C. and Sylvania at a place known as "Burton's Ferry" would be paved and open up as a new route for North and South bound traffic.

On highway maps the route is designated as U. S. Route 301 and begins at Petersburg, Va. It connects Rocky Mount, Wm. and Fayetteville, in North Carolina; Dillon, Florence, Manning and Allendale in South Carolina. In Georgia it connects Sylvania, Statesboro, Claxton, Glenville, Ludowice, Jesup, Hortense, Nahant, and Folkston.

"Toil of the Brave" by Inglis
Fletcher tops our list this week. It is a long historical - romance, and carries the story of Albemarle County, as in "Raleigh's Eden" and "Lusty Wind for Carolina."

A good many of the characters notably Cosmo de Medici and Penelope Dawson, are taken from real life. It is easy to pick out these people, because they have so much more personality than the men and women Mrs. Fletcher has created.

This tale takes place in 1779, the most critical year of the Revolution, when the whole thing was about to collapse for lack of money, men were deserting by the score, not having been paid for months some of them hungry, most of them in rags.

Captain Peter Huntley, an officer and counter espionage agent for Washington, comes south ostensibly to check on an Army Lottery being held, in reality to capture Anthony Allison, a spy for the British, who is trying to win the southern planters away from the American cause.

They both fall in love with Angela Ferrier, step daughter of Senator Ferrier. Angela feels that she doesn't owe any loyalty to America, being Spanish by birth and returns Anthony's affection, helping him all she can to escape from Peter.

The story builds in intensity, until it reaches a grand climax in the battle of King's Mountain. Mrs. Fletcher brings her two main characters together during the battle for a personal duel, in which Peter wins, and Anthony is taken prisoner.

Cook Rules Legislature Can't Elect Governor

Attorney-General Eugene Cook has ruled that the State Legislature does not have the authority to elect a Governor in the place of the late Eugene Talmadge, whose term was to have begun next Monday.

Mr. Cook's opinion, supported by exhaustive brief prepared by the State Law Department, deals with the four major questions involved:

(1) Governor Arnall is required by the Constitution to discharge the duties of the office until his successor is qualified.

(2) The legislature is without authority to "elect" a Governor.

(3) The new State Constitution in creating the office of Lieutenant-Governor, abolished the office of President of the Senate as it existed.

(4) While some authorities exist to support a claim that the Lt. - Governor elect would automatically succeed, the question is not one requiring an answer because of Governor Arnall's decision to resign when the Assembly has been organized and M. E. Thompson takes office.

INCUMBENT MUST SERVE
In holding that Governor Arnall should serve until the right of a successor was clear, the Attorney General, one of the highest

Bulloch county farmers paid the local electric utility \$36,375.65 for current used in '46, a check on the Excelsior Electric Membership Corporation deposits showed.

During 145 these same users of REA paid \$29,128.21 for services from this organization, or \$7,247.44 less than in 1945.

Since there were few if any more customers on the REA lines in 1946 than in 1945, this indicates that rural people are putting electricity to work on the farm. As more electrical equipment is available for doing farm jobs this expenditure for productive current will probably continue to rise.

County Now Has Fire Fighting Equipment

Bulloch County now has a fire protection unit.

The county which is made up of 60 percent of forest land has for the first time in its history a complete fire protection unit including two well equipped fire trucks, a crawler tractor with fire break equipment capable of constructing an 8-foot fire break, and fire fighting crews ready to answer night and day fire calls.

Fires are spotted from three look-out towers located at Arco, the Statesboro Airport, and just across the county line in Bryan County. Another tower will be built near Hopeville in a few days.

The fire fighting unit operating in the county is set up in co-operation with the Georgia Department of Forestry and has already suppressed several fires.

R. S. Wheeler, County Ranger, states that the fire break construction equipment will be made available to all forest owners at a cost of \$3.50 per mile. He states that the State Fire Laws will be rigidly enforced, and special fire investigating officers will be called into the county to apprehend and prosecute law violators.

He asks every citizen to cooperate with the department in an all out effort to stop destructive fires which cause thousands of dollars damage annually to the forest of Bulloch.

He asks that all fire should be reported to the Bulloch County Protection Unit at Phone 528.
