The Georgia Teachers College Professors set 30 new records on the hardwood during the 1954-55 basketball season. In all probability, this is the most records set by a GTC team in the history of the college.

One record which is practically unheard of (except at GTC) is in the double-figure scoring of the starting five. Chester Webb, Doug Curry, Don Wallen, "Bo" Warren, and Garland Campbell.

Records broken in the regular department numbered five; shooting, six; individual career, four; season records, eight; and one game record, seven.

These records along with some others are listed below. Those statistics were compiled by Joe Axelson, sports columnist for the Georgia-Ann, and publicity director for the athletic department.

The Natural Gas System Revenue Anticipation Certificates proposed to be issued for the above stated purpose shall not constitute a debt against the City of Statesboro and the City shall not exercise the power of taxation for the purpose of paying the principal and interest of any such Certificates issued, and the said principal of and interest on the Certificates so issued shall be payable solely from the revenue produced by the gas system.

What's Happened to the Passengers?
Obviously they are not riding the Central of Georgia passenger trains Nos. 1 and 2 between Savannah and Macon. As a result, these trains are being operated at a dead loss to the Central—losses which amounted to \$44,756.43 out-of-pocket during 1954.

This railroad should not be required to continue losing money at an increasing rate when the wasted funds are so urgently needed—for the maintenance of services that are used, and for further industrial development of our great Southeast.

Consequently, we have petitioned the Georgia Public Service Commission to discontinue operation of trains Nos. 1 and 2. Discontinuance of these trains would in no way affect the other services offered by Central. Drought in Bulloch keeping farm Operators from beginning Crops
The extended drought in Bulloch county is keeping the farmers from starting off the year with the normal spirit they usually show when pitching the new crop.

Farmers always start off the new crop in good spirits and expect to make a bumper crop. They are the most optimistic group around in the spring. Not so this year. It's still too dry to get stands.

About three weeks ago saw most farmers in Bulloch county getting all worked up over the warm weather and planting a lot of corn, cotton and soybeans. This has all stopped now. The ground is too dry to plant. Small tractors can't pull the planting equipment through the dry soil. The crops planted are coming up in a very poor stand.

A lot of tobacco plants are ready and some are being set, but they are not living well enough to continue transplanting.

Some wells are drying up. However, every farmer that can, and does not have one, is drilling a deep well. There are 820 to 830 farm ponds in the county for irrigation purposes, but about 85 per cent of these are either dry or have too little water in them for use.

The three rains this year helped a lot. Land generally broke about the best it has in several years. Things are looking better. The 2.04 inches of rain up with the 4.04 inches in January as against a normal of only 3.01 inches. Then came February with only 1.65 inches of rain against a normal of 3.91 for that month. Now March is nearly gone without any rain at all against a normal of 3.80 inches.

Some discussion is going on about grouping with nearby counties and trying for a "rain-maker." C. J. DiSanto, Water Resources Development Corporation, Denver, Colorado, indicated he would meet with a group in Claxton Wednesday, March 30, at 10 a. m. and again in a mass meeting that afternoon at 2 p. m.

Bulloch county retail sales for year 1954 total \$17,634,419

Final totals on retail sales in Bulloch county for the year of 1954 show a decline of \$1,415,355 from the total retail sales for the year 1953.

Last year retail sales were \$17,634,419. Total sales for 1953 were \$19,049,774.

December, 1954 sales, including the Christmas figures for the county amounted to \$1,659,397. December, 1953 sales were \$1,782,781, and \$123,384 more than 1954.

These figures were compiled from figures furnished by the Georgia State Chamber of Commerce and based on monthly sales tax records of the State Department of Revenue.

cations from an old kite maker and flyer himself:

Light wood one-fourth inch by three-eighths inch will do. Make the vertical rib 35 inches long, and the cross stick 30 inches. Bind the center of the cross stick to the vertical stick about eight inches from the top. Notch the four stick ends, and outline the kite frame with string, making sure the two sticks are at right angles. A good grade of light paper is for the best covering. Cut it to shape, allowing a two-inch overlap. Use one inch of the overlap for pasting over the string frame. The other inch is for looseness; the kite will fly better if the paper is not too tight.

Bow the cross stick four to six inches in the middle, and tie a string across to hold the bow. Then place the kite face down with the bow string beneath and the kite humped up. Tie a bridge string on to the bottom of the vertical rib, and make it 49 and one-half inches long. Punch holes in the paper on each side of the vertical rib five inches from its top end, and tie the other end of the bridge string about 16 inches from the end that is fastened to the upper part of the vertical rib. For the tail, use four or five feet of narrow, lightweight rag strips tied together. Fasten the tail to the bottom of the vertical rib.

If the flying string is attached too high on the bridge, or the tail is too short, or the kite is lopsided, it may dive to the ground when once up. You'll have to experiment and repair. No doubt, junior will consider you a hero when that kite is up

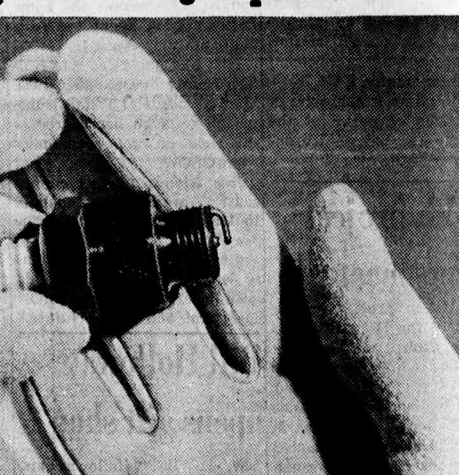

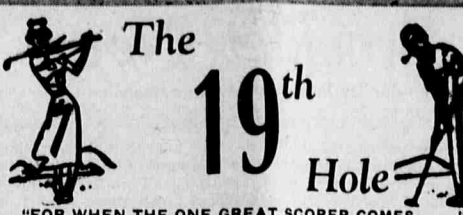

FERTILIZER FOR GARDENS

Georgia gardening specialists recommend a 4-8-8 or 5-10-10 fertilizer as one that will give excellent results with most vegetables. Commercial fertilizer, as a rule should be applied prior to planting or when the crops are planted. A good practice is to plow the land, spread half the fertilizer on a pall or with a fertilizer distributor, then harrow the soil two to three times to get it in proper condition and at the same time mix the fertilizer with it.

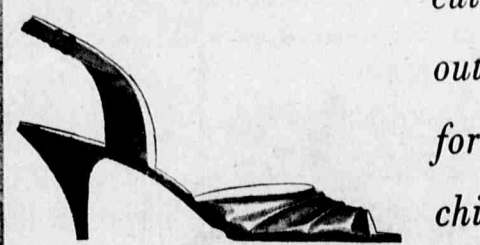

Time to sign for polio shots running short

Time is running out for parents who have not signed request forms for polio shots for their children in the first and second grades. Write April 12 as the date for word from the University of Michigan on results of last year's Salk polio vaccine trials. Dr. T. F. Sellers, director of Public Health, has urged parents to sign these forms and return them to all schools in the county.

The report is favorable and the shots are given, only children for whom forms have been received will get the vaccine. Plans call for a series of three shots, and Dr. Sellers said it is especially important for parents to know that children must have all three in order to benefit from any of them, remembering, of course, that the immunizations are NOT compulsory, but absolutely voluntary, at the part of the parents.

In Georgia, only first and second graders will get the polio vaccine shots free in the statewide inoculation program. Supply of the vaccine is limited and these children are more susceptible to polio than older children.

Some parents have asked why third grade children in Georgia will not receive the vaccine as they are doing in 44 other states. Dr. Sellers said these other states took part in the field trials last year, with some children receiving the real vaccine.

Since some last-minute cases of polio occurred in Georgia last year, the tests were called off in this state. Therefore, no third graders will receive free vaccine this year.

There is absolutely no question of the safety of the vaccine. Dr. Sellers said. The only question remaining is whether it will prevent paralytic polio. If the answer is YES, the federal government will immediately license the vaccine for distribution.

Vaccine will be supplied free to the Health Department by the National Polio Foundation, and is paid by the March of Dimes. William Perry, Georgia representative for the foundation, said limited quantities of vaccine will be available immediately to parents for their private physicians for children other than first and second graders.
