Summer school at GSC set for June 12

Registration for the first session of summer school will be held in the Old Gym on June 12 between the hours of 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. according to the Registrar's office.

Prior to the registration hours, all beginning freshmen and all new transfer students will assemble in the auditorium in the Administration Building at 8 a.m. for instructions regarding the registration procedure.

All graduate students will assemble in the auditorium in the Marvin Pittman School at 8 a.m. for directions regarding registration procedure for graduate students.

Students now enrolled at Georgia Southern will comply with the admission requirements as set forth in the general catalog. Those who have not previously attended the college must submit application for admission to the director of admissions by not later than July 5 for the second term of summer school. May 24 was the deadline for submitting applications to the first term.

The calendar for the two summer school sessions is as follows: June 12, registration; June 12, classes begin; June 17, last day of registration; July 3, holiday; July 8, classes meet on regular schedule; July 20, first term ends; July 24, registration for second term; July 25, last day for registering; August 17, Commencement.

PETITION FOR CHARTER

GEORGIA, Bulloch County, The petition of Charles P. Oliff Jr., Priscilla P. Oliff, and Waunetta Dominy hereinafter called petitioners respectfully shows:

1. Petitioners desire for themselves, their associates and successors to be incorporated under the name of "Oliff Ford Corp."

2. The object of said corporation is pecuniary gain and profit.

3. The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted is as follows: To engage in the business of purchasing, acquiring, owning, lessing, selling, transferring, encumbering, generally dealing in, repairing, renovating, and servicing all types of new and used automobiles, trucks, and other motor vehicles, and any parts or accessories used in connection therewith; in the purchasing, acquiring, owning, selling, and generally dealing in all types of motor vehicles.

4. Petitioners further desire that said corporation be vested with all the rights and powers now or hereafter given to do any and all things which may be deemed or proper in the operation of the above described business, and that said corporation have of the powers enumerated in Sections 22-1827 and 22-1828, Georgia Code Annotated, and such powers as may hereafter be given by law.

5. The maximum number of shares of stock shall be not more than fifty (50), all of which shall be common stock, and all of which shall be without par value.

6. However, the amount of capital with which the corporation shall begin business shall be not less than \$15,000.00.

7. The time for which the corporation is to have existence is 35 years, with the privilege of renewal of the charter from time to time, upon the expiration of said period of thirty-five (35) years.

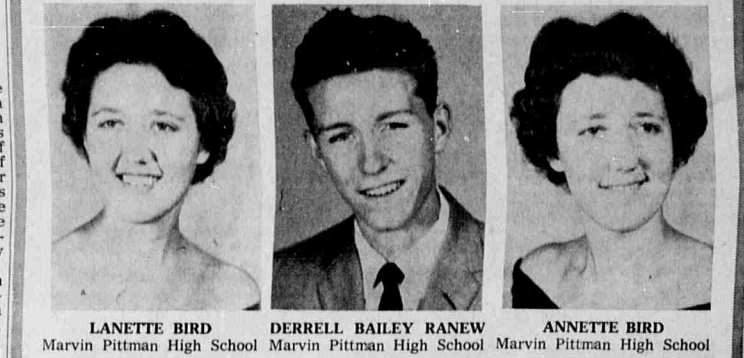

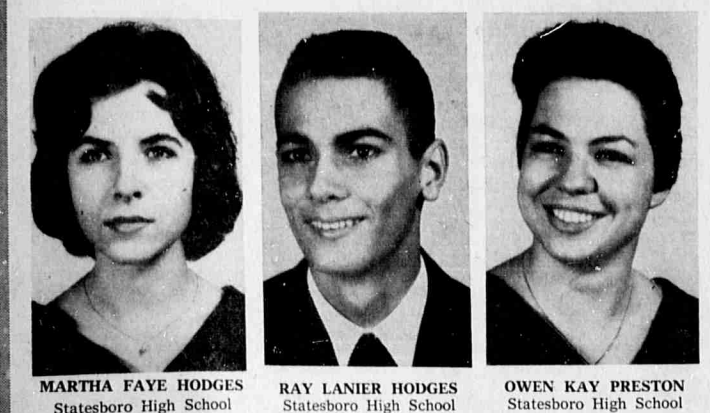

FROZEN FOOD TEMPERATURES

To keep frozen peas at top quality they must be stored at or below zero degrees Fahrenheit, according to Miss Nellie Thrash, head of the Extension food preservation department at the University of Georgia College of Agriculture. Five days at 25 to 30 degrees damages quality more than storage for a year at zero, she says.

RECORD LIVESTOCK RECEIPTS

Cash receipts of Georgia livestock reached a record high of almost \$421 million in 1960, according to the Georgia Crop Reporting Service. This is a two per cent increase above the previous high record in 1958, and almost nine per cent above rates for 1959.

State law requires all seed offered for sale to be labeled with an analysis card showing the kind of seed, germination, purity, lot number, date of test and other information, says Hugh Inglis, Extension agronomist.

Black turpentine beetle at work

By ROY POWELL

County Agent for Extension Circular 404, "The Black Turpentine Beetle and Its Control."

Home and land owners are warned to be on lookout for infestations of the black turpentine beetle. Damage from this beetle has already been reported from a number of areas since the weather warmed up.

Turpentine beetles will attack all species of pine grown in Georgia. They are much more likely to attack trees that have been weakened by drought, fire or mechanical injury.

The first evidence of a beetle attack are pitch tubes at the lower portion of the tree trunk, usually about two or three feet above the ground.

Builders of new homes especially should be on guard against the turpentine beetle. When homes are built, roots of trees are often cut and injured by heavy machinery. This damage often brings attacks by the beetles.

Valuable pines should be protected from the machinery by a temporary fence around. A one percent solution of Gifc sprayed on the trees will protect against beetle attack.

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Farmers to need and use more credit in future

Farmers will need and use more credit in the years ahead according to W. H. Smith Sr. of Statesboro, Georgia, president of the Statesboro Production Credit Association, who has just returned from Jekyll Island, Georgia where he attended the annual conference for directors of production credit associations on May 15 and 16.

Reports at the conference indicated that farmers are going to continue to develop larger and more specialized operations with increased capital investments and operating costs to adjust their farm business to changing technology and economic conditions with a view of maintaining a reasonable standard of living for their families.

Mr. Smith said, "The loan volume of PCA's in North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida reached an all time high in 1960 which totaled \$202 million, an increase of about nine per cent over 1959."

Officials of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Columbia reported that service to agriculture through the Credit Bank-PCA system in the four states had almost doubled in the past five years and it is possible that it could double again in the next five years.

"The Statesboro association served 533 farmers with loans totaling \$1,513,000.00 in 1960 in Bulloch and Evans counties," Mr. Smith added.
