For some people, turning over our town to the youth would be a calamity. But to us, somehow, we feel it might not be such a bad thing. We believe in our youth. We believe they're getting better and better, day by day.

Certainly this youth program sponsored by the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. is a wonderful thing. It gives young folks an opportunity to see just how elections are held and afterwards the elected ones can experience the real thing by sitting in court, and later being shown the whole workings of the city.

If all this could be accomplished it would seem we'd never have to fear an enemy. Isn't it true that old saying, that governments fall because of the rottenness from within, rather than the enemy without.

We think the "Y" has done a fine job in instigating this Youth's Day in our school. We hope it will continue and broaden as it does.

Congratulations "Young People!" We're voting and betting on your doing a fine job in running this great country of ours in a few short years. We trust you'll do a better job than our generation has done.

We believe that our city fathers received an inspiration from watching our youth that day. We believe that they became more conscious of their responsibility to our community and our youth by having been associated with them during that day.

And so all Statesboro benefits. It was a wonderful experience for us all.
