1959 farm census reports 1,981 farms in county

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Bulloch County last fall, counted 1,981 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 328,124 acres. The average size of farm was 166.6 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$13,801.

Of the county's farm operators, 909 owned their farms, 331 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 736 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 49.8 years. There were 289 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 1,981 farms in county, 1,394 were commercial farms. Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954. Copies of the county report may be obtained for 10 cents each from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

There should always be a written contract when making a timber sale from land, says Extension Forester Dorsey Dyer of the University of Georgia College of Agriculture. Mr. Dyer says the contract should include a description of the sale area, trees designated for cutting, amount and time of payment, guarantee of title to forest products, dates of cutting operation, damage clauses and provision for an arbitration board in case of dispute.

Georgia farmers will lose much of their estimated \$15 million investment in seed this fall and winter by buying poor seed, warns Extension Seed Marketing Specialist Harvey Lowery.

Col. W.F. Rockwell blasts at proponents of welfare state

WILKES BARRE, PA.—In a strong blast at proponents of the welfare state, a Pittsburgh industrialist recently called for "a re-dedication to the personal freedoms on which America was built instead of accepting the nightmare which is the only alternate."

Col. Willard F. Rockwell, chairman of the board, Rockwell Manufacturing Company, addressed the 45th Annual Dinner of the Manufacturers' Association of Luzerne County — a branch of the Pennsylvania Manufacturers' Association.

"How strange," he said, "that the citizens who have enjoyed the greatest personal freedom ever available to a large and growing nation should want to exchange their freedoms — their birthright — for a mess of pottage labeled 'social security' by paltry politicians."

"So far — in less than 30 years — our government debt has arisen to 750 billion dollars, including its contingent liabilities. Our 'social security' is commencing to resemble a multi-billion dollar insurance policy."

Col. Rockwell also attacked the politicians who wish to despoil our constitutional competitive free enterprise system which, he said, has allowed the living standard of the United States to reach the greatest peak ever known anywhere in the world.

"In the past 10 years workers' wages — after taxes — increased 75%, while corporate earnings after taxes decreased 13%. Discouraging investors is the surest way to increase unemployment, especially with an exploding population that requires more and more jobs! Industry in no other free country is so burdened with taxes and bureaucratic limitations on private management."

Col. Rockwell also called for a review of our foreign aid and tariff programs, pointing out that "our foreign friends tell us that our weakening dollar and our deficits in balance of payments endanger all world trade, and that the free world cannot repel communist aggression if we fall by the wayside."

"Without generous dollar aid from the United States, Europe's present prosperity would have been impossible; having achieved it, she is now, wittingly or not, turning against her benefactor. America must expect intensified competition everywhere from these two new economic blocs."

He gains recovery by simply stopping drinking alcohol in all forms permanently.

One of the aims of ALCOHOLISM INFORMATION WEEK which President Eisenhower has proclaimed for the week of November 28 to December 3, is to acquaint the people of the United States with the true nature of alcoholism; that it is an illness and must be approached from that concept if the alcoholic is to be helped toward sobriety.

Everybody needs to know that threatening, blaming and chastising him will do no good. Neither will pampering, petting, humoring and protecting him help. An attempt must be made to understand him, to know that he behaves like he does because he is sick, not because he is mean.

The American Medical Association and all other responsible medical agencies have declared officially that alcoholism is an illness in itself and not necessarily a part of some other ailment. The Georgia legislature has made alcoholism an illness legally.

Nearly all the major churches have taken the same position and many are reviving their programs along these lines. They do not shun the alcoholic as a faithless hypocrite but regard him as sick in mind, body and soul. With this in mind the churches are training ministers to cooperate with the physicians, psychiatrists, sociologists and Alcoholics Anonymous in achieving rehabilitation for the alcoholic.

Now is the time for cooperators of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District in Bulloch to begin their terracing program. A lot of our cooperators have ACP payments set up for this year, but if they wait until December it will be too late because we cannot run but so many terraces in a given time. I must report this to you about three years ago John Cannon, a District Cooperator in the Middleground community, requested assistance for re-terracing his farm. A few weeks ago I visited with John and we went over his terraces and waterways together. I was pleasantly surprised at how well pleased he was with the whole system, especially the bahia sodded waterways. He told me that not a single terrace had broken, and that the sodded waterways made ideal entrances through the fields with fertilizers, seed, equipment, and harvesting. He also emphasized that the waterways as well as the field borders made ideal turn-around areas when cultivating. I was pleased to note that the bahia sod was keeping down weeds along the fences and that John was breaking his land with the terraces and dead-heading at the ends and at the waterways. I must say that this is real progress. Mr. Willard Beasley in the

2 conditions cause wood to decay or rot

WALKING IN THE WOODS
A lot of things that many of us have always thought about wood aren't quite true. The Forest Products Laboratory of the U. S. Forest Service has done a lot of studying about wood and the nature and characteristics of wood. Many people think that all wood in the course of time just "naturally" decays. Time or age itself has nothing to do with the decay of wood. The White House, when remodeled in 1949 was found to contain timber that had been in place since 1816. A wood structure in Massachusetts known as the "Fairbanks House" is standing structurally in tact after more than 300 years. A part of a Roman emperor's houseboat that sank long ago in Lake Nemi was found some years ago in a dry tunnel 150 feet below the bed of the Tiber River in Rome. The wood was identified as an extinct species of sequoia, of an age estimated by geologists at 12 million years. Wood immersed in water for thousands of years does go through some chemical changes and loses some of its strength, but this is not to be confused with decay. Decay is the result of one thing only and that is attack by wood-destroying fungi. If wood is kept dry, or if it is kept thoroughly and permanently saturated with moisture there will be no decay. The range of activity of fungi lies between 20 percent moisture content of the wood and a "soaking wet" condition in which all air is excluded. We sometimes hear that some woods never decay, regardless of exposure and service conditions. Any wood will decay when exposed to fungus attack that is severe enough and continued long enough. Next week we will talk about some of the more practical aspects of wood decay and some of the things every home owner should know to keep his house in good repair for a long period of time. **LEAVES IN SOIL** Will certain types of leaves in the soil make it too acid? The answer to this question is "no." You can feel safe in using leaves from any tree or shrub in your yard to build the soil. The leaves, however, should be decomposed before use. Working fresh leaves into the soil is not recommended. Leaves do not decompose at a fast rate on their own accord. Decomposition takes place only when certain bacteria and fungi are present in large enough quantities to do the job. To make the leaves into humus quickly, you must provide an environment which will encourage rapid growth of the bacteria and fungi. 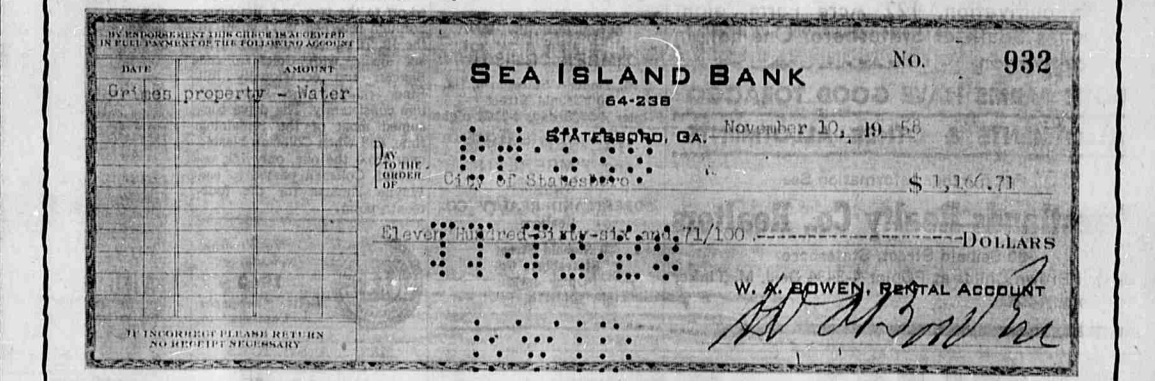
