A cash dividend totaling \$20,000 was paid in December after the 100 per cent stock dividend which was paid in March. Capital funds are at the highest total in the twenty-six year history of the bank, and we have continued adding to these funds from retained earnings, now making a total of approximately \$471,000, divided into capital, surplus, undivided profits and reserves."
