Miss Maude White has been elected as an official delegate to represent the First District Georgia Education and Bulloch County Education Association and Miss Maxann Foy has been named as a delegate to represent the Classroom Teachers of the Bulloch County Education Association at the 94th annual convention of the National Education Association (NEA) in Portland, Oregon, July 1-6. Miss White is a life member of NEA.

This year will be the first time in twenty years that the "City of Roses" has played host to an annual convention of the NEA which, with its membership of three quarters of a million, is the largest professional organization of teachers in the world.

The delegate body at the convention will consist of 5,000 members of state and local education associations who have been selected to represent their communities. Delegates will come from all the 48 states and the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Alaska, and Puerto Rico.

Eric Johnson, roving ambassador to the Middle East and former "czar" of the motion picture industry, will be one of the major speakers during the five-day meeting. American Legion Commander J. Addison Wagner and Mrs. Rollin T. Brown, national PTA president, will extend greetings from their respective organizations, and the U.S. Commissioner of Education, Samuel Brownell, also will welcome delegates.

J. Lester Buford, superintendent of schools, Mr. Vernon, Illinois, who has headed the NEA for the past year, will deliver the presidential address at one of the general assembly sessions. The closing address will be given by Lee DuBridge, president, California Institute of Technology.

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Some of the convention highlights include: a Chuck Wagner Dinner and entertainment at Jantzen Beach Park, sponsored by the Department of Classroom Teachers, and the American Overseas Educators' Dinner. A premiere showing of the latest NEA public relations film, "A Deaf for Billie," is also scheduled. This film is based on the Sunday Evening Post story, "I Was a Holo Kid," by Billie Davis, well-known writer and lecturer.

Dr. Hubert U. King will become director of the new health district composed of Bulloch, Emanuel, Candler, Evans and Effingham counties on July 1.

His office will be in Statesboro.

Dr. King, Augusta native, has been with the U. S. Public Health Service, assigned to the State Health Department as a venereal diseases consultant since 1955. With the exception of a year with the Public Health Service as a VD control officer in Louisiana, he has been in Georgia public health work since January 1950.

He attended Augusta Junior College, Vanderbilt University and the University of Georgia School of Medicine, receiving his MD degree in 1947.

After internship at the University Hospital, Augusta, Dr. King entered private practice in the Statesboro, where he has been since 1947.

He accepted the position of medical director in the Burke-Jenkins-Stevens Health District in 1947. He left the district in 1950, followed by a similar position with the Dalton-Whitfield-Murray Health District in November 1954. There he remained until entering the U. S. Public Health Service as a senior assistant surgeon in July 1954.

Dr. King is a member of the Whitfield County Medical Society (military membership), Medical Association of Georgia, American Medical Association, Georgia Public Health Association, Georgia Association of Public Health Physicians, and social and civic organizations.
