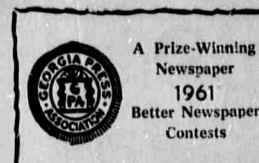

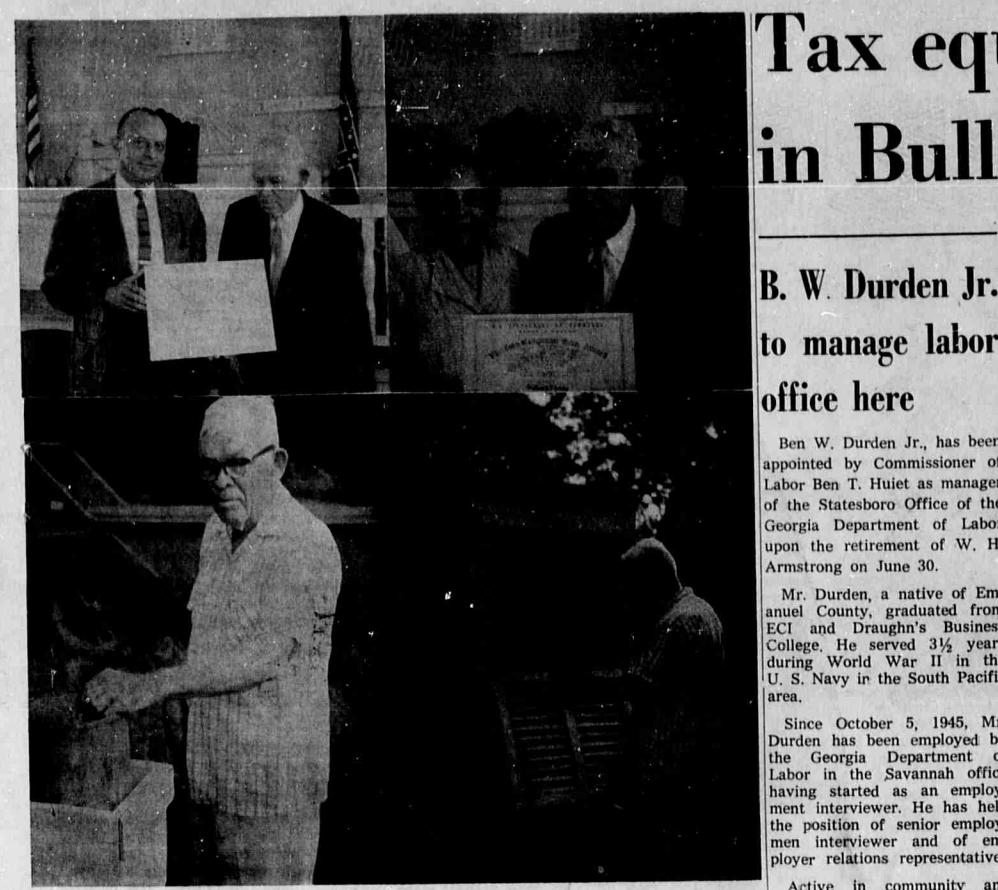
Jaycees install Eddie Rushing new president

W. H. Armstrong retires after 19 years service

W. H. Armstrong retired on June 30 as Manager of the local Employment Service office of the Georgia Department of Labor. Ben W. Durden Jr., has been appointed by Commissioner of Labor Ben T. Hulet as the new manager.

When this office was opened in Statesboro April 17, 1944, Mr. Armstrong was assigned as its manager. Prior to coming to Statesboro he had worked in the Milledgeville and Savannah offices. He has over 19 years' service with the Georgia Department of Labor. In addition, he worked nearly two years in other state agencies. Last year, Governor Vandiver presented Mr. Armstrong a 20-year pin for faithful service to the State of Georgia.

At the present time, Mr. Armstrong is serving as chairman of the official board of the First Christian Church of Statesboro. He is a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Armstrong, and his wife, live on Azalia Drive. Both are natives of Sandersville. They have two daughters: Mrs. Lewis Hinely of Augusta, and Mrs. R. H. Worst of St. Simons. They also have four grandchildren.

In special ceremonies held in the Bulloch County courthouse on Friday morning of last week, Mr. William C. Cromley of Brooklet, was presented the John Campanius Holm Award by the United States Department of Commerce, Weather Bureau.

The presentation was made by Mr. V. D. Steves, supervising climatologist of the Weather Records Processing Center, Chattanooga, Tennessee. Members of Mr. Cromley's family and many of his friends from Statesboro and Brooklet attended the ceremonies.

The John Campanius Holm award was presented to Mr. Cromley for outstanding achievement and service rendered as a Weather Bureau Cooperative Observer. John Campanius Holm is the first known systematic weather observer in the American Colonies. In 1664 and 1665 the Reverend Campanius made records of climate and the use of instruments near the present site of Wilmington, Delaware.

Mr. Cromley is one of only twenty-four of the nation's 12,000 volunteer observers to receive the award.

The weather station maintained by Mr. Cromley is located near his home just outside Brooklet on the road to Southeast Bulloch High School. The station, housed in a small shelter furnished by the Weather Bureau, is in Mr. Cromley's back yard, located so that he raises it every time he goes from the house to his barn and farm implement shelters.

The station houses a minimum and maximum thermometer which is checked for accuracy at regular intervals by a Weather Bureau inspector. The rain gauge stands about one hundred feet from the thermometer shelter.

Mr. Cromley records daily the maximum and minimum readings of the thermometer and the amount of rainfall and makes his reports to the Weather Bureau.

He has been doing this since September, 1940. From August, 1907, when the weather station was established at Brooklet, until August, 1910, it was tended by Mr. Cromley's father, William C. Cromley. The present station is located at the exact spot on which it was placed in 1907. Last year Mr. Cromley was presented a Fifty-Year Service pin at a special meeting of the Brooklet Farm Bureau.

In the opinion of the Bulloch County Board of Tax Assessors (Equalizers) and other county officials the program of tax revaluation and equalization, in the county is very successful, rather than the "failure" intimated in a news story released from Atlanta and appearing in the Sunday, July 2 issue of the Savannah Morning News.

Members of the county Board of Tax Assessors (Equalizers) stated Wednesday morning that the program is successful. They said that they have had very few complaints and they are minor ones. "The majority of the citizens of Bulloch County are satisfied with the results of the revaluation," one said. Another added that the industrial firms who own property in the county are pleased with it. It was stated that less than ten percent of the property owners who have received notices from the tax equalizers informing them of the value assigned to their property came to the board to complain. And most of those who did appear came more to ask for a breakdown of the total figure to show the valuation to individual pieces of property, rather than to complain.

The tax revaluation program in the county began in April, 1960. Mr. C. M. Billinger was sent to the county by the state property tax director's office of the State Department of Revenues to head up the program. Mr. Billinger has sixteen years experience with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company in the League baseball team, and is a member of the Coastal Referees Football Association.

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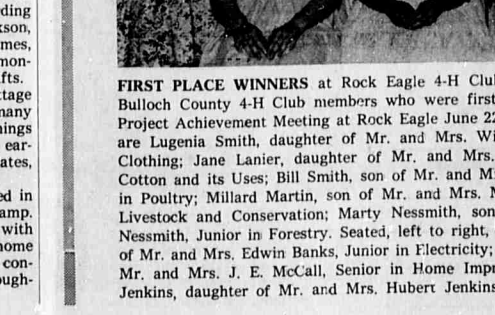
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The entire county group attended a short course in tax assessing and was appraised by Mr. Campbell. The six people worked in three two-man teams who reviewed their work each day and made comparisons with each other's figures. The course was changed every four or five weeks.

The revaluation of all county property has been completed and all the figures are in the hands of the Bulloch county tax assessors (equalizers) which is the only legally constituted body with authority to assess taxes in Bulloch County. The figures furnished by the revaluation team are only guides to be used by the assessors.

The County Commissioners believe that the county saved a lot of money by using the plan as approved by Mr. Campbell, the property tax director, using personnel recommended and approved by him. The program in Bulloch will cost the county less than \$30,000. This compares to an estimate of nearly \$100,000 if the county had used a professional local firm.

Two of the local appraisers have been employed by another county to assist in the same revaluation program as that in which they were in Bulloch. They report for work July 10.

Miss Perry Ends 36 Years Service

Miss Viola Perry retired July 1 after 33 years, as Registrar at Georgia Southern College. After serving in the educational field for approximately 40 years, Miss Perry stated, "I'll be at home. I'm not going looking for another job."

In 1925 Miss Perry came to Georgia Southern as a math teacher and became registrar and associate professor of math in 1928. Before coming to GSC she taught at the first district A & M school at Tifton and also in grade schools at Madison.

During her years as registrar she has signed over 4500 diplomas besides the numerous two year certificates and others given by the college. Miss Perry holds the distinction of being the only person who has served under every president of GSC beginning with Dr. Ernest Hollis since the school became a college in 1924.

These past 36 years, have been progressive years for Southern and Miss Perry has watched it change. Especially noticeable are those improvements made in the college curriculum, the campus changes, and the number and quality of the students. "It (quality) is improving all the time," she added.

Since 1925 she has witnessed the changing of the college name three times under the guidance of four different presidents. She has seen the addition of the Sweetheart Circle instead of a driveway directly on the same path that is now the walk leading from the front gate.

When she first came to the campus there were only four buildings. Now there are approximately 20 buildings. Quite a change in 36 years! An interesting fact Miss Perry reported was that the library was where the comptroller's office is now and the auditorium was upstairs in the Administration Building. Later when McCroan Auditorium was added, the upstairs space was used for a basketball gym.

Her first big venture after retirement will be a trip to Wyoming. "I plan to stay at a Dude Ranch there or stay on to Lake Louise in Canada," Miss Perry said.

The usual question about how she will like retirement was replied to by Miss Perry with a "ask me that after July 1."

Rabies clinics will be held July 17-20

Beginning on July 17 and continuing through July 20, every one in Bulloch County will be given an opportunity to consult with a community effort with a real public health importance. A series of clinics will be held for the vaccination of dogs against rabies, or hydrophobia. All a dog owner needs to do is to take his dog or cat to one of the clinics and have it vaccinated. The fee will be \$1.50 per animal. All dogs three months old should be vaccinated, and then receive a booster at seven months and yearly thereafter.

The Bulloch County Health Department earnestly solicits the cooperation of all citizens during this vaccination drive. Clinics will be located at convenient points throughout the county.

Citizens are urged to watch for the announcement in this paper of time and places of the clinics. Rabies or hydrophobia is a dangerous disease of man and animal. It is transmitted through the bite of a mad animal.

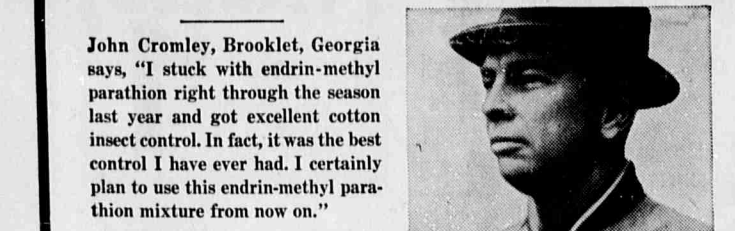
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Revival begins at Temple Hill Sunday, July 9

Record pecan yield is predicted for BC

Four-Hers completed 336,524 farm and/or community projects having an estimated value of approximately \$15 million.

11,876 4-H members participated in educational, recreational and inspirational activities at 4-H Camps.

5,734 medals were awarded to county 4-H champions for superior achievement.

1,180 county champions participated at District 4-H Project Achievement Meetings, where they vied for district honors and the privilege of representing their district at the State 4-H Congress. This was a 10.9 percent increase in participation over 1960.

Nearly 15,000 local adult volunteers leaders gave freely of their time and talents in helping control 4-H work.

Four H-ers lived for three months as members of families in other countries — one in Switzerland, one in Norway, one in Germany, and one in Denmark. In exchange, 7 young people from Norway, England, Scotland, Germany, Austria, Japan, and Ecuador visited families in Georgia.

Georgia 4-H members were awarded \$22,441.46 in college scholarships.

Attending educational programs at the Rock Eagle 4-H Club Center were 45,982 people, an increase of 3,532 over the previous largest attendance in 1959. 177,014 persons have used the Center as members of official groups since it was opened in May 1955.

Four-H educational activities are designed to help develop the state's greatest resource — it's youth. The future of Georgia and the nation is dependent upon the kinds and amount of educational opportunities offered to our boys and girls.



30 Bulloch County farmers to get 'District Cooperator' farms signs

The Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District recognizes co-operators who are doing an outstanding job (and who want to be so recognized) in soil and water conservation in many different ways. One way is by giving them the opportunity to erect official "District Cooperator" signs on their farms. This sign shows the name of the District and also the name of the cooperator.

Recently, 30 such District Cooperator signs have been placed on farms in Bulloch County. Back in 1955 about this same number were put up. Then further back (1950 I believe) the first ones (about 12) were placed on outstanding cooperator's farms in Bulloch, which brings to a total about 70 to 75 "District Cooperator" signs in Bulloch.

Those ordering these signs recently include: Paul Nessmith, Waldo Colson, Smith Brothers, H. S. Blitch and Son, W. Eugene Deal, and Fred Blitch in the Westside Community; Neal Bowen and J. L. Dekle in the Ridge Community; N. J. Cox and Son, and Cloyce Martin in the Denmark Community; Dewey Strickland, F. G. Rozier, Earl Laster, John N. Rushing Jr. and J. Harry Lee in the Brooklet Community.

In the Stillton Community is P. Martin; W. A. Hodges and Frank Proctor in the Ogeechee Community.

This meeting is being called by the Commissioner of Agriculture to enable our farmers to familiarize themselves with the provisions of this marketing plan before they are called upon to vote on this.

There will be a representative of the Agricultural Extension Service, Farm Bureau, Sweet Potato Commission and Georgia Department of Agriculture at this meeting to explain the law and answer any questions that our farmers may desire to have answered.

Mr. J. L. Wynn, President of the Bulloch County Growers Association, urges all members of this organization to attend this meeting Tuesday night and vote on this.

U. S. farm egg prices will average about 35 to 36 cents a dozen during the next quarter of this year and then move up to about 38 to 39 cents during the last quarter.

This is noted in a report from Extension Poultry and Egg Marketing Specialist R. A. Gay, of the University of Georgia. Egg prices in the first half of 1962 are expected to average 32 to 33 cents a dozen—some two to three cents under the prices for the first half of this year.

Price predictions for the year ahead are higher than earlier expectations. This is because the increase in the hatch of egg-type chicks during the first six months of 1961 was held to about six percent.

Representatives of the Georgia Farm Bureau, Agricultural Extension Service, Peanut Commodity Commission and Georgia Department of Agriculture will be at this meeting next Thursday night to explain the provisions of this law and answer individual questions brought out by peanut farmers.

More than one thousand Bulloch County farmers grow peanuts each year and this proposed marketing and promotion plan may offer new avenues for greater uses of peanuts and at the same time give our farmers the opportunity to find better ways of growing peanuts.

Mr. John R. Rushing, Jr., Chairman of the Bulloch County Peanut Committee, and officers of the county and community Farm Bureau chapters, are encouraging our farmers to attend this meeting next Thursday night in order that our people may have the best information possible before they vote on this promotional program for peanuts.

New cotton variety released

A new upland cotton variety named "Atlas" which was released this past spring has brought enthusiastic response from cotton breeders in the state. The new variety has unusually high fiber and yarn strength.

Director Frank P. King of the Georgia Coastal Plain Experiment Station where the variety was bred reports that small lots of seed from four strains of the Atlas cotton already have been made available to public and private breeders. A limited amount of seed for farm planting will be available next year.

Atlas has yield potential at least as high as the leading commercial varieties grown in the southeastern states. The added fiber strength will not only produce more durable materials but will add to the textile industry's operating efficiency, researchers say.

Details of a timber sale should not be trusted to memory, but should be included in a written agreement or contract. Such an agreement will help protect both the buyer and the seller from misunderstanding.

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animal. The saliva of an animal with rabies contains the virus which causes the disease. When the skin is broken by the animal bite, the saliva enters the body. Rabies does not always develop after the bite of a rabid animal, but when it does, the disease is always fatal.

As we have no way of determining whether the bitten person will develop the disease, we must give the Pasteur treatment to every person exposed to the virus through exposure to a rabid animal. Our best protection lies in eliminating and controlling the spread of the disease. This would eliminate the need for human treatment following animal bites.

England, Sweden and Denmark have eliminated rabies by following definite control measures such as:

(1) Rid the community of stray dogs. It is the unwanted dog that is never vaccinated and is most susceptible when rabies is introduced into a community.

(2) Have your dogs adequately immunized. The Health Department rabies clinics provide this service for a small fee.

(3) Report all cases of rabies.
