Students. Educational plant of the Negro students have changed little since 1951, therefore the improvements made for the white students during the same time, however, the needs for white students have continued to increase in some areas making it apparent that the improvements recommended in 1951 and carried out by the Board of Education have not kept up with the growing and changing needs.

Enrollment statistics, population counts, and average daily attendance in the white school system all indicate a marked shift in population from rural areas into Statesboro since the time before the 1951 survey. That study made this trend which has continued to the present and apparently may be expected to continue. This trend has become considerably accelerated in the intervening years as indicated by school enrollments, statistics on average daily attendance, and population checks in the various school centers.

Bulloch county will be host for a hardwood control demonstration next Wednesday afternoon, June 20, at 2 o'clock, when a group of forestry specialists and equipment manufacturers will show how to kill undesirable hardwoods to farmers in this area. The demonstration will be held on Fred Blitch's farm in the Westside community near the Negro church.

Everyone in this area who is interested in better woodland management is cordially invited to attend this demonstration. It will be a cooperative effort between the Soil Conservation Service, the Georgia Forestry Commission, and equipment dealers concerned. Those desiring to take part are Julian Reeves, research man in hardwood control, Stewart Moore, management forester, and Bill Harper, district forestry commissionist (and professional forester) with the Soil Conservation Service; and C. H. Daughtry, engineer, with Electrical Equipment Company of Atlanta.

The value of such a demonstration can readily be seen by the amount of scrub hardwoods in the Bulloch county. Approximately 50,000 acres are almost completely taken by scrub hardwoods of little or no value. To get this acreage into profitable pine timber is a goal that will literally transform the economy of Bulloch county.

## City tax digest equalization plan authorized by council

Mayor W. A. (Bill) Bowen announced this week that the City Council has approved and authorized a complete revaluation of city property in order to equalize the city tax digest.

"This is a program that should have been done 10 years or more ago," Mayor Bowen said in making the announcement.

The job of working out the tax equalization program was assigned to Charles E. Cone and Howard Christian. They have been instructed to take as long as they find it necessary to equalize the tax digest in order to place every property owner who pays taxes to the city on the same basis.

The mayor and council say that they expect that by this time the tax digest equalization program will be complete. They made it plain that the decision to inaugurate this program is not a revenue, but to level out the taxes paid by everyone. The mayor explained that at present the city is receiving almost \$1 million on which to operate the city.

"This is a program which should place most of the citizens and tax payers of Statesboro," members of the council said. "It is a program that needs to be worked out so that the taxes of all our citizens can be figured on the same basis," the mayor said.

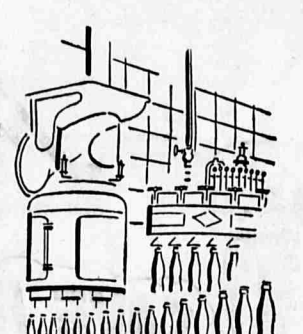

#### PLANTS NEED CALCIUM TOO

Everybody has heard that calcium is necessary for human growth—and for growth of lower animal life, too. Extension Service agronomists point out that plants also need it. And it is supplied through time. The agronomists say experience station tests and farmer experiences have proved that time is needed in a pasture program. They recommend a soil test to determine just how much.

#### GRASS UP, GRAIN DOWN

As spring grazing increased, grain consumption per dairy cow in Georgia declined considerably. Specialists at the Extension Service say, however, that dairymen are continuing to feed too much concentrates for this time of year. This causes milk production costs to remain high.

#### Dr. King, Augusta native, has been with the U. S. Public Health Service, assigned to the State Health Department as a venereal disease consultant since 1955. He accepted the position of medical director in the Burke-Jenkins-Stevens Health Division in 1950, followed by a similar position with the Dalton-Whitfield-Murray Health Division in November 1954. There he remained until entering the U. S. Public Health Service as a senior assistant surgeon in July 1954.

Dr. King is a member of the Whitfield County Medical Society (military membership), Medical Association of Georgia, American Medical Association, Georgia Public Health Association, Georgia Association of Public Health Physicians, and social and civic organizations.

Dr. and Mrs. King have four children, Hubert Jr., Rebecca Dianne, 7; John, 4; and Debra, 2.

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
