Elder H. Henry Waters, pastor
announced that the annual meeting of the Lake Primitive Baptist Church began yesterday and will continue through Sunday. Morning services begin at 11:00 a. m. and evening services begin at 8:00 p. m. Elder P. O. Revels, of Columbus, Ga., will assist the pastor.

Physicians furnishing such treatment should notify the nearest VA contact office within five days after a veteran with a service-connected disability has been treated. The Veterans Administration contact representative pointed out, "Doctors should also report when additional treatments are needed for the balance of the month."

After a check of the records to establish the veteran's service connection and eligibility for outpatient care, the Veterans Administration will authorize payments to the physician for his services. If it is found that the veteran is not eligible for outpatient care, the physician will be notified so that he can bill the veteran as he would any private patient.

Veterans living in the same city where a Veterans Administration contact office is located should always check with the contact representative before going to a private physician, if time permits, Mr. Biles pointed out.

The Veterans Administration representative emphasized that "outpatient service is available only to veterans who have a service-connected disability. Disabled veterans are entitled to outpatient care on a fee-for-service basis only."

Veterans in doubt as to their eligibility may obtain full information from the Veterans Administration contact office at 21 1/2 Main Street, Statesboro.

You Must Register To Vote

There's a lot of talking about registering of voters for the July 17 primary.

The adoption of the Constitution of 1945 and certain legislation passed in 1945 and 1946 have caused a great deal of confusion in regard to the registration of voters.

This is the first of a series of several articles clarifying the Constitutional Requirements for Registration as Voters; The Tax Collectors Duties and proceedings for Registrars and The Transfer From One County to Another.

A person must be eighteen years old or older.

A person applying to register to vote must have been a resident of the State of Georgia one year and of the county in which he seeks to vote six months next preceding an election in which he offers to vote.

The Constitution of 1945, Acts 1945, page 15, in Paragraph 4, Section 1, Article 2, states that other qualifications as follows:

"1. All persons who are of good character and understand the duties and obligations of citizenship and who are qualified to exercise the right of suffrage under a republican form of government; or

"2. All persons who can correctly read in the English language any paragraph of the Constitution of the United States or of this State and correctly write the same in the English language, when read to them by any one of the registrars."

It also provides sterilization and prevents spoilage, the treated rice absorbs outside moisture more slowly and has better keeping qualities.

If this expanded vermiculite is used in place of sand and sand in making concrete, a product that is permanent, fireproof, waterproof, and light in weight is obtained. STUDENTS MAY GO HOME TO REGISTER AS WELL AS VOTE

As a result of the 18-year old voting law, the colleges in the University System have been instructed to encourage registration by students and to declare a holiday on election day to allow them to go home and cast their ballots. If necessary, they are to be given a day off to go home and register.

Most of the students in the University System are 18 or older, and the Regents think they would be better students if they took advantage of their privileges of citizenship. The board adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas under the present constitution of Georgia, citizens eighteen years of age and older are eligible to vote in state elections, and whereas under this provision practically all Georgia students in the institutions of the University System of Georgia are now eligible to vote; and whereas it is the obvious duty of the University System to inculcate in our young men and women a proper appreciation of the obligations of citizenship and the duty of exercising the functions of citizenship;

"It is therefore declared to be the continuing policy of the University System of Georgia as follows:

"1. Heads of institutions should afford students opportunity to register and, when reasonably necessary, should excuse students for a day in order to return home for this purpose.

"2. On the occasion of statewide elections, a holiday should be declared to enable students to return to their homes and cast their ballots in accordance with their rights and duties as citizens of the state.

Soft Ball Is Fun--That's What Counts

Have you seen a game of soft ball? Two nights a week the game is being played here in Statesboro on the football field on Fairground Road. Take a night off and go see a game. It's fun.

It is a sport which has gained steadily in popularity during the last few years. Once looked upon as a simplified kid brother to baseball, the game is now in good repute, and its devotees are in the millions.

Like many another sport, soft ball was helped along by the war. Thousands of people who never permitted themselves the luxury of attending big-time sports events until their incomes went up with increased production of our war effort, boosted spectator sports by attending them in record numbers. Softball became the favorite factory recreation of many a factory worker. Players met after work by the tens and scores, by hundreds and thousands to play the game after working hours. Judged by factory routine they regained freshness through softball.

Although softball resembles baseball, it does differ from it in several important ways. There are ten players on a side in softball instead of nine, as in baseball. The softball is bigger than the baseball, and so is easier to hit. Moreover, bases are 55 feet apart, instead of 90. The pitcher's mound, from which only underhand deliveries are made in softball, is much closer to the plate than in baseball.

These differences do not prove that softball is "soft." To be a really good softball player, one must be a superior athlete. The game demands alertness, quick thinking, and speed both of hand and of foot. It is played by many good baseball, football, and basketball players who like it for itself and have learned to regard it as a sport instead of an awkward relative of baseball. The actions which make softball a less rigorous sport than baseball also tend to make it the sport of many people who either could not or would not play baseball.

In the first place, the requirement for an extra player on the side has drawn many a person into softball who agreed to play "just one game" in order to please friends who were short a man. The "one game" in a great many cases stretched into hundreds of contests. Then, too, modifications of baseball rules which make softball less strenuous than baseball have attracted many people who did not feel quite up to baseball. These include men who have not had the opportunity to keep themselves in A-1 condition, and girls and women for whom baseball was a bit too hard. The best part of the whole thing is that softball is enough like the national pastime so that men, women, and children pick up the game easily, without having to puzzle over rules.

The enthusiasm with which girls took to softball was one of the great sport stories of the war years. In shirts, slacks, shorts, and overalls they banded together and played the game with a vigor and spirit that was new to them.

COUNCIL MEETING OF RURAL WOMEN SET FOR ATHENS

The Georgia Home Demonstration Council will hold its annual meeting on the Co-ordinate campus of the University of Georgia, June 10-14, Miss Lurline Collier, State home demonstration agent for the Agricultural Extension Service, announced today.

Two delegates representing each county home demonstration council throughout Georgia will participate in the state-wide meet. District meetings were held last year when wartime restrictions made it necessary to cancel the State meeting.

"Family living, housing and health problems in farm families and in rural areas will be studied at the Georgia Home Demonstration meeting this year," Miss Collier disclosed. "Several authorities on these subjects are scheduled to speak to the delegates. These speakers and other specialists will lead discussions of these problems during the council sessions."

A state style revue in which county style review winners will compete will be one of the features of the meeting. Officers of the Georgia Home Demonstration Council for the coming year will be elected and installed during the council sessions on Thursday, June 14.

EXTENSION SERVICE ISSUES BOOKLET ON HOGGING-OFF CROPS

The Georgia Agricultural Extension Service this week announced publication of a new booklet, Hogging-off Crops in the Coastal Plain. The booklet was prepared jointly by B. L. Southwell, animal husbandman, Coastal Plain Experiment Station, Tifton, and Kenneth Treanor, economist of the State Extension Service.

Importance of hog production has increased during recent years to the extent that it is now one of the most important sources of cash farm income in the Coastal Plain area of Georgia, the authors point out. Data and subject matter in the booklet were based entirely on experimental work conducted over a period of years at the Coastal Plain Experiment Station under Mr. Southwell's direction.

The booklet gives information on hogging-off grain crops grown in the south Georgia territory, development of a year-round system of hogging-off crops, figures on production costs and returns, and other information on the management systems practiced in hogging off various crops.

Copies of the new booklet may be obtained from county agricultural agents throughout the State or by writing the Extension Service in Athens.

TESTS ON NEW HOG PARASITE CONTROL MEASURE REPORTED

Pointing out that Georgia farmers lose several million dollars annually because of internal parasites of hogs, Charles E. Bell, livestock specialist of the State Extension Service, reported this week on a new control measure for roundworms, one of the hog parasites which cause these heavy losses.

"Sodium fluoride, commonly used against household pests, has proved safe for pigs in tests made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with experimental stations at Beltsville, Maryland, and Tifton, Georgia," Mr. Bell disclosed. The tests at Tifton, conducted by Dr. J. A. Andrews of the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, were the first to be carried out under field conditions in the South.

"This new sodium fluoride treatment is cheap, easy to obtain and to administer. It has proved to be the most effective drug discovered for use against roundworms," Mr. Bell said. "This new treatment will help reduce heavy losses of Georgia's pig crop at this time when all meat supplies are needed."

Sodium fluoride is administered to pigs by feeding them for one day on a mixture containing by weight one part of technical grade sodium fluoride to each 100 parts of dry ground feed. The Extension workers explained.

Use of grazing crops, fenced off from contaminated areas, is recommended to help control all internal parasites of hogs, Mr. Bell pointed out.

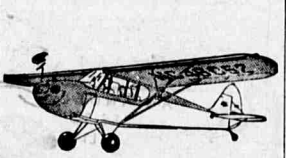

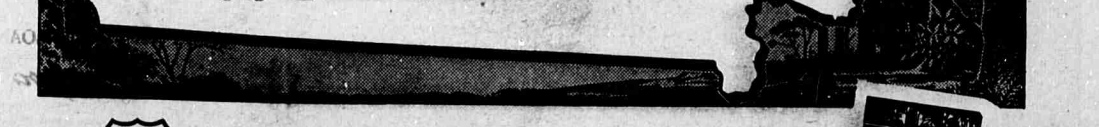

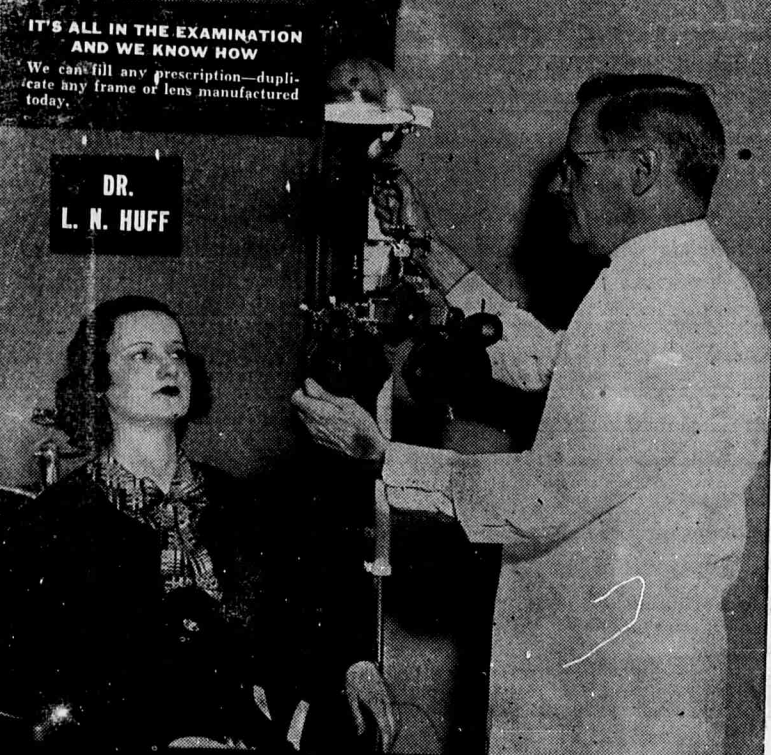
