Parents of children in the  
Statesboro schools met with

Mr. Caughran explained that  
musical training is available for  
children in Statesboro in the  
school band. He pointed out  
that the child who learns to  
play an instrument learns  
discipline, cooperation with  
others, and a new way to a  
fuller, richer life. An instru-  
ment automatically places him  
in worthwhile school activities;  
it gives him something interest-  
ing, pleasurable and worth-  
while to do during his leisure  
time.

He stated that arrangements  
have been made to aid students  
to obtain musical instruments  
on a three months' rental  
plan. He explained that any  
instrument may be chosen and  
tried for three months. At the  
end of that time it may be re-  
turned without further obliga-  
tion, or it is decided to keep  
it, the balance is paid.

He explained that each stu-  
dent will receive supervised re-  
hearsals each week at school  
for fee. If the student does  
not wish to take private  
lessons the cost will be \$1 for  
30 minutes. This rate is set  
by the school system he ex-  
plained.
