Ogeechee Farm Bureau to hold corn contest again for 1954

Members of the Ogeechee Farm Bureau planned to continue their corn contest for 1954 and try to get enough in the cotton contest to make it more interesting to compete in.

The Ogeechee group decided to meet Tuesday, March 16, for house cleaning and some yard work around the old school building now being used as a community center. Frank Proctor, their president, asked the group to get there around 9 a. m. and be prepared to do lots of work for several hours.

The ladies stated they would clean the inside of the building if the men would take care of the outside work.

Mr. Proctor announced that the queen and talent contest would be held at their April meeting and named Mrs. I. V. Simmons as chairman of the committee to handle the program.

The Warnock group scheduled their queen and talent contest for April also at their meeting Wednesday night. Mrs. Eunice Turner was in charge of the program. Bill H. Simmons Jr., their president, stated.

Charlie Deal, the Warnock community committee member, urged those that were not planting their cotton allotments to turn them back to the county A.S.C. office so that the allotments could be given others in the county this year. He pointed out that the allotments would not be released but for the one year and would go back to the original owner in 1955.

Mr. Deal read a letter from H. L. Wingate, president of the Georgia Farm Bureau, asking the cotton growers that did not want to plant their cotton to cooperate in this move, pointing out that if Bulloch county and Georgia did not plant their allotments now they would gradually move westward to growers that would plant them.

Following a series of songs by the entire group, Mrs. Turner called for 11 men and 11 women to help her with a program at Warnock. She had placed lists of various activities in a hat for these 22 people to draw and then they were to do as the strip of paper said. The activities included singing, dancing, jokes and numerous other ideas that would make the audience laugh.

The Sinkhole group voted to have their piano tuned, rather

to pay for it being tuned. Delmar Rushing had already procured someone to tune it and the group was just to pay for the job.

Jim H. Strickland, vice president of the Sinkhole group, announced that the community queen and talent program would also be in April. Mrs. Strickland is associated women chairman of the group and will have charge of the program this year.

The group discussed every phase of farm activity that is seasonal in a round-table group manner.

At the three meetings last week the place of hogs in the present farm program and type of hogs that will be demanded when hogs become plentiful again were discussed. A new bulletin on hog production in Georgia was given those present.

The systems of fumigating tobacco land were reviewed also at these meetings. There seems to be more interest in this new practice than normal right now.

The groups last week generally reported a shortage of tobacco plants for 1954, except for the Sinkhole. Mr. Strickland stated that they could not get the tobacco in the community with the plants they had but he did not know if there would be any surplus plants for other areas. Probable fewer beds were sown last winter than in several years and then, too, mild mold has been extremely severe during the past two weeks.

The Sinkhole group says yet that tobacco growers can grow their own plants and be sure of good plants when they want them, if they are willing to put out the time, effort and money to do the job. They should know what they are talking about, since they have their own plants year in and year out. The group as a whole usually sell some of the best tobacco that goes to market.
