WASHINGTON, March 21.—The cost of living, as measured by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, dropped 0.8 per cent in February from the level of the previous month. The government price index for all urban consumers fell to 141.3 from 142.1 in January. This was the first decline since June, 1949, when it stood at 141.3.

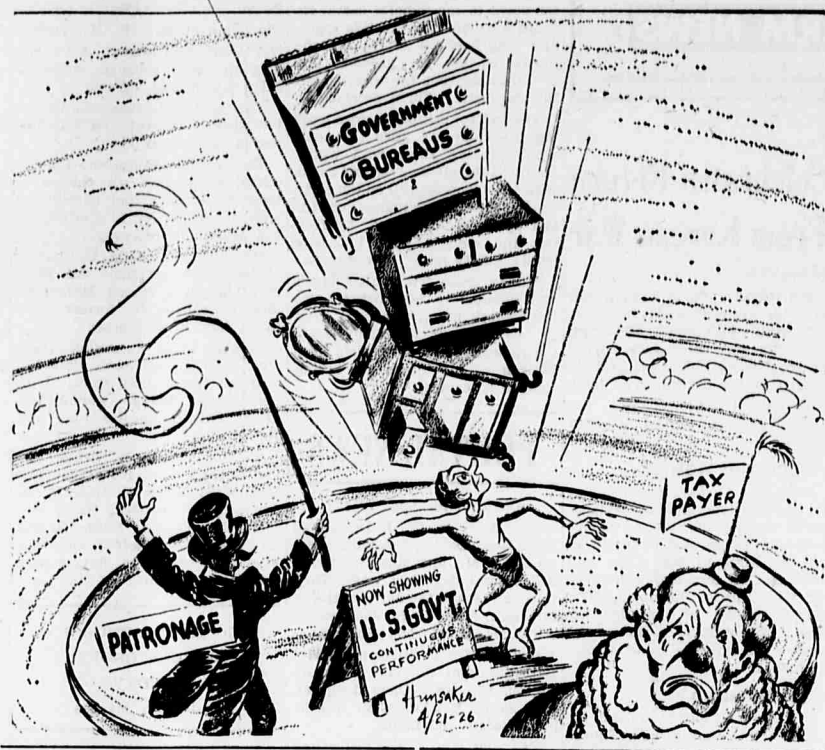

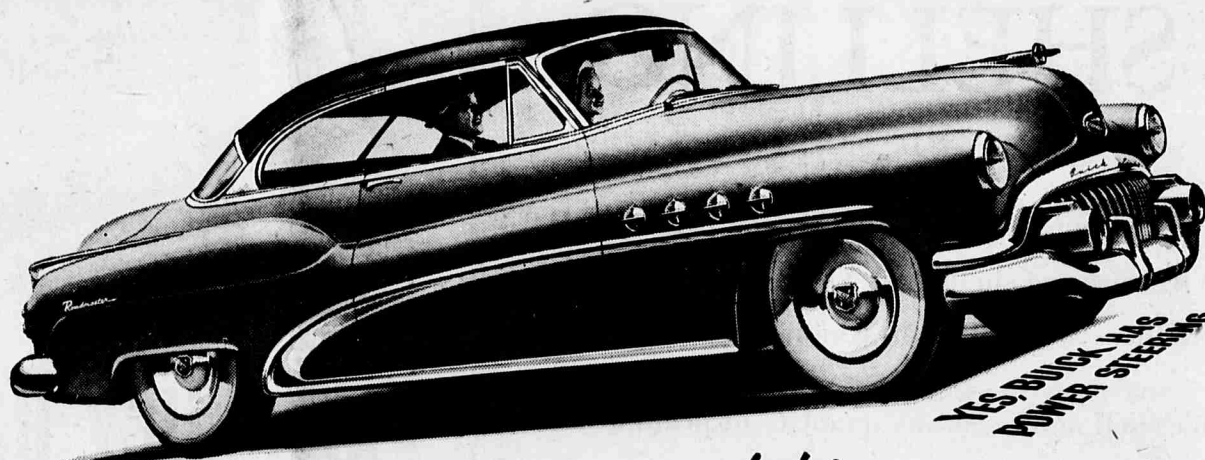

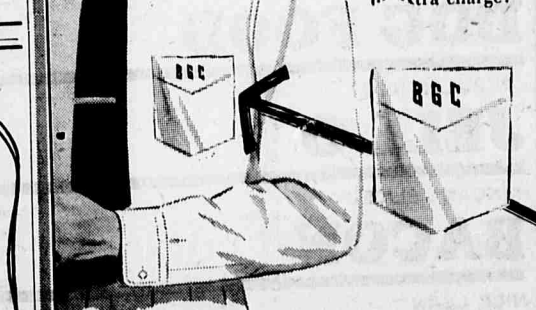

We hereby appoint Mr. Lee Brannen as N.P. and Ex-officio J.P. of the 45th G.M. District.

We, the Grand Jury, recommend that this body call upon the State Highway Department with regard to removing the traffic hazard at the intersection of Federal Routes 301, 25 and State Route 46, known as Pine Inn, in Bulloch County, Georgia, and we further recommend that a traffic control light be installed at this point.

We also recommend that a traffic control light be installed at the intersection of Federal Highway 80 and the Brooklet-Leefield Road in the town of Brooklet in Bulloch County.

We recommend to the County Commissioners that the insurance on the court house building be substantially increased.

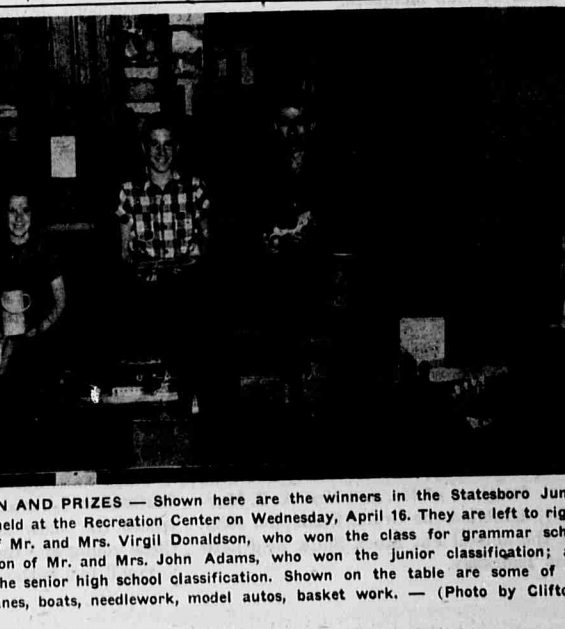
