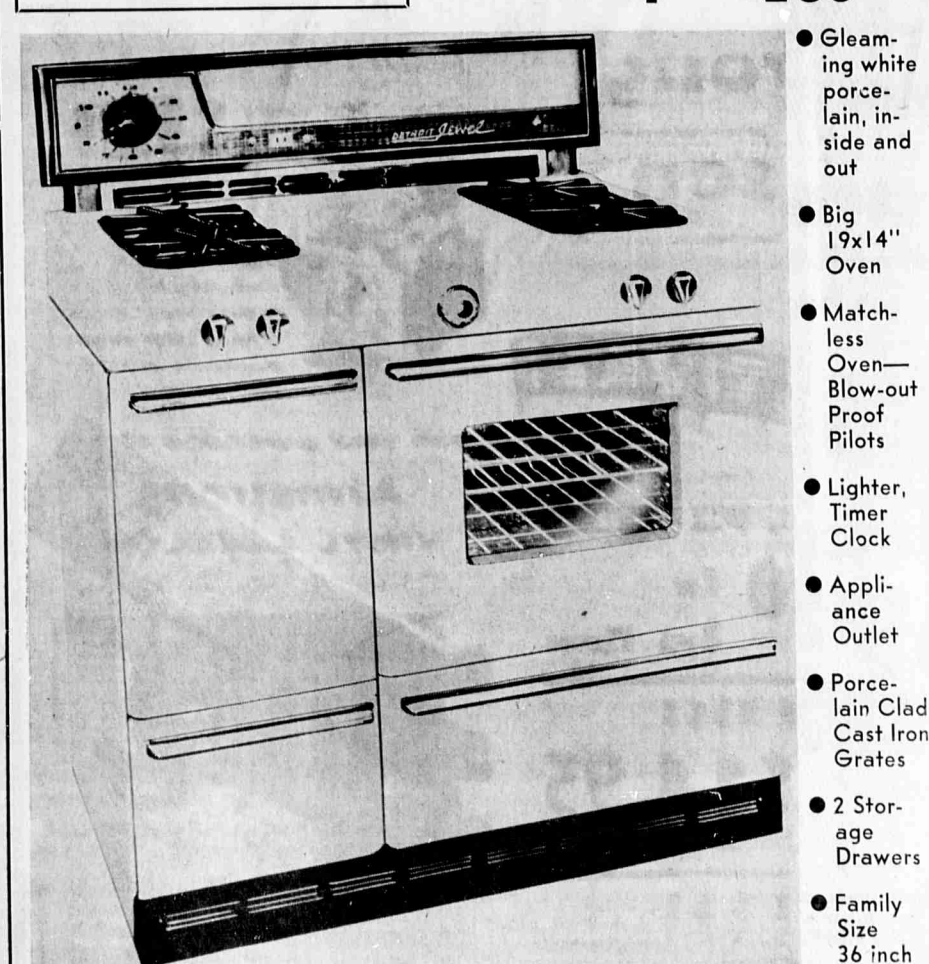

GSC named one of teacher testing centers

The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given at 160 testing centers throughout the United States on Saturday, February 11, 1961. Georgia Southern College has been designated as one of these centers.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in Professional Information, General Culture, English Expressions, and Non-Verbal Reasoning; and one or two of 13 options designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught. The college which a candidate is attending, or the school system in which he is seeking employment, will advise him whether he should take the National Teacher Examinations and which of the optional examinations to select.

A bulletin of information and application may be obtained from Dr. Ralph K. Tyson, director of testing, Georgia Southern College, Statesboro, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, New Jersey.

Candidates desiring to take the NTE for grants-in-aid or certification purposes in Georgia should not apply for the February 11, 1961 nationwide administration, but should write to the Georgia State Department of Education for information.

The Common Examinations of the National Teacher Examinations or the Scholastic Aptitude Test of Graduate Record Examination are required of all candidates for the master of education degree at Georgia Southern College.

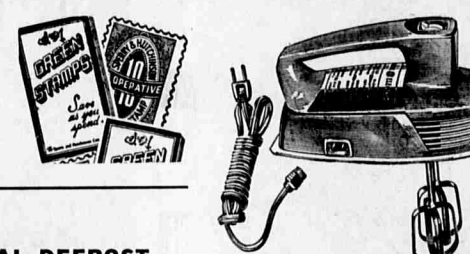

PCA has new high in serving farmers

Production Credit Associations reached a new high peak in credit service to agriculture on July 1, 1960, with over \$183 million in loan volume outstanding in the 82 production credit associations in the Third Farm Credit (Fla., Ga., N. C., and S. C.) District, an increase of more than \$26 million over a year ago, Josh T. Nesmith, General Manager of the Statesboro Production Credit Association, who has just returned from the meeting of PCA Executive Committee held at Atlanta, Ga., reported that the 26 PCAs in Georgia will serve about 12,000 Georgia farmers with credit amounting to about \$55 this year.

He also said, "Reorganization of farm business for more efficient production is resulting in a continued increase in capital purpose credit extended by PCAs, and this type credit now accounts for approximately one-third of the total credit extended by PCAs."

Dr. Roy E. Proctor, Department of Agricultural Economics, University of Georgia, was guest speaker at the meeting and spoke on "Financing Farmers in the Sixties."

Current topics important to the Credit Bank-PCA System were discussed by B. A. Darr, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Columbia. He indicated that the 82 PCAs in the District are in sound financial condition and the future of Georgia agriculture will likely be characterized by the need for more capital credit and more operating credit, perhaps 5 to 40 per cent more in the next ten years.

Mr. W. H. Smith, president of the Statesboro PCA and Francis Trapnell, assistant secretary-treasurer, attended the Atlanta meeting also.

The Statesboro Production Credit Association serves farmers in Bulloch and in Evans counties. Plans are now being made for the 27th annual stockholders meeting to be held, Saturday morning, November 20th, 1960, in the Bulloch County Court House, and will be a joint meeting with the Federal Land Bank Association.

Dr. Craig stated the present staff at Milledgeville consists of 50 physicians, 80 registered nurses, 80 affiliates, 5 social workers, and 1400 attendants to care for some 12,000 patients. Georgia ranks 48th and 49th in the National Social and Psychology categories.

It is felt that the passing of Amendments 13 and 14 are the most important things voters can do at this time to help Georgia's mentally ill.

10,000 registered to vote in the Nov. 8 General Election

More than 10,000 Bulloch County citizens are registered and eligible to vote in the November 8 General Election. However, based on the 1952 and the 1956 election returns only more than one-third of them will go to the polls next Tuesday to cast their ballot.

In the 1952 General Election 4,721 Bulloch Countians went to the polls with 3,619 voting Democratic and 909 voting Republican, and 193 not voting for either party. In 1956, 4,318 went to the polls with 3,414 voting Democratic and 901 voting Republican.

The polls in the county will open at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning and close at 7 o'clock Tuesday evening. Mr. R. P. Mikoll, Ord-nary of Bulloch County, will supervise the election as provided by the law which states that the county ordinary will serve as election manager.

The polls in Statesboro will be located in the courtroom of the county courthouse. The ballot is like unto a bed sheet, it is that large. In addition to the state of candidates for state offices named in the state Democratic Primary in September, 1960, and the candidates for county offices named in the Bulloch County Demo-cratic Primary in November, 1960, it will carry the names of the Democratic electors, the names of the Republican electors, a blank space for write-in electors, and the names of the independent candidates. Then there are the nineteen constitu-tional amendments.

It has been pointed out that citizens may "split" his or her vote. That is, one may mark the ballot at the extreme left side of the ballot and vote for the Democratic candidates for the state and county offices, already named in the state and county primaries. And then, in the second column in the space provided, or vote for whom you please by writing in the names of your own state of electors or

proposed amendment NUMBER ONE
The ballot will state that this is an Amendment:
" . . . to provide for the ap-propriation of motor fuel taxes for highway construction and maintenance purposes in order to provide an adequate system of highways, rural and post roads and bridges in this State." (The BEA is FOR this amend-ment, feeling that it is neces-sary that the Legislature regu-late its control over expenditures in State Government.)

proposed amendment NUMBER THREE
The ballot will state that this is an Amendment:
" . . . to provide for additional members from the State-at-Large to the State Board of Education and a new method of filling vacancies." (The BEA is AGAINST this amendment. The present size of the board is quite satisfactory. Expanding the Board in size would make it more cumbersome and less ef-fective and would allow ad-hoc members to be political appointees which would tend to reduce the Board to partisan political unit, and inhibit it in its stated function of formulat-ing the policies for the State education program. It would also make possible the stacking of the State Board of Education by the present Administration which could be controlled into another administration.)

proposed amendment NUMBER FIVE
The ballot will state that this is an Amendment:
" . . . to change the provision relating to the millage limitation for the tax levy for education." (The BEA is FOR this amend-ment. This would allow the County Board of Education to raise the millage for school pur-poses from 15 to 20 mills if it became necessary. We in Bul-loch County most likely would not be effected by this since we are in the mist of a Tax re-evaluation program and our mil-lage will most likely be reduced, but it would be good for the system where they might need additional millage.)
