TOBACCO ACRES TO BE MEASURED

To further strengthen compliance with the marketing quota program, all acreages of flue-cured tobacco grown on all farms in 1946 will be measured by AAA Committee or others working under the supervision of committee.

It was announced today by J. A. Banks, Chairman of the Bulloch County AAA Committee.

Due to the manpower shortage, the AAA found it necessary to discontinue measurement of all flue-cured acreages during the war and this will be the first year since 1942 that all acreages will be measured.

Mr. Banks said, "The system of reporting their individual acreages by farmers, themselves, and subsequent spot-checking was the best means of acreage determination during the war. However, a return to measurement of all acreages of flue-cured tobacco is essential in order to make the marketing quota program fully effective."

Flue-cured producers of Bulloch county have been notified of 1946 acreage allotments for their farms.

The county's total acreage allotment for 1946 will amount to approximately 6,000 acres.

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FISHERMEN MUST HAVE LICENSE TO FISH IN PRIVATE PONDS

C. L. Harrel, district chief of the Georgia Wildlife Rangers, announced this week that "While the owner of a private pond may fish therein without himself procuring a license and may take fish therefrom in any manner whatsoever, other residents of the State over 10 years of age, even though fishing in such private pond, as invitees (the owner), would be required to obtain a license. If they are not residents of the county in which the title is situated, no matter by what means they fish, or if they fish with any kind of artificial bait, lure, or with seines or nets, regardless of their size, they are, nevertheless, being asked to them no exception from license on account of consent of the owner."
