Select a Small College

Thousands of Georgians are now seeking higher education, but the majority of them are applying for admission at the State's larger colleges, where applications already far outstrip the maximum housing and teaching facilities. Over 90 per cent of the state's veterans who plan to enter college are flooding Georgia Tech and the University of Georgia, with officials working night and day to provide some kind of facilities before the opening of the Fall semester. Georgia Tech already has 7,536 applicants for admission this Fall—more than 3,500 over its capacity—while at the University of Georgia, 5,638 prospects have flooded the capacity for 5,000. Education authorities are looking toward the state's smaller colleges, where a greater offering may be found for those who really want to learn. All of these have excellent ratings. Those included in the University System are:

North Georgia College at Dalton; South Georgia College at Douglas; West Georgia College at Carrollton; Middle Georgia College at Cochran; Georgia State College for Women at Milledgeville; Georgia Woman's State College at Valdosta; Georgia Teachers College at Statesboro; Georgia Southwestern College at Americus; and Abraham Baldwin College at Tifton.

In Atlanta, the Georgia Evening College will endeavor to provide for 5,000 students—a number which exceeds its capacity, but which it can handle in a pinch and by rotating.

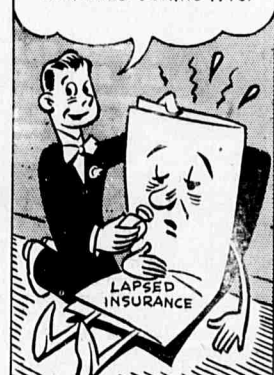
Over \$1,000,000 is now being spent remodeling and enlarging State colleges, but even with these there is little hope of being able to accommodate the flood of applicants, unless many of them attend smaller branches of the University system.

It takes tremendous courage to plant tobacco year after year in the face of such disaster. To have a successful growing season, perfect harvesting condition, and then have a barn full of the golden weed go up in smoke.
Last week we saw a woman, the wife of a tobacco grower, whose tobacco barn burned the night before. She was haggard-looking from all-night worry, following days and nights, helping pick, sort, and string tobacco. She was wretched, disillusioned, and weary. Her suffering was great because her faith and hope had been great. Her husband was across the way pulling corn—farm life can't stand still just because a tobacco barn burned last night—After dinner he'll begin looking for barns in his neighborhood in which he may find room for a number of sticks to finish curing out his crop. If he can't find space his tobacco will ruin in the fields and what might have been a profitable season gives way to a feeling of failure.
