





## A weapon against death

The Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on Highways, generally referred to as the Uniform Traffic Code, has been signed by Governor Talmadge.

This week we received a copy of the act as it was passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor.

A lot of work went into the act before it was adopted. A lot of the hopes of the citizens of Georgia are wrapped up in it—hopes for safer highways in our state; hopes for more lives saved on the highways of our state.

And if the act is properly observed, administered and enforced a lot of these hopes will be realized.

But if the act is not properly observed, administered, and enforced, the Code becomes mere words printed on a page and bound into a book and recorded in the laws of our state.

To the average automobile driver, the driver who tries to be careful, who abides by, and observes the traffic laws and safety practices, the principal change in the law is the increasing of the speed limit to 60 miles per hour in the daytime and 50 miles per hour at night instead of "round-the-clock 55 mile per hour limit. But you have about two months before you can move up to the new speed limits.

To us the most important potential weapon against death riding our highways and streets is Article V, "Driving While Intoxicated, and Reckless Driving." Here is subdivision "d" of that section which reads:

"Every person who is convicted of a violation of this section shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than 10 days nor more than 12 months, or by fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$200.00 or by both such fine and imprisonment."

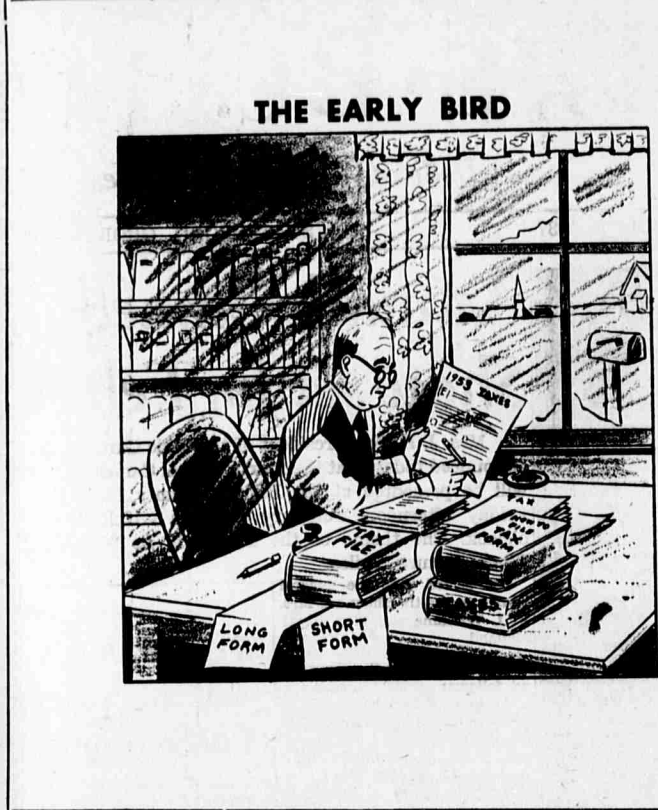
