

## Recall this when buying fertilizer

**DAIRY PROFITS**  
Profits in dairy farming depend to a great extent upon careful selection of feeds and upon providing the cow with suitable ration for milk production.

Feed costs are generally considered to be one-half of the total cost of producing milk. Therefore, it is important to have well in mind the nutritive requirements of the dairy cow and how the various feeds and combination feeds will meet those needs most efficiently and economically.

The amount of feed a cow should receive depends on several factors. Such as size of the cows, the amount of milk the cow is producing, the quality and fat percentage of the milk, and the condition of the cow.

### CONFUSING RATIOS

12-12-0, 3-3-6, 4-12-12, 6-12-12, 6-12-4, 5-10-15. Are these figures confusing? They are fertilizer ratios, and the variety of fertilizers on the market with different ratios can be confusing. But basically, this is a very simple matter.

When buying fertilizer, farmers should remember that only three basic fertilizer ratios are needed to correct any soil fertility condition in Georgia.

The first of these ratios is of fertilizer with an equal amount of phosphate and potash. Such a fertilizer would have a 4-12-12 or 6-12-12 ratio.

The second basic ratio is of a fertilizer with high phosphate and low potash content such as 6-12-6. The third basic ratio

would be of a fertilizer with low phosphate and high potash such as 5-10-15.

In any case, the first figure in the ratio represents nitrogen, the second, phosphate, and the third, potash.

Choosing between the three basic ratios depends on the soil test. It tells which one to use. Using the wrong choice can cost money.

### PLANTING TREE SEEDLINGS

If you're planting tree seedlings this winter, or early spring, remember to keep their roots moist from time of delivery to the time they are planted.

Seedlings must have healthy root systems. If the roots become dried out, they may suffer damage which might not be overcome.

If seedlings are stored in a cool place and kept moist upon delivery, they usually will stay in good condition for as long as two weeks. If seedlings must wait for longer periods before planting, they should be heeled-in.

There may be as many as 2,000 seedlings in a bundle. For best survival these should be planted as soon as possible after they are received. After they are heeled-in, cover with a moist soil and then drench with water.

On planting day keep the roots covered in their container with a sappy mud or water. Never allow the roots to be exposed to the sun or wind even for a few minutes, for the small root endings quickly die when exposed.

The supply of high-germinating cotton seed, however, is still going to be less than demand. Farmers saving their own seed should take a representative sample and send it to the State Seed Laboratory in Atlanta. The

## Eld. Hendricks publishes his autobiography

Announcement was made recently of the release of a new book written and published by Elder J. Walter Hendricks, retired Primitive Baptist preacher, now living in Metter.

The book is titled "Autobiography." It is a collection of Elder Hendricks during his eighty-seven years as a preacher, teacher, editor, farmer and citizen.

Born in Bulloch County on October 21, 1873, the son of Maria and Elizabeth Dickson Hendricks, Elder Hendricks was by his own admission, "a puny-looking bundle."

He graduated from the University of Georgia in June, 1897, and began teaching that year in Milledgeville. From there he went to Knoxville, Tennessee and taught Latin and Greek in Holbrook Normal College. He also taught for a while in Valparaiso, Indiana. In 1900 he returned to Georgia and taught in Douglas.

It was in 1908 that he came to Statesboro to manage the newly established First District Agricultural and Mechanical High School, now Georgia Southern College. He resigned in November of 1909 and returned to Douglas and became a farmer.

In 1925 he moved to Savannah and remained there until 1954 when he and Mrs. Hendricks moved to Thomaston, Georgia where he had been elected president of Birdwood College. In 1957 he moved to Metter where he and Mrs. Hendricks now live.

His most productive years were during his period of ministry which began in 1912 and continued until he was seventy-five years of age, on October 21, 1948. Since that day he continued his preaching upon invitation from the many churches whose members still love and admire him.

His book is rich in descriptions of how people lived in the late 1800's and early 1900's. His style is delightful and those who know him will say, it is written exactly like he talks.

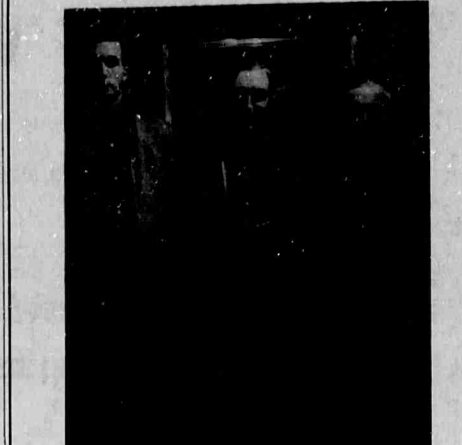

Palbearers were cousins, Floyd Ellis, Donald, Gary, Arnold, Euel and Billy Atkins.

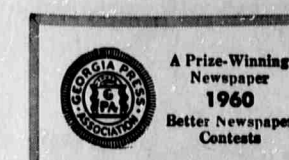

## CSC host to Junior College tournament

Georgia Southern College will play host to thirteen junior colleges over the state during the annual Georgia State Junior College Tournament to be played here in the W. S. Hanner Gymnasium Wednesday through Saturday, February 22-25.

The thirteen participating teams will be: Young Harris College, Columbus College, Middle Georgia College, South Georgia College, Georgia Military College, Brewton Parker College, Armstrong College, Baldwin, Gordon Military College, Georgia Southwestern, Southern Technical Institute, Southern University, and Young Harris College, with a perfect record of 11 wins, it seeded first in the tournament, followed by Columbus College with a record of 8 wins and 2 losses.

### B-P Barons Defend

Defending champs will be Brewton Parker's Blue Barons who have won the state crown 9 times out of the last 11 years, defeating Alabama in the final here last year.

The conference records for the other 11 colleges, as of February 11, are as follows: Middle Georgia, 17-5; Trustee-McConnell, 6-3; South Georgia, 6-3; Norman, 9-6; Georgia Military College, 7-5.

Also Brewton Parker College, 8-7; Armstrong, 5-5; Abraham Baldwin, 7-9; Gordon Military College, 3-7; Georgia Southwestern, 2-17; and Southern Technical Institute, 0-15.

The tournament is an annual senior college recruiter's dream. This year it will feature better than 20 players who stand 6-3 or more. Norman College has the tallest — Lamar Deaver, 6-7. Young Harris follows with Gene Lewis, 6-6, backed by Lee Ramsey, 6-5.

The tournament, a single-elimination affair, will culminate on Saturday night with a 9:00 p.m. championship game.

## Blue Devils are Region 2-A Champs; SEBHigh is 2-B Area IV Champion

Statesboro High School Blue Devils captured the Region 2-A basketball championship by whipping Dublin 65 to 51 in the tournament final in Springfield on Saturday night, February 18.

Lindsey Johnston paved the way for the Blue Devils with 16 points. Junior Pye and Remer Dekle added 13 and 11 more to the total.

Ronnie Baggett's 16 points and Ben Snipes' 14 led the way for the losers.

Both teams will represent Region 2-A in the Class A tournament to be held in Macon on March 2-4.

The Boys in Blue got off to a fast start in the tournament which opened in Springfield on Thursday night, February 16.

They defeated Dudley Hughes in the 8 o'clock game by a score of 67 to 44. Junior Pye and Lindsey Johnston led the scoring with 16 points each. Danny Bray added 13 points to the total.

Ed Martin led the Dudley Hughes five with 11 points.

In the second round the Blue Devils continued their winning streak by defeating the Sylvania Gamecocks 55 to 45. This game guaranteed the Statesboro Five a berth in the state tournament to be held in Macon in March.

Jimmy Searce paced Coach Ray Williams' boys with 24 points. Junior Pye added 12 more for the winners. Larry Thigpen scored 17 points for scoring honors for the Gamecocks.

In the consolation game Saturday night, Screven County's Gamecocks (Sylvania) defeated Effingham County (Springfield) 49 to 47.

### Ga. Power pays

\$16,235 to 3 municipalities

A check for \$16,235.63 was delivered to the city of Statesboro on February 16 by W. Tom Martin, District Manager of the Georgia Power Company.

This payment represents the city's share of the gross receipts in 1960 from the sale of electric power to commercial and residential customers of the Georgia Municipal Partnership Plan.

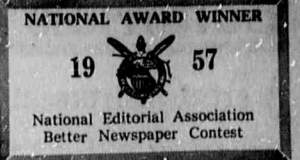
The three per cent tax is paid by the company in place of occupation and franchise taxes and is in addition to the company's property taxes which, on a statewide basis, totaled \$6,122,000 last year. This is an increase of more than \$20,000 over 1959.

The company's total tax bill for 1960 was \$29,875,000. This does not include the sales tax which the company collects from its customers for the State of Georgia nor the sales tax which the company pays on materials used in its operations.

Checks were also delivered to the city of Statesboro for the Municipal Partnership Plan for \$667,270 and \$614,700 respectively, bringing the total to Bulloch County to \$16,235.60.

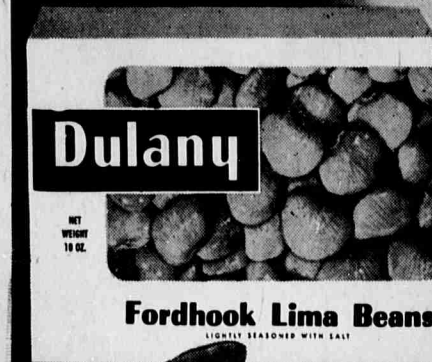

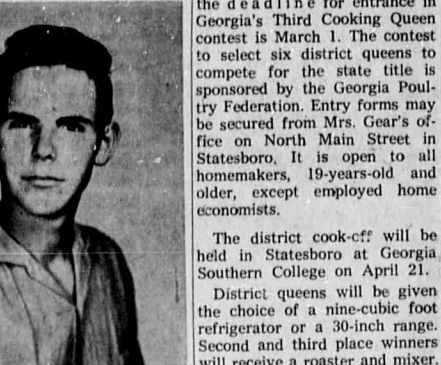
