Methodists Gather at Epworth-by-the-Sea May 15 to Dedicate Strickland Auditorium

EPWORTH-BY-THE-SEA, South Georgia Methodist Conference on St. Simons Island, will be thronged Thursday, May 15, when hundreds of Methodists gather for a special program highlighting the rapid development of this Center of annual beauty and historical significance. Climax of the program will be dedication of this newly completed \$90,000 assembly building, provided by Julian Strickland of Valdosta and his sister, Mrs. Natalie S. Waters of Atlanta, in honor of their mother, the late Mrs. A. J. Strickland of Valdosta.

Methodists of this community will be joining their friends from over the South Georgia Conference at Epworth-by-the-Sea on St. Simons Island, Thursday, May 15, for dedication of the recently completed Strickland Memorial auditorium.

The Rev. John S. Lough, pastor of the Statesboro Methodist Church, is calling attention to this great inspirational, educational and cultural center South Georgia Methodists are developing. "Named Epworth-by-the-Sea for Epworth, England, home town of John and Charles Wesley, who gave Methodism to the world, it is situated on the Frederica riverbank of St. Simons Island. On this very island, the Wesleys and three other leaders of the original Methodist group known as 'the Holy Club' taught and preached."

The Strickland Memorial auditorium will be dedicated to the cultivation of the same principles and ideals of those early leaders who sought to spread Christian gospel in the New World. The cross atop this modern, \$90,000 assembly hall adds an inspiring landmark to Georgia's Golden Isles. It symbolizes the spiritual reach of those who will gather there and marks an appropriate place for today's successors of the 'Holy Club' to preach and teach.

Julian Strickland of Valdosta, along with his sister, Mrs. Natalie S. Waters of Atlanta erected this structure as an honor to their mother, the late Mrs. A. J. Strickland of Valdosta. He will present the building for dedication. The new auditorium is another tangible part of a modern conference center surrounded in natural beauty, steeped in history and developed from the substance of men's dreams. It carries on the dreams of John Wesley who in 1738 built a house of worship there and fulfills the dream of Bishop

Arthur J. Moore, Atlanta, who in 1940 conceived the idea of establishing a conference center in these historic surroundings.

Members of the Conference Center Commission and other interested Methodists of vision and faith today in 1952 are working toward further development of this center that dreams built.

When Bishop Moore and members of the Conference Center Commission in October, 1940, purchased the land, they had in mind a dormitory for 60 persons. Methodist Youth Fellowship members prepared the small lobby house for recreational use. Since that time, additional gifts from laymen and churches throughout South Georgia have improved these buildings and grounds. Members of the Women's Society of Christian Service recently dedicated the Big House (has 14 rooms, five baths, steam heat). The smaller house was redecorated and designated as the Bishop's House. The large lobby house was converted into a dormitory for 60 persons. Methodist Youth Fellowship members prepared the small lobby house for recreational use.

A cafeteria-kitchen has been constructed and fully equipped. A second dormitory more than double sleeping accommodations. Flagstone walkways, gift of Mrs. Julia Stiles Booth of Manor, Ga., connect the buildings. A camellia garden begun by Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Whithead of Valdosta adds to the beauty of the grounds with their moss-draped oaks and restored formal gardens.

The chapel was restored and named for the original Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore, Maryland, where in 1874 the Methodist
