**Rural Phone Line Needs 175 More Members at \$10**

The official approval of the rural telephone application for Bulloch county calls for 175 more members than the 550 that have deposited \$10 with the cooperative when the application was filed with REA more than a year ago.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Bulloch County Rural Telephone Cooperative, Monday, the group voted to invite the people from the Brooklet community, now being served by the Bulloch Telephone Company, to join the organization. No effort has been made to enroll this group, even though the cooperative had tentatively purchased the existing telephone company.

The group in the West Side toward Brooklet is also invited to join to help make up this needed 175 more members to procure the REA loan.

The other subscriber-owned switching lines will be enrolled prior to starting the work on the lines. This last group traded with the cooperative on the basis of a share of equity in the new system for the existing lines.

Practically all the other requirements for the loan of \$445,000, to be used for the purpose of improving telephone service in Brooklet and Portals and building 330 miles of new pole line and cable facilities and three unattended dial central offices, installing dial type telephones and providing working capital have been met.

The directors asked the cooperative's attorney, Wm. J. Neville, to spend Tuesday and Wednesday in Atlanta, Georgia, to meet with the Federal Communications Commission and the engineers procuring the data details needed to get the cooperative actually into operation.

REA is asking for \$45 per station equity eventually on the Bulloch county lines, and is suggesting residents of the county for one party, \$4.00 for two party lines, \$3.50 for four party lines, \$3.75 for multi-party lines, and \$1 for extension.

The lowest rates suggested are from \$1 to \$1.50 per station higher than the suggested residence rates.

The directors are anxious to include those that want service through the cooperative on the first contract if possible.

## T C Alumni To Dedicate East Gate; E. V. Hollis Speaks Monday

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Exercises in tribute to Dr. Herty will take place at 11:30 a. m. Saturday, May 31, near the college site where the famous Milledgeville chemist perfected the first cup and gutter for the collection of gum turpentine.

A new brick gate, costing \$1,800 and paid for by the alumni, will bear a plaque to be unveiled in testimony to Dr. Herty's work. The frame of the first tree on which a Herty Cup was placed, the "Herty Pine," will be sunk in the ground below the tablet.

The dedication will be the highlight of a schedule ending with graduation exercises at 10:30 a. m. Monday, June 2, in which Dr. Ernest V. Hollis will be the speaker.

Dr. Hollis, chief of College Administration in the Office of Education, Federal Security Agency, Washington, D. C., was president of the college from 1920 to 1926 when it was the First District Agricultural and Mechanical School and then Georgia Normal School. He was at the helm when the institution, chartered in 1908, actually became a college.

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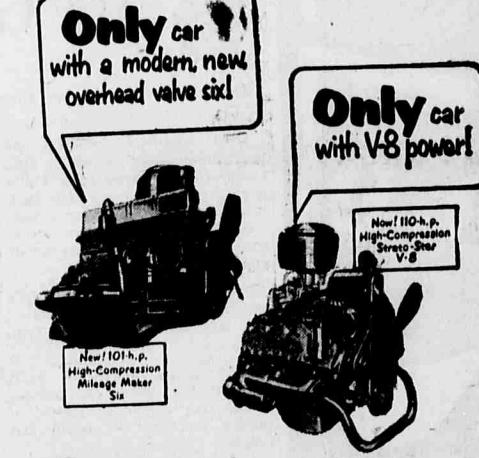

In a box and at 4 o'clock that afternoon a name will be drawn. "It's as simple as that," he said. "That person will get the \$50 bond and \$50 worth of gift certificates, for just one pint of blood."
