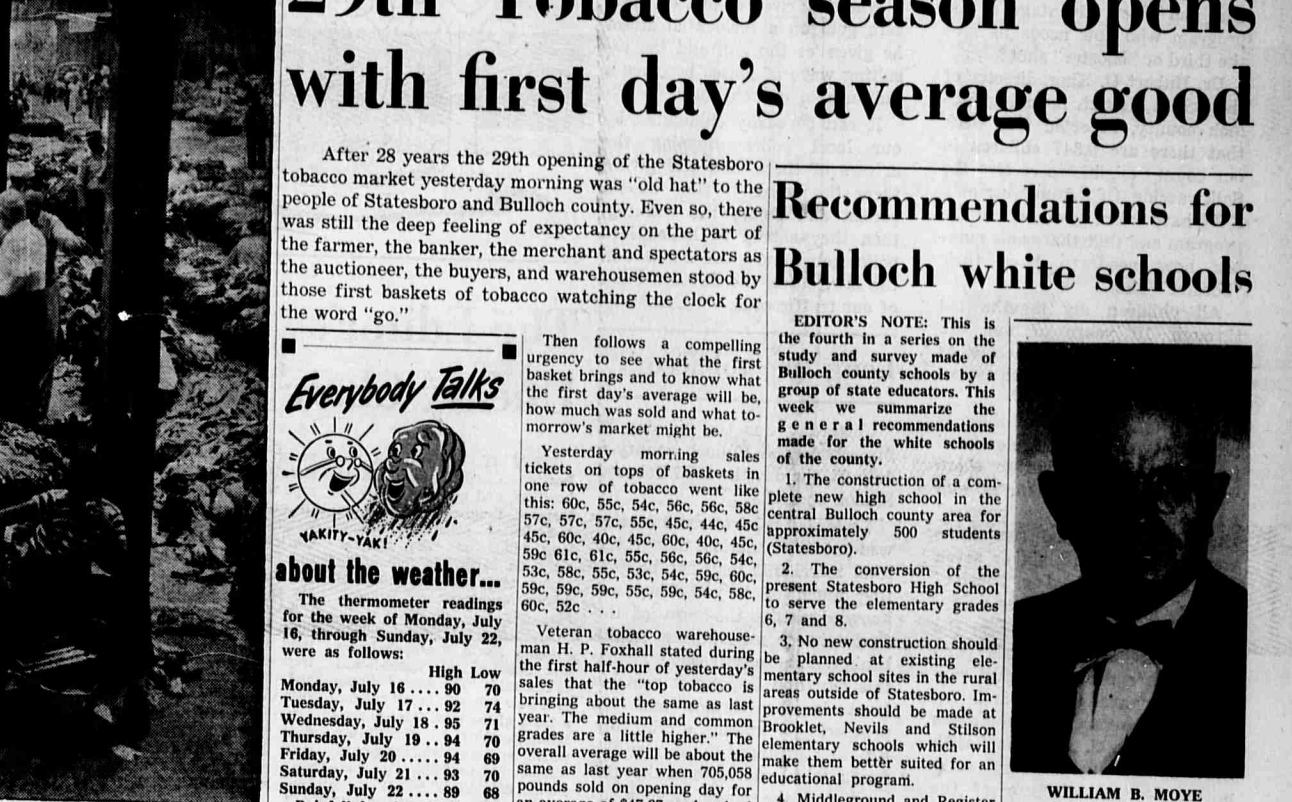
Mr. Lockwood will serve as a special consultant on teen-age programs and will address the general assembly on the subject, "Teen Centers in the Future."

"First of all, let me say that I was proud to represent you, as delegate, at the 13th Biennial Convention of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. It was an experience I shall always remember."

"The vast amount of business transacted amazed me."

"The most controversial subjects were finances, legislation, by laws, and resolutions, but they were resolved."

"There was entertainment, of course, but most of the time was spent at business sessions, forums, and workshops."

"My full report was published in last week's issue of The Bulloch Herald, and I hope that each of you has taken the time to read it. Tonight I want to bring to you some of the things that matter to us."

"1st—The majority voted for new standard state bylaws. However, those presented at the convention were not acceptable to the majority of the states. For the present we travel on the model bylaws that we now have."

"2nd—As to programs this will again be a do-it-yourself year. The national office will provide research material and advice, when requested. Suggested committee aids will be sent out on request."

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"4th—International relations BPW has a special obligation in the international field, Miss Rawl said, for 'on the whole there is an unquestioned acceptance of the leadership of American business and professional women, and the feeling that American women can do most to encourage and aid women over the world.'"

"5th—Public affairs—Miss Rawl said that 'women must look to the future when they will have equal responsibility with men in leadership.' They now lead the way in the area of service, she said, but lag in citizenship leadership. Nor, she said, are there enough women in business, politics and government, simply because, she added, 'we haven't fully made up our minds to aim for the top.' She challenged the federation to active leadership of the five million new young women workers and twenty million already in the labor market."

"6th—Support of the new research foundation, a great forward step for the federation. A pledge of \$500 by the Georgia Federation, which will mean about 25 cents per member per club."

"7th—Educations and vocations committee vouched for 'Career Advancement,' to interest younger members."

"8th—News service and radio and television changed to 'Public Relations,' this phase of club activities becoming increasingly important in keeping BPW on the map, and advertising the splendid thing we have."

"9th—Southeast regional dates August 8-10, 1957—Birmingham, Ala."

"10th—Next biennial, 1958, Seattle, Washington."

Dear Sir:

In his column of July 12, 1956, Mr. Max Lockwood suggests a southern boycott of any company local or national known or rumored to have given aid or comfort to the causes of segregation. It does not seem possible that Mr. Lockwood realizes the economic implications of such a suggestion.

The economy of the South is fully interlocked with that of the nation and with other sections of the country. Southern farmers, manufacturers, and business men depend upon markets in the North and in the West. They could not do very well without such markets. A boycott of the industry of other sections might well result in a counter boycott that could destroy the South.

At present Georgia and other Southern states are competing with states of other areas to attract industry, and many companies have established branch factories in Southern states. These factories employ thousands of Southern workers, provide a market for millions of dollars worth of materials from Southern farms and businesses, and provide a substantial profit to the business districts in neighboring towns, as well as making a very large contribution in state and local taxes.

A boycott of their products could only lead to widespread unemployment, personal suffering, and the destruction of the economic welfare of many counties and states. Most of these companies could endure a loss of their Southern market because of their sales in other sections, but the South could not exist economically without their continued investment and expansion in the South. Let us not cut our own economic necks in the present social conflict over segregation.

Local tobacco market sells 3,460,312 lbs. in five days

At the end of five selling days, Wednesday, July 25, through Tuesday, July 31, the Statesboro tobacco market sold 3,460,312 pounds for a total of \$1,467,520.69.

The total opening day, July 25, sales were 688,984 pounds for \$303,986.91. This compares with the 1955 opening day sales of 705,058 pounds for \$336,114.57.
