The Georgia Rotary Foundation and the Statesboro Rotary Club will sponsor three foreign students for a year's study at Georgia Southern College beginning in the fall of 1961.

They are Miss Enza Denino, Florence, Italy; Peder Lunde, Oslo Norway; and Jorge Correa Taborda, Columbia, South America.

Miss Denino is a graduate of Liceo-Ginnasio School, the most demanding and selective of the various types of Italian schools. It is the only one that entitles its graduates to enter the university.

She speaks Italian, English, and Spanish, and wants to become a teacher of political science.

### Wish Comes True

Miss Denino wrote in her application, "In high school my desk-mate was an American girl from Georgia, and ever since, I've always wanted to come to Georgia."

Lunde is a verbal gymnast, speaking English, German, Norwegian, French, Swedish, and Danish. He has attended the Oslo Secondary School and the Oslo Commercial College. His academic interest is economics.

An avid participant in yachting, skiing, and gymnastics, the young Norwegian won fame and honor for himself and his country in the 1960 Olympics. He was the winner of the only gold medal received by his country in the summer Olympics. He was a winner in the Flying Dutchman class. This is a division of yachting, in which a two-man boat is used.

### Teaches High School

Taborda, a high school teacher in Columbia, speaks English, French, Italian, and Spanish. He stated that his main interest in coming to Georgia Southern is to improve his proficiency in English. The three students will be taking 10 quarter hours of work per quarter and will be available for speaking to the various campus organizations and local civic clubs.

## Lincoln-Mercury Comet dealers up May sales

Latest sales figures were announced today by George P. Montaguet, Lincoln - Mercury Division's Jacksonville district sales manager, who reported that dealers sold 1,075 Mercurys, Lincoln Continentals and Comets last month, compared with 36 in April, 1961, and 968 in May, 1960.

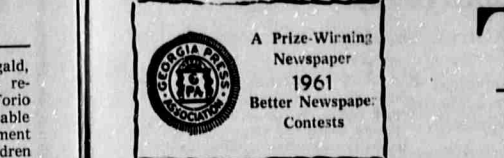

**Bulloch gets highway improvements in the July 27 state contract lettings**

Widening and resurfacing of one stretch of highway and resurfacing of another stretch in Bulloch County will be included in the State Highway Department contract letting on July 27, totaling \$15 million, about half of the first \$30 million dollar bond increment under the \$100 million dollar state highway reconstruction program.

Highway Chairman Jim Gillis made the announcement Tuesday. He said that the contract letting, include 73 projects for widening and resurfacing 1,168 miles of primary and secondary highways located in 86 counties.

Bids were received on June 27 from bonding companies on the first \$30 million dollar increment of the reconstruction program. Two point bids were submitted and the lowest bid, by the Equitable Securities Corporation, was accepted. The bid was for 3.83118 per cent interest rate on the first \$30 million dollar bond increment. Chairman Gillis said that these bonds will be signed on July 20 and are scheduled for delivery on July 25.

The two stretches of highway in Bulloch County included in the first contract letting on July 27 are:

**Widening and resurfacing**  
30,630 miles on Georgia Highway No. 26 (U. S. 80) beginning at State Route 56 at Swainsboro and ending at State Route 87 (Hopewell), where U. S. 80 and U. S. 25 merge)  
2. Resurfacing 31,329 miles on State Route 119 beginning at State Route 67 at Denmark to U. S. 80, then beginning on U. S. 80 at Saltillo to State Route 21 at Springfield.

## Two National Awards Won By PBL Chapter

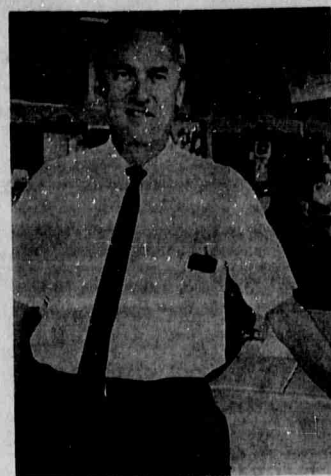

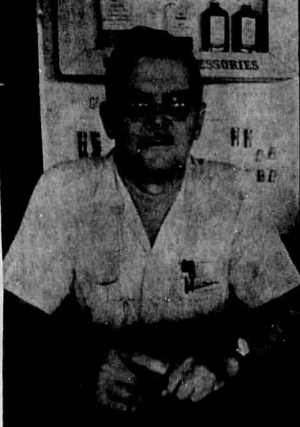

The board normally makes a survey of growing conditions in South Georgia counties and then reports to Campbell. The commissioner uses this information to determine the best date for the opening of the Georgia markets on the Georgia-Florida Blue cured tobacco crop.

The five Florida markets usually start their auction season at the same time as the Georgia tobacco centers.

Campbell also will stipulate the number of days of the sales season.

Sales of Georgia tobacco last year amounted to 148,037,000 pounds, bringing growers \$84,162,698.

Last year the tobacco market opened on Thursday, July 28.

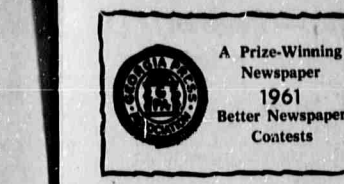

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## Ogeechee River is under boating law

J. D. Atchinson, chief of the Ogeechee District of the State Game and Fish Commission, announced this week that he wishes to correct an impression which seems to be prevalent among people in this area of the Ogeechee River.

Mr. Atchinson said, "We are interested in informing the public of Section 1, paragraph G and H of the Commission's regulations relative to boating safety, motorboat numbering and the reporting of motorboat accidents." This section pertains to the use of life preservers and the operation of watercraft during hours of darkness.

Paragraph G and H of the section are as follows:

"(G) The operator of each motorboat and the operator of each watercraft on the waters of this State (as defined in Section 2 (3) of the Georgia Motorboat Numbering Act, 1960 Georgia Laws, page 235, shall have aboard for each person, a life preserver, buoyant vest, buoyant cushion or ring buoy (all such equipment to be United States Coast Guard approved) in good and serviceable condition.

"(H) No person shall operate any watercraft on any of the waters of this State during hours of darkness unless showing a light sufficient to make the watercraft's presence and location known to any and all other craft within a reasonable distance."

Mr. Atchinson says that the Ogeechee River does come under these regulations, as do the other waters in the state.

The Ogeechee District Chief urges all boat and watercraft operators in this section to conform with these regulations for their own safety and the safety of others.

## Herman Talmadge Reports From Washington

RACIAL AGITATORS like the "Freedom Riders" seem to have forgotten that justice is a two-edged sword which cuts both ways.

The interracial provocation coming into the South for the avowed purpose of creating strife and fomenting violence are demanding a double standard of justice for themselves—insisting on one hand that they have a right to violate local laws with impunity while calling on the other hand for the intervention of federal authority to protect them from the consequences of their lawless acts. They are the same people who loudly proclaim court decisions to be the "law of the land" which must be obeyed without question by Southerners yet who bitterly complain when they are admonished and enjoined by those same courts.

They are the same people who demand strict adherence to the letter of the law by those who disagree with them yet who insist that they have a "moral" right to obey only those laws and decrees with which they personally agree.

THE BACKGROUNDS of the leaders of these disciples of discord raise some serious questions about the true purposes of the movement. Files of the House Committee on Un-American Activities show that at least nine of the 16 members of the National Advisory Committee of the Congress of Racial Equality, the principal organization responsible for these demonstrations, have records of affiliation or identification with Communist or Communist Front organizations and causes.

One of them is A. J. Muste who, according to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, "has long fronted for Communists." He has been connected with no less than 32 Communist Front groups and activities. Others include NAACP officials Allan Knight Chambers and A. Philip Randolph, the latter having an Un-American Activities Committee record requiring six single-spaced, typewritten pages to recount.

Additionally, there is James Peck, once listed as Editor of the CORE publication, who served a penitentiary sentence as a World War II draft dodger and who was arrested in 1958 for trying to sail into the Pacific clear testing area in the Pacific.

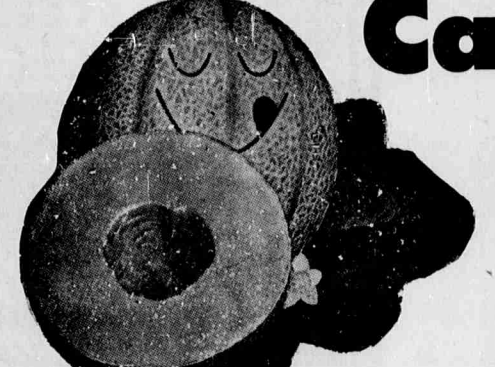
