

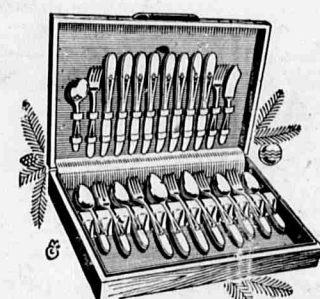

FEWER HORSES, MULES

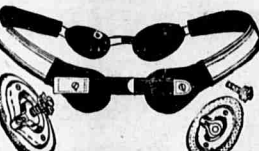
Georgia farmers who have good pastures would do well to give serious thought to producing horses on a regular basis for replacement needs. This is the opinion of Livestock Specialists of the State Extension Service. At present no section of the country is producing enough work stock for normal replacement. According to latest reports, Georgia farmers have 286,000 mules and 40,000 horses. This compares with 350,000 mules and 37,000 horses on farms in the State in 1930.

TREATING FOR BLOAT

If a cow grazes too fast on lush growths of clover or grasses and bloat results, G. D. Duice, animal husbandman for the Georgia Mountain Experiment Station, Blairsville, recommends giving the animal one ounce of turpentine as soon as possible after bloat is discovered. He warns that reaching the sick animal as soon as possible after bloat occurs is of first importance. Bloat is caused by fermentation of feed in the animal's stomach and turpentine checks the fermentation process. Cows treated with the turpentine at the mountain station responded to the treatment and were normal two to three hours after it was given.

LAND USE PRACTICES

Georgia farmers need to decrease the acreage devoted to cultivate crops and increase the acreage of perennial hay, pasture and wildlife areas and abolish the wasteful practice of allowing more than 1,000,000 acres to remain idle each year.

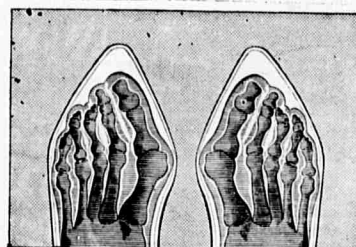
LIVESTOCK FEED

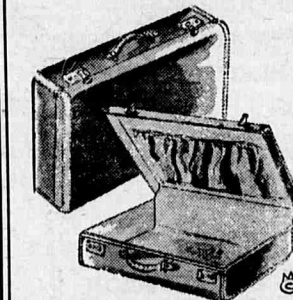

January 15 Is AAA Deadline

"Come in and avoid the last minute rush" was the advice given by Mr. J. A. Banks, Chairman of the Bulloch county AAA committee. Producers who have completed all the soil-building practices they intend to carry out this year should report such practices to the County AAA Office as soon as possible. January 15, 1947 is the deadline for reporting, all soil-building practices carried out through December 31, 1946. No AAA payment can be made for practices reported after January 15.

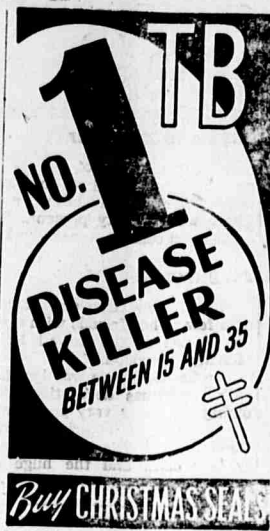
Applications for payment will be submitted to the state office in the order that they are filled which means that producers who have completed all the soil-building practices they intend to carry out and report these practices now can be paid much sooner than those who wait until the last minute.

Mr. Banks called attention to the following practices for which assistance is in an acreage basis. The acreage in the practices should be measured and reported to the county office. Sales receipts must be furnished for all purchased seed used in carrying out the practices. (1) Good growth annual lespedeza seeded in 1946 and not out for hay. (2) Good growth clover seeded solid in 1946. (3) Good growth small grain not cut for grain or hay. (4) Good growth summer legumes planted solid and left on land or turned under. (5) Good growth kudzu or lespedeza sericea established in 1946. (6) Harvesting legume or grass seed. (7) Clearing, mowing, or sodding pasture to bermuda grass. (8) Planting forest trees.

Seeding of winter legumes and pasture grasses and legumes is paid for on a poundage of seed basis. If seed was purchased, sales receipts should be shown. Credit for applying materials such as phosphate, lime, potash and mixed fertilizer to pasture and legumes is on a poundage basis. Sales receipts are needed for purchased materials.

Producers who received prior approval and have constructed terraces, dikes, or ditching should notify the county office in order that a representative may be sent to check these practices.

Practices carried out with seed, materials, or services furnished by AAA on purchase order should also be reported said Mr. Banks.

The Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C., announced this week that Bulloch County ginned 7,163 bales of cotton of the 1946 crop, prior to December 1. For the same period of 1945 the county ginned 7,266.

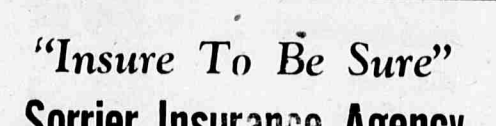

The property owners concerned at the isolated infestation have been contacted regarding the pest. Therefore, it is necessary to contact authorized White-Fringed Beetle inspectors before moving soil, farm produce, plants and shrubbery, in order that arrangements may be made for treatment or proper methods of handling the articles to prevent further spread of the insect.

Dr. Pauline Parks Wilson, dean of the school of home economics at the University of Georgia, will be the lady speaker at the Bulloch county Farm Bureau's annual meeting, R. P. Mikell, president, announces. Mr. Mikell stated that a program of music and talks by some outstanding women and men, along with the usual business of the annual meeting, was being worked out for the January 4 meeting.

Dr. Wilson is regarded as perhaps the outstanding authority on family relationships in the country and is an excellent speaker. Mr. Mikell feels that such a discussion has a definite place in the organization is a family affair and not merely an individual membership.

Sutlive Talks to Rotarians Here

Mr. Kirk Sutlive, public relations director of the Union Bag and Paper Corporation of Savannah, was the guest speaker at the Statesboro Rotary Club Monday of this week.

Mr. Sutlive, a former newspaper editor, told the Rotarians that of the 438,000 acres of land in Bulloch County, 218,000 acres or 65 percent, are in forest lands, and that 70 percent of all the land in the First District is forest land.

Pleading with them for adequate protection of forest against fire he said that only one third of the lands in this section are protected against fire, while in other sections of the states, the protection is one hundred percent.

However, he had a good word for the First and Eighth Congressional Districts stating that they have shown the most intelligent growth in forestry of any section of the world.

Speaking briefly on Union Bag and Paper Corporation he stated that ten years ago they had about one thousand people working with them for \$1,000,000 a year; today there are 4,500 on the pay rolls receiving \$9,000,000 a year.

With Mr. Sutlive was Mr. Kelly industrial relations manager of the corporation.

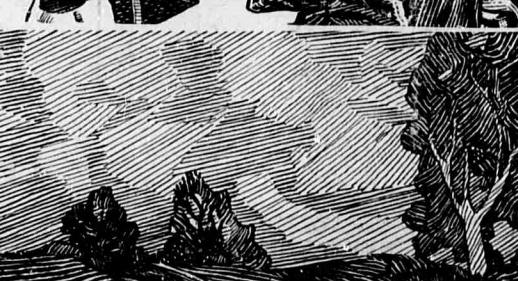
The Song of Christmas
