The volume of business and we recommend that our commission give immediate study to providing some relief for this overcrowded condition, even if it is necessary to add to the floor space of the court house building.

"We were requested by Judge Renfro to visit the jail, and we recall that many previous grand juries have recommended that conditions at the jail be remedied but only makeshift measures have been taken with the result that it is now the studied opinion of this grand jury that the present jail quarters are inadequate, unsafe, unsanitary and really a disgrace to our county. We further feel that it would be unwise to spend

any money in repairing this out-of-date building and urgently request our commissioners also to give immediate study towards construction of a new jail for Bulloch County.

"In studying our court house property and since it appears necessary for some new construction to be undertaken it is strongly recommended by this Grand Jury that proper public restroom facilities be provided for both white and colored citizens.

"We received J. P. Books from the 1523rd 47th and 1575th Districts and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, find them in good order. "At this time we desire to express the appreciation, not only of the grand jurors, but the people of our county, to Mrs. Fred W. Hodges for the splendid manner in which she took over and handled the affairs of our county and the splendid condition in which the new commissioner finds our county affairs.

"We thank Judge J. L. Renfro for his able and enlightening charge to us and we also wish to thank the Solicitor General, Walter Usher, for his able and prompt assistance in presenting matters to our body.

We recommend that Mrs. Minnie Lee Johnson be paid \$5.00 for services rendered to us in writing up these presentments.

"We recommend that these presentments be published in the County papers at the usual cost."

Elementary School. Proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud at that time.

The work consists of: Two new white Elementary School Buildings, Piney Woods Elementary School, located North of Statesboro and West of North Main Street, on lands formerly owned by Walter Aldred and Cotton Patch Elementary School located at the corner of Jones Avenue and Gentry Road, Statesboro, Georgia. These new buildings contain classrooms, toilet rooms, boiler rooms, janitor's quarters, lounges, and corridors. They also contain a combination cafeteria and assembly with kitchen facilities.

Type of construction will be concrete slab on ground with asphalt tile, masonry walls, and steel columns supporting steel roof beams with built "T" and composite floor decking. The roof will be 20 year built up; windows commercial project; steel shall be with oil fired boilers and a hot water distribution system to control and unit heaters.

There will be four separate proposals covering this work. Proposal No. 1 will be for the building covering the work at Piney Woods. Proposal No. 2 will be for the building covering the work at Cotton Patch. Proposal No. 3 will be for the combined work at both schools. Proposal No. 4 will be for a bid covering the combined work at both schools, excepting that the execution of grading, footings, brickwork, etc., at one site and the other. The premise is that by not duplicating in their entirety specific operations, that economy can be effected to the Owner although one job would not be finally completed at the same time as the other.

Let's Revive Our Blood Program

THE BLOODMOBILE will be here on Tuesday, March 3, for its regular visit. There is a general lack of interest in our Blood Program here in Bulloch County.

It came very near breaking down altogether. The response of the blood donors at each visit of the Bloodmobile has dwindled to the point where the Board of Directors of the Bulloch County Chapter of the American Red Cross had seriously considered abandoning the program and let our citizens who needed blood get it as best they could.

Several meetings of the directors were held to analyze the program, to find what was undermining it, to try to learn what was happening to the program.

The directors were determined to save the program. It is important that it be saved. It is important that it be bolstered up. It is important that it be successful. From July, 1952, through December, 1952, Bulloch County contributed to the Regional Blood Center 95 pints of blood on three visits of the Bloodmobile.

If we were to have contributed what we should have as our fair share in the

Blood Program we should have contributed 375 pints.

During the same period we used in our local hospital 293.5 pints of whole blood, drawn from the Regional Blood Center—into which we had placed only 95 pints.

The Elks Club of Statesboro has accepted the responsibility of securing blood donors for the March 3 visit of the Bloodmobile.

They are taking up the challenge on behalf of the citizens of Bulloch County.

They are determined to help save the Blood Program for Bulloch County. But there's more to it than just the determination to save the Blood Program in Bulloch County.

There's a crying need for blood—not only here in our local hospital—but our fighting men in Korea still need blood.

Now, there is need for more blood, beyond that needed for the armed forces, for local needs, to produce gamma globulin, a product of blood which has been discovered can be used to prevent paralysis of polio.

To meet this new responsibility we here in Bulloch County must revive our will to help.

We've got a little more than three weeks to make up our mind to meet this responsibility.

Haste Makes Waste

A MAN OF ATLANTA struggled home the other afternoon in the midst of the 5 o'clock traffic. He shoved in ahead of other people. He slammed his bumper almost against the bumper in front, preventing anyone else from easing in line. He glowered at those people stranded on a side road who inched forward, trying to find a place in the traffic. He swung in and out of lanes and muttered at drivers who blew their horns in protest.

He whirled into his driveway and spun his car into the garage. He stalked into the house and spurned the wagging dog. He forgot to kiss his wife. He went straight to the cupboard and poured a big drink.

That night he got to wondering. Beginning the next afternoon, he tried an experiment.

For a week he followed the same slambang tactics, risking his automobile and his life, ignoring the rights and the needs of other people. He totaled up his travel time and divided it by the number of days. He found that his average for getting home was 22 minutes and 19 seconds.

The next day he allowed the frantic people—as he has been—to pass him. He held back courteously and permitted other drivers, who also wanted to get home to slide into the line ahead of him. He held to his own lane and nodded pleasantly to a man who swung close to him.

He drove into his garage and strolled in to his house. He patted his dog. He kissed his wife. He ate an apple.

For a week he drove according to this plan. His average time—22 minutes and 19 seconds.—The Atlanta Journal.

DOWN BY THE PACIFIC

Tonight, I am at Puntarones, down on the Pacific side of Costa Rica.

"Puntarones," in good Bulloch County English, means "Bumpy Point" and "THAT" is just what it is.

It is a town of some six to eight thousand population depending upon the day and the hours in which the census is taken, along with other variable factors.

Everywhere there are CHILDREN, CHILDREN, and many more according to Costa Rican customs, have their passports and shipping orders and will be arriving according to schedule.

Puntarones resembles Key West, Florida, long before ANY President ever THOUGHT of making it the site of "The Winter White House," or before the "Fair Deal" or the "New Deal" or even before the "Square Deal." It's streets are paved with only the sand which the Pacific placed here during ages past.

I am domiciled at "Gran Hotel Los Baños" (the baths). It resembles, I imagine, the main hotel in Key West in the year 1860.

Puntarones is located on the nail of a long finger of sand which sticks out in the ocean for about ten miles. If the process of shifting sands due to ocean waves continues in its present direction and speed, it will soon be an island unless man "takes the waves by the horns" and turns them in the opposite direction.

Puntarones is entitled to FAME for at least ONE fact if for no other. It is the ONE PLACE of which I have any personal acquaintance in which the High School Principal REALLY RUNS the town. It happens thus:

The town has only ONE bank. The Bank of Costa Rica. During the day he manages the bank. The high school is in session ONLY at NIGHT from 6 to 10. He DIRECTS that since he directs the money and the children of the community, he is, therefore, the "voice of the nation" in two very important aspects. He speaks with REAL authority. Because of this fact, my associates and I were the beneficiaries of some courtesies not

accorded to ALL visitors. One of these courtesies was a trip of interest and beauty on the government launch in the waters round about the city. I was delighted that Jorge Gavia, principal of the high school, was also manager of the bank and the BIG MAN of the community in general.

While on this trip we saw a number of items of interest. Many derelict boats which had been towed in and firmly anchored on shore and with reason.

"Coffee is King" and comes next to a section where sugar cane and rice are produced. It is now harvested for both of those crops.

The cane was being ground and "dule" (molds much the size and form of the butter molds which mothers used to make after churning) was being made. Practically the same forms and machinery are used for this "dule" making as were used in Mississippi during my boyhood days some sixty years ago at what we called "the sorghum mill."

With the exception that these mills are permanently located while our mills were moved from farm to farm. The rice is being cut by hand sickles and threshed one hand full at a time. These are the same methods which were in use when the beautiful Moabitish Widow, Ruth, the daughter-in-law of David, went to glean in the fields of Boaz and using subtle wiles known, only to women, of "hooking a husband."

After passing from the cane and rice section, we came next to an orange and papaya section. All of us are familiar with the orange production in which Florida excels but the "papaya" is something little known to us in the states, at least it was to me. The fruit is about the size of a cantaloupe with a smoky rind. It grows on a beautiful annual (I think) which resembles a cactus bean stalk and is about two or three times as large. At the village of "Naranjo" which means "orange tree," when the train stopped for a few minutes, the train was suddenly invaded by an army of young fruit vendors, offering oranges and

Statesboro and Bulloch County are looking forward to the new school buildings with eagerness. The interesting thing about this whole new business is how much it reminds one of the construction of a new home. Immediately a new home builder begins to think about what is going into a new home, what furniture can be slipped covered and what should really be disposed of are among the questions raised.

So it is with the builders of the new schools. Parents and teachers are asking themselves, "What are we going to take into our new buildings?" In answer to one question it seems that a great many mothers and teachers feel that we need very much to take into these new schools. Not a P.T.A. whose primary purpose is money-raising, but a P.T.A. whose one purpose is to help all others, to the welfare of the children, that welfare to include each and every child's emotional, physical, mental, and spiritual life.

This interest in the school in the organization of a P.T.A. with such a purpose is in evidence at a meeting recently when mothers and teachers sat all the way from the front to the back of the High School auditorium. One question came up at this time in connection with parents. Should the fathers be considered parents?

Well, actually, the question was whether or not the meetings should be at night when the fathers could come. There were some who felt that fathers should be given the great privilege of working for our children and with our children's teachers. These same fathers would definitely strengthen a P.T.A.

While the parents are showing such enthusiasm in the new plans for new schools, so are the teachers. At a recent meeting of the county association of teachers, divided into small groups, discussed the advancement of the schools. They reviewed the philosophy of education, the ideal school, the ideal children, and the ideal teacher. In doing this it was a simple matter for the individual teacher to compare herself and her school with the ideals upon which all agreed. Although all present were in agreement that the attainment of some ideals are impossible, especially in over-crowded classrooms, they were unanimous in the opinion that the new buildings would open avenues of advancement in the work of the teachers and in the lives of the children.

But with all the planning and evaluation that is going on among the teachers, with the meeting to strengthen the work of the P.T.A., the most heartening sign of all is the interest of the parents.

No matter how fine a school building we have, or how well-prepared the faculty, or how rich the wealth of children, all these must have behind them a corps of deeply interested and actively participating parents. For a truly successful school program, parents, teachers, and pupils must plan it and work it through together.

So as into a new home, the owner-occupants try to take with them only the useful and attractive fittings of the old home, so are we builders of our new schools trying to weigh, measure, and value what it is that will go into the new buildings.

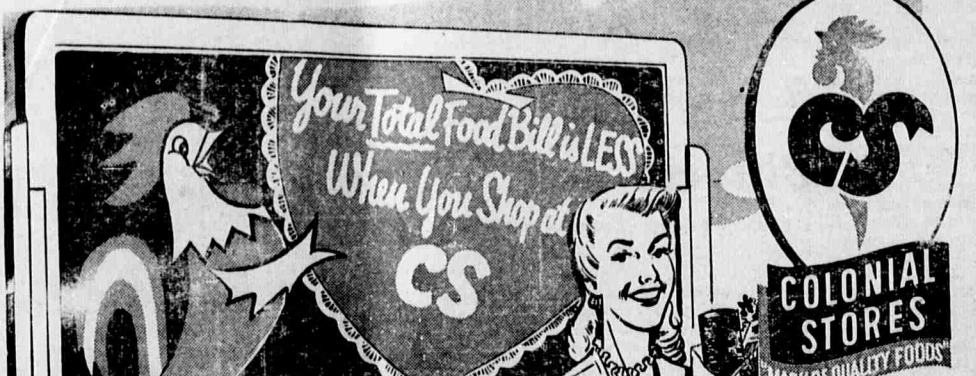
