Mr. Kelstad was awarded a silver plaque in recognition of his services as chairman of the National Red Cross. The accompanying citation paid tribute to his part in "directing the blood donor service which provided over 13,000,000 pints of blood for the armed forces during World War II. It added that "Mr. Kelstad's ideal of a blood and blood derivatives program for all the people has inspired not only millions of other volunteers within the American Red Cross, but has had a marked effect on the development of facilities to make blood available through other groups."

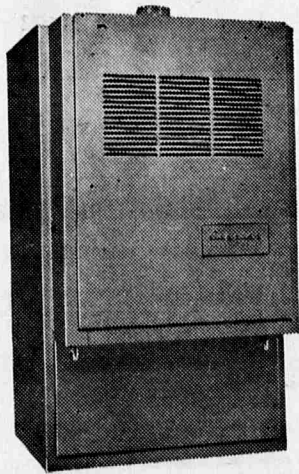

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Forestry News

With Bulloch county in the midst of its dangerous fire season, preparations have been made to have its fire fighting equipment in top shape. With the unit's facilities at full strength, the fire suppression equipment includes: three 1/4-ton Jeeps equipped with pumps, one two hundred-fifty gallon water truck, one crawler tractor with fire suppression pump, and one pick-up truck with a tank and pressure pump.

In addition to the Arcadia, Nevils, and Hilltop towers which have been in operation for several years, a new tower has been constructed between Jimps and Pine Run for the protection of the forest lands in the western section of Bulloch county.

To keep pace with the ever increasing importance of fire control, an airplane has been engaged to assist the towers in Bulloch and Screven counties to report fires. The "spotter" plane will fly only when the fire danger is reasonably high and when there is danger in control fires becoming wild.

Ranger Roberts of the Bulloch County Forestry Unit would like to congratulate everyone on the wonderful cooperation that has been given in preventing and also in the actual suppression of fires. With this continued cooperation for the next few months, Bulloch county should have the best fire record since the organization was first begun.

Most of the insecticide fertilizers are now preparing the insecticide fertilizers and it can be bought through the regular dealers.

Most of the insecticide fertilizers being made up in this area will contain chlorodane or DDT. However, some other fertilizer mixtures such as dieldrin, aldrin, and heptachlor are approved for non-crop use only.

On the average row crop Mr. Whitehead recommended that farmers use one-half per cent mixture of DDT or one-fourth per cent mixture of chlorodane. For tobacco and other crops where a large amount of fertilizer per acre is used, he recommends that this ratio be reduced to 50 per cent. Some
