## H. D. Clubs Adopt Theme For 1953

"Building Better Homes with Fuller Community Life for More Democratic Living" was adopted by the Bulloch County Home Demonstration Council as their theme for 1953 at their annual program planning meeting held at the Statesboro Methodist Church on December 5. Fourteen clubs were represented.

Mrs. J. E. Rowland Jr., council secretary, presided at the meeting in the absence of Mrs. Buis, acting president.

The devotion was given by Mrs. William Smith Jr.

Mrs. Emmett Scott of the Jimpas Club was elected vice president.

Plans were presented for each club to raise one dollar for each club member on the roll.

The goals set by the council for the new year are: to set up a \$50 4-H scholarship; to increase the club membership; to promote a combination Bazaar and Chrysanthemum Show; to cooperate with the Farm Bureau and 4-H Club in a county-wide recreation program; to take a two or three day trip to Florida and to be represented at the National Home Demonstration Council in Boston; to emphasize and expand our food preservation program; to install all community officers in November; to hold an installation banquet for council officers, and project leaders; to train community project leaders through county leaders and club presidents; and to hold the following short courses as early as possible: (1) Landscaping, (2) Family Life Institute, and (3) Food Preservation.

## Bulloch County Schools Do Wonders At Christmastime

### 'Silent Night' Hymn Is Often Called Song From Heaven

"Silent Night" is often called the "Song from Heaven" because the story of its inspiration and composition is one of the most beautiful Christmas stories in existence. On December 24, 1818, in the quiet village of Heiligen, Austria, Joseph Mohr, a school teacher, was reading his Bible, there was a knock at his door. It was a peasant woman who asked the priest to visit a poor shoemaker's wife to whom a child had been born. The parents had sent her to ask the priest to come and bless the infant. Father Mohr was strangely moved by the visit to the mother. As that evening as he returned to his home saw that the dark slopes of the Alps around the village were



slight with torches of the moon-  
towers on their way to church.  
To him it was a Christmas miracle.

Later, as he tried to put down  
on paper his feeling and experi-  
ence, the words kept turning into  
verse. When dawn came he found  
he had written a poem—a beau-  
tiful and moving poem.

On Christmas Day his friend,  
Franz Xaver Gruber, music teach-  
er in the village school, composed  
music to fit the verses.

Village children heard the priest  
and teacher singing the song and  
learned it. From there it spread  
throughout the world. Today, it is  
regarded as the greatest Christ-  
mas hymn and wherever there are  
men of good will they sing:

"Silent night, holy night—  
All is calm, all is bright,  
Round you Virgin, Mother and  
Child.

Holy Infant, so tender and mild,  
Sleep in heavenly peace—  
Sleep in heavenly peace."

### Yule Tree Business Figured in Millions

CHRISTMAS TREES are a multi-million dollar business. Throughout the nation, some 15 million trees are supplied to the holiday demand. Prices range from \$1 to \$5, and that adds up to a real money.

A Christmas tree, in the lake states, is usually a balsam or a spruce. The same is true in New England and the Appalachian section. Elsewhere in the country, virtually all kinds of evergreens are used.

The lodgepole pine and Douglas fir are frequently used in Colorado. On the Pacific coast, it is principally Douglas fir.

In Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D. C., a scrub pine takes a trimming.

In other localities, white pine, southern pine, hemlock, red and white cedar and redwood are used.

The business of harvesting this annual crop begins in the fall, when cutters go into the woods after trees. It continues as trucks bring huge loads to metropolitan markets.

Many land owners manage their swamps to make them yield a crop of trees year after year. Thinning operations are another source of Yule trees.

Farmers have discovered that they can get a cash crop from eroded acres by harvesting Christmas trees 10 or 15 years after they are planted.

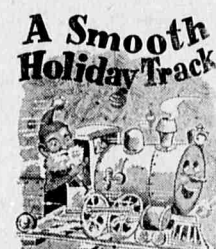

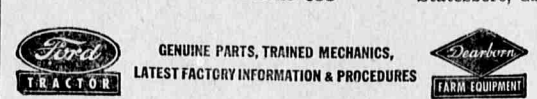

## Georgia Has Bright Future As Youth Run State Legislature

The administration of government affairs is destined to be in capable hands within a few short years. That is, if knowledge and experience are to be determining factors. Last week, December 4-7, approximately seven hundred of Georgia's finest young people, all members of State Hi-Y's and Tri-Hi-Y's, met in Atlanta to attend the Y.M.C.A.'s eighth Annual Georgia Youth Assembly. They had one purpose in mind: learn how our state legislature operates, try to understand its problems, seek solutions toward better government, and to get some experience in conducting a legislative body. How well they succeeded will be revealed only as time marches on.

The interesting feature of this assembly is that the various Youth senators, representatives and committeemen took over the State Capitol and actually organized into a legislative body comparable to the State Legislature. Various representative clubs presented bills and resolutions, which ranged from prohibiting livestock on highways to compulsory physical education in the schools. And all bills were acted upon by both house and senate. The fact that there were twenty-six house and senate bills indicates that the members of the assembly were not idle during their stay in Atlanta.

The first session of the Youth Assembly began Thursday night in the Capitol, when a roll call was

made and all members took their respective places in the house or senate. The members were already beginning to take over the mantle of government with a seriousness that reflected real statesmanship. Their appreciation of their responsibility was noticed in their response to Lt. Governor Marvin Griffin, who addressed a joint assembly which was held in the house. He was followed by Youth Governor Milton Jones, Columbus, and Youth and Government Committee Chairman Walter Thomas, who handled their offices like veterans.

An almost perfect illustration of youth's interest in important things and its appreciation of responsibility could be seen Friday morning when the real work of the assembly began. There was no delay. The reading of various bills began promptly at nine o'clock and lasted until five o'clock in the afternoon. It was a day filled with parliamentary procedure, hotly contested debate as the different members fought for the passage of their bills. Amendments were made, resolutions were presented, and pages set a new record for speed as they ran from House to Senate. The climax of the assembly was the Annual Banquet held at the Atlanta Division of the University of Georgia, and here the young people were as perfectly poised and in complete command of the occasion as they were at the Capitol. The officials of the State Y.M.C.A. had already recognized some of the fine work that had been done, and various young people were presented awards for their outstanding accomplishments during the assembly. When Dr. Charles A. Allen, pastor of the Grace Methodist Church in Atlanta, delivered the principal address which brought the assembly to its formal close, he spoke to a group of young people who were serious in speech, serious in thought, serious in deeds, and serious in their desire and ambition to contribute something worth while to the present and succeeding generations.

The Youth Assembly is an annual affair sponsored by the State Y.M.C.A. which has won and merited nation-wide recognition for its beneficial and worthwhile contribution to the youth of our state. Statesboro has placed considerable emphasis on the proper development of its youth. The fact that it has followed through on its slogan "Our Investment In Our Youth Is Our Voice In The Future" has definitely paid off. Statesboro's delegation, which participated in all phases of the assembly, was proud to represent "Georgia's Champion Home Town," the winner of first place in the Georgia Power Company's Champion Home Town Contest. Its representatives included Jimmy Bland, senator; Jimmy Brown and Betty Young, house representatives; Lucy Melton and Wyman Hendrix, house committeemen; June Carr, press representative; and Miss Martha Toole, science teacher of the Statesboro High School of the Statesboro Tri-Hi-Y.

Portal High School delegates included Shelby Jean Griffith, Grayson Oliff and Donald Sparks, house representatives; Eunice Griffith, press representative; and John Wheeler, advisor.

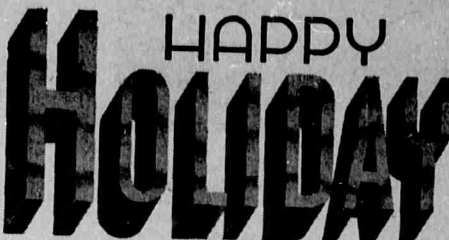

## Joel Poinsett, U.S. Statesman, Noted for Flower

Although he was a brilliant statesman, and the friend of four American presidents, Joel Roberts Poinsett is famous chiefly because he introduced the Mexican plant known as the "Painted Leaf", of "Mexican Fire Plant" into the United States.

Poinsett, then U.S. ambassador to Mexico, called the plant to the attention of American botanists and grew the plant himself as a hobby at his South Carolina home, after he left Mexico.

The plant grew heavily in American favor—especially popular at Christmas time—and was renamed poinsettia, in honor of the man who brought it to this country.

Contrary to popular impression, the flaming red bracts of the poinsettia are not flowers, but leaves, and it is for these bracts that the plants are grown.

It is possible to have variations of either pink or white varieties, as well as of the more usual red, popular because it carries out the holiday color scheme of rich bright red with a contrast of the dark green of the leaves.

The beautiful poinsettia, almost a "must" as far as Christmas decorating is concerned, is one of the most temperamental of plants.

The poinsettia thrives in its native Mexico, but elsewhere must be handled carefully—perhaps pampered slightly. However, the brilliantly colored flowers it has at Christmas time is reward enough for any efforts needed to make the plant thrive.

Constant warmth is needed by poinsettias. Temperatures should be kept between 70 and 80 degrees during the day and no less than 65 degrees at night. Any sudden change in temperature and drafts will cause the plant to drop its leaves.

Abundant water is also a necessity, but it should be applied but once a day so that the plant may become moderately dry between waterings. This permits needed oxygen to reach the roots.

Try to give the poinsettia the sunniest spot available. It is wise to fertilize it occasionally with a good commercial food tablet.

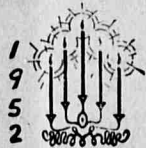

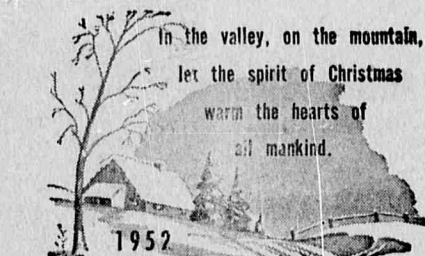
