**Rotary need of Civil Defense**

Colonel Leroy Cowart, recently named director of the Bulloch County Civil Defense, told Statesboro Rotarians Monday that the business of civil defense is not exclusively a matter of war effort. "We need in order to meet any sort of local emergency like a tornado, fire, storm, or some other disaster requiring immediate response," he said.

He pointed out the dangers of letting public interest wane with a diminishing of the war effort. "Right now there is a down in the interest because of the conference in Geneva," he pointed out.
