Roger Hagan Is Named Field Crops Champion At National 4-H Congress

A Bulloch County 4-H Club member who has won state championships in both livestock and field crops was named national winner in the field crops project at the National 4-H Club Congress held last week in Chicago. The announcement was made in Chicago on Sunday, November 30.

Roger Hagan, 18, will receive a \$300 college scholarship for winning national championship in field crops. He is attending the thirty-first National 4-H Club Congress here this week. Expenses paid—for copping the state title in field crops. He was named Georgia 4-H meat animal winner last year.

Roger now joins his twin brother, Raymond, as a Master 4-H Club member. Raymond attended the National Congress last year as state winner in tractor maintenance.

Three other Georgians were named national 4-H champions Saturday, even before the 35 club members and 11 adults left Atlanta for the annual Congress. They were Billy Davis of Lowndes County in leadership, Adrian Short of Harris County in community relations.

The national field crops champion, who rented a farm and operated it himself this year, says he will buy a farm and balance it with livestock and crops when he finishes high school in June.

On the rented farm this year he made 1,600 pounds of tobacco per acre, 1,500 pounds of peanuts a bale of cotton and 50 bushels of corn. "Good seed, liberal applications of fertilizer, recommended practices, good management, and lots of hard work are my keys to successful farming," says Roger.

This 4-H member began his club work in 1945 by joining a pig chain. The next year he bought a purebred gilt and decided to grow some of his own feed on an acre of corn. This convinced him that livestock and crops go together.

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Steve Pace Tells Farmers They Need Not Fear Farm Price Decline Now

Farmers need not fear too much the decline in farm prices during the next two years, Steve Pace, former third district congressman, stated here recently to some 500 farmers attending the annual Producers Cooperative Association meeting.

The thing that worries most is the slant given to the cost of living, indicating that farmers are getting rich at the price being paid them according to Mr. Pace. He enumerated many instances where the present cost of living is caused by the increase cost of processing, handling and retailing farm products after they leave the farmer. The data given showed that since 1948 the price of farm products have actually gone steadily downward, yet the cost of living has gone upward all that time. Even the cost of practically every item used on the farm has gone up several points during this period.

One of the last acts of the past session of congress was to make price supports mandatory at 90 per cent parity for the next two years, Mr. Pace pointed out. However, cotton farmers have literally dumped this large crop on the market this fall and put more cotton on the market than it can take. Farmers knew better, but just did not do as they knew should have been done, Mr. Pace declared.

Cattle prices will stay fairly favorable despite the heavy increase in production, just as long as so many people are gainfully employed. When 62 million people are working at good wages, they are going to eat beef steak, Mr. Pace thinks.

Farmers will have to band together into a strong farm organization and into buying and selling groups, such as the Farm Bureau and the Producers Cooperative Association, if the decline in prices is halted at a favorable level, Mr. Pace warned.

Congressman Prince H. Preston lauded local farmers for the progress they have made in recent years and stated that he did not appreciate such progress so much before he had a chance to tour some of the agricultural areas of Europe.

Delmas Rushing was renamed to the board of directors where he is serving as president, and W. H. Smith Sr., renamed as vice president.

E. L. Anderson, manager of the coop, reported that the organization did \$525,000 worth of business during the past physical year and saved above all expenses \$34,871.

This organization opened a farm supply store here in 1944 with one car load of feed bought on the credit. The group now has \$82,000 reserve built up.

C. W. Paris, Atlanta, stated that the Cotton Producers Association was working with 38 mutuals such as the one here and that the organization had grown from \$2,200 in 1933 to a net worth of \$5,272,193.19 today.

A fish fry was served to the group in the new livestock auditorium just prior to the meeting Thursday night. Mr. Pace stated that he had visited stock yards all over the nation and had not

S. H. S. Singers To Sing Xmas Carols On Public Square

Today the Statesboro Girls' Ensemble Group and the Sixth Grade Girls' Choir of the Statesboro schools, under the direction of Miss Nona Quinn, will sing at the annual Christmas Party of the Statesboro Junior Women's Club. On Tuesday of this week the Girls' Ensemble Group sang six ancient Christmas Carols at the regular meeting of the Statesboro Club. On Wednesday evening, December 10, at 7:30 o'clock the 72-voice Junior High School Choir will present an old fashioned carol service by candlelight on the court house square. Bill Bowen Inaugurated Mayor By Ordinary Frank I. Williams

In brief but solemn ceremony held in the City Hall on Tuesday morning of this week W. A. (Bill) Bowen took the oath of office as he was sworn in as the Mayor of Statesboro by Bulloch County Ordinary Frank I. Williams.

Rufus Anderson, elected councilman to succeed F. C. Parker Jr., and Inman M. Foy, elected to succeed himself, also were given the oath of office.

In the presence of the members of the Council, City Clerk J. H. Watson, and City Engineer James Bland, Mr. Williams read the oath of office.

Before Mr. Bowen was sworn in, Gilbert Cone, while still mayor, accepted Mr. Bowen's resignation as a member of the city council.

Before the new council met for the first time F. C. Parker Jr., retiring councilman, extended his congratulations and good wishes to the new Mayor and new councilmen.

Retiring Gilbert Cone made a brief statement expressing his appreciation for the cooperation he had received during the 15 years he had served the city, and his good wishes for the future of the new council.

Statesboro-Portal Youth In Ga. Youth Assembly

Six people from Statesboro were among the approximately seven hundred youth people from all over the state who attended the Y.M.C.A.'s eight Georgia Youth Assembly in Atlanta, December 4-8.

Youth senators, house representatives, press representatives and other delegates from the various counties of the state were present. The Georgia Youth Assembly is a youth legislature in which various clubs represented bills and resolutions. These bills ranged from prohibiting livestock on highways to compulsory physical education in the schools. The twenty-six house bills and sixteen senate bills were acted upon by both senate and house.

The first session of the Youth Assembly began Thursday night in the Capitol, when a roll call was made and all members took their seats. The Georgia Youth Assembly was presided over by Governor Marvin Griffin. He addressed a joint assembly which was held in the house, and was followed by Youth Governor Milton Jones, of Columbus and Youth and Government Committee Chairman Walter Thomas.

The climax of the assembly was the Annual Banquet held at the Georgia Division of the University of Georgia. Various youth people were presented awards for their outstanding work in the assembly. Dr. Charles A. Allen, pastor of the First Methodist church in Atlanta, delivered the principal address, which brought the assembly to its formal close.

Secured said the meeting between the Teachers and Georgia undoubtedly will draw a large crowd. The Teachers will have a heavy demand for tournament tickets, being dispensed by the college athletic office.

The Prof's and Georgia will play in 1955 at Statesboro, with the Prof's taking a 30-24 triumph.

On next Friday, December 19, the Teachers will meet Central College of Fayette, Mo., here.
