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Get new drivers licenses July 1

Beginning July 1, Georgians who do not now have drivers' licenses will have to pay fees to get them.

The new fees for those who have the free drivers' licenses at present will not go into effect until next year, the State Patrol said. All present licenses will expire this year. Motorists will have from January 2 until March 31, 1956, to pay fees and get the new licenses.

Those who have licenses now will not have to take examinations for renewal. The first examinations under the 1955 law requiring examinations every five years will not be held until 1960.

The fees for the drivers' licenses, as approved by the recent session of the Legislature, are \$2 for chauffeur's license; \$1 for operator's license; 50 cents for wife and 25 cents for child.
