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## Survey shows Fluoridation saves teeth

Dramatic new proof has recently been added to the already proven story of fluoridation—the process of reducing tooth decay two-thirds by adding small amounts of fluoride to a public water supply.

Many communities in Georgia and the nation have been waiting for final results on two ten-year surveys in New York and Michigan before going ahead with programs of their own. These surveys are now completed, the results are good and communities should feel perfectly safe in going ahead with fluoridation, says Dr. John Christy, director of dental health for the Georgia Department of Public Health.

Bruswick and Moultrie, Georgia, he added, have natural fluoride in their water and have been proving for years the benefits of fluoridation. The Fulton County Board of Health, recently recommended fluoridation of the Atlanta water supply as a way to provide better teeth for future generations.

The two ten-year surveys were conducted in Newburgh and Kingston, New York and in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

In 1945, Kingston and Newburgh were both without fluoridation. Newburgh added fluoride to the public water supply in 1946, Kingston added amounts of one part of fluoride

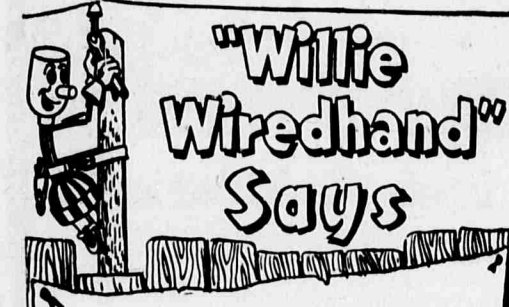

The 1955 tobacco market got under way this morning with first sales at the New Statesboro Tobacco Warehouse and Farmers Tobacco Warehouse. The first basket sold at the New Statesboro Tobacco Warehouse belonged to Rhett Lockie of Trion, S. C. It weighed 114 pounds and brought 60 cents a pound. The first row of 55 baskets averaged 51.75 cents per pound, with 19 baskets bringing 60 cents. The top price on the first row was 61 cents. According to one of the warehouse operators all the tobacco sold up to about 9 a. m. this morning was 100 per cent first curings, all first primings, with no leaf tobacco sold. He added that the major part of the tobacco was selling for just a few cents more than the government support price.

\$74,673,441.11 for 209,134,260 pounds of tobacco is an impressive figure for the 27 years the Statesboro Tobacco Market has been in operation.

From only 2,306,288 pounds of the golden weed which sold the first year of the market here in 1928 for \$248,246.07 to 20,181,100 pounds sold here in 1953, the market's best year, for \$9,380,362.00 is a big increase.

The Statesboro market hit the big time in 1946 when it sold 14,670,367 pounds for \$5,974,966.00 to top all tobacco markets in Georgia. The next year, 1947, the market slipped to 13,021,624 pounds for \$4,787,766.00, but the following year the local market again hit the top and since has led the state every year from 1948 through 1954.

With the peak year in 1953 the low year came in 1932, the fifth year of the market, when only \$72,504 pounds sold for \$41,055.00 to average only \$7.78 per hundred pounds. The year tobacco sold for the lowest average was in 1931 when 1,812,582 pounds sold for \$113,190.96 to average \$6.24 per hundred.

The Statesboro market is the farthest north in the Georgia-Florida belt.

Eleven warehouses are filled with tobacco today. With a total of over 650,000 square feet the market here has the largest floor space of any market in the state.

Two new warehouses replace the large warehouse of the Farmers Tobacco Warehouse which burned in February of this year.

The warehouses here are Cobb and Foxhall Warehouse, Sheppard's Warehouse, The New Statesboro Tobacco Warehouse, and the Farmers Tobacco Warehouse.

It is believed that with a bumper crop of tobacco the Statesboro market will hold its top position in sales this year, both in poundage and money.
