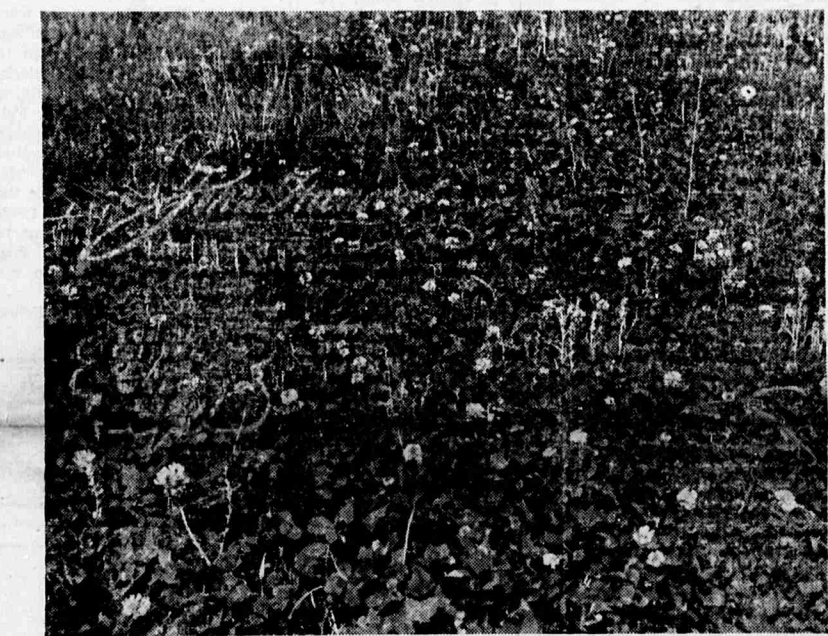

Shown above is one of the finest pastures in Bulloch county. This pasture is located on A. P. Murphy's farm, near Statesboro. The white blossoms seen in the picture is White Dutch Clover, which has been planted in with "Coastal Bermuda" grass, the latest and best grass for grazing in this country. "Coastal Bermuda" is new in Georgia and experts predict it will increase cattle production 40 per cent when farmers plant it. It is planted from sprigs and produces no seed. It grows high and fast and protects the soil from erosion.

## 'Bish' Murphy Plans Farm On Soil Conservation Basis

A. P. "Bish" Murphy loves his 400 acres of land on his farm near the city limits of Statesboro, on the Dover road, and loves it so much he is taking care of it like a mother would care for her young children. "Bish" has realized the value of soil conservation and farm diversification, and he is putting it into practice.

Recently Mr. Murphy called in Mr. J. R. Kelly, of the Soil Conservation Bureau and Bryon Dyer, here in Statesboro and enlisted their assistance in mapping out his land to determine the different types of soil he had on his property and asked them to make recommendations as to what he could plant to conserve his soil and the type of crops to plant which would produce a profit for him.

These experts went into action and made recommendations to Mr. Murphy and he is now following the program to the letter. When the program is completed Mr. Murphy will have one of the best farms in Bulloch as a model for other farmers in Bulloch to follow.

One of the first things Mr. Kelly and Mr. Dyer recommended to "Bish" was to plant proper grasses and legumes for permanent pastures. It was recommended that he plant Coastal Bermuda, White Dutch Clover, Bahair Grass, Serecia, Lespedeza, Dallas Grass, and Kudzu. "Bish" followed their recommendation and

this spring and states that if he is successful with this pasture he will have enough plants to supply all the farmers of the county.

According to Mr. Murphy, he used 700 pounds of 18 per cent super-phosphate and 200 pounds of ground limestone for every acre planted in Coastal Bermuda.

In addition to the Coastal Bermuda pasture, Mr. Murphy has "put in" other grasses and legumes for grazing and soil conservation. He has 10 acres in bahair grass, 8 acres in Serecia Lespedeza, and 16 acres of Kudzu. In all he has over 160 acres in pasture lands.

But Mr. Murphy has other crops on his farm. He has 110 acres planted in corn, peanuts, tobacco and truck crops, and he has a 9-acre fish pond.

And, naturally, he has cows and calves to graze on that Coastal Bermuda grass. He has a full-blooded registered Black Angus Bull, the grandson of the grand champion of Scotland, shipped to this country seven years ago and sold for \$55,000.

Yes, "Bish" Murphy loves his farm and is taking care of it—and making money. He says he hopes to make it the show place of Bulloch county within the next five years, and if he keeps up his practices of soil conservation and diversification he will have the show place of Bulloch.

## Local Women Organize League Of Women Voters

The District meeting of the League of Women Voters was held Friday, May 9, at the court house. Mrs. Robert North, of Atlanta, led a round-table discussion on Democratic committees. Mrs. R. M. Pate, of Atlanta, used as her topic in an address, "The League in Action." Mrs. Lucy McIntyre's subject was, "Woman As A Citizen."

The local women who attended were enthusiastic in their approval of the direct and intelligent approach of the women speakers. The purpose and practical objectives of the League as developed by these women who have participated in the League activities over a period of years convinced them that the new organization could speedily become a force for good in Bulloch county. It was emphasized repeatedly that all activities of the League deal with principles and not partisan politics. It does not approach problems in a spirit of aggression, but it does encourage an intelligent study of civic needs and policies that affect the general welfare of our citizenry, and cooperation with groups that are striving for worthy goals.

At the close of the business session, thirty-seven women attended the luncheon at the Norris Hotel.

A financial plan was presented to club members for raising the \$40,000 to build and equip a club house. The members voted to accept the plan presented and plans are now being made to start in the near future the actual construction of the club house.

When the Forest Heights Country Club constructs its \$40,000 club house Statesboro will have one of the finest country clubs in South Georgia. Interest is running so high among some of the members of the club who want to see the club house built as quickly as possible that they are offering materials at cost price. B. W. Knight, manager of the F. W. Darby Lumber Co., has written a letter to President Morris offering to furnish the materials at invoice price.

## Contract For Swimming Pool Will Be Let Soon

The City Council of Statesboro voted unanimously Tuesday night to let the contract for the construction of a \$20,000 pool at the earliest possible date. The pool will be located on the city's property on Fair Ground Road. It is expected the contract will be let within ten days, and after the contract is let, it is estimated that it will take 60 to 90 days to construct the pool.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce recently voted to take the lead in building a swimming pool and offered to turn over \$4,000 to the city for this purpose. At

that time, Mr. Lannie F. Simmons, who had approximately \$7,500 in the bank for the sole purpose of building a swimming pool, told the city council and Junior Chamber he would gladly turn over this money to any group who would push plans for building the pool.

Tuesday night Mr. Simmons and B. W. Knight appeared before the council and told them they were ready to turn over \$11,000 to the city, provided they would immediately let the contract to construct the pool. The council accepted the offer and will put out bids for the contract this week. The city council told Mr. Simmons and Mr. Knight they would not supply the additional \$9,000 needed to complete the pool, but that they would operate and maintain the pool after it was completed.

The Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce has pledged themselves to get out and raise the additional \$9,000 needed to build the pool. Officials of the Junior Chamber state they believe the people in Statesboro realize so strongly the need of a pool for our youth that they will be more than glad to donate the money to complete this project.

## 'Pageant To Tell Of The Old South

For three days next week "The Old South" will be revived by members of a history class of Georgia Teachers College and citizens of Statesboro, when a pageant depicting the "Culture of the Old South" will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 19, 20, and 21.

Georgia Teachers College has in its curriculum a class in History of the Old South. This course portrays a study of the Old South, both politically and socially during the period of the "Cotton Kingdom" (1800-1860). The three-day pageant to depict the zenith of Southern society during antebellum days, will be staged by this class under the direction of Jack Averitt, who is a professor at the college.

Preparatory to planning the festivities the class has made three trips to study old Southern Culture. On a field trip to Charleston two weeks ago the class visited many historical places with the highlight of the trip, a stop at Hampton Hall where they were entertained by Archibald Rutledge. While in Charleston the class attended services at St. Michael Church. Two trips have been made to the Georgia coast to study Colonial Georgia. Historical places visited included the Ford Plantation, Sunbury, the dead town of Hardwick, Fort Frederica, King Plantation, Christ Church. The last trip was made in conjunction with the Georgia History class at the college.

The pageant is to begin with a tea Monday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Lem Neville in Metter, Georgia. This will be an antebellum affair with the members of the class in costume. Tuesday the class will go to the old Jones Plantation at Birdville. This estate is about 35 miles from Statesboro and is still owned by the Jones family. The house was built on land granted by King George II and was erected in 1761 with additions in 1847. Many of the original pieces of furniture, chintz bed covers, six generations of baby clothes, a United States Atlas dated 1837 and other objects of art, such as vases, clocks and silver. The American Guide Series says of Birdville: "The Avenues about Birdville are lined with giant oaks and live oaks centuries old. Still standing at the crossroads are pre-Revolutionary buildings which made the Jones house the center of a small village. The small, gabled frame

buildings were used as the inn, stage stop, and post office; here the members of the community gathered to learn news of the outside world. Here, too, is a log building which once served as a dining house. In the carriage house nearby is an old silver mounted postilion coach, with sliding glass windows.

"The Jones House (private), of hand-hewn pine timbers with mortise joints held by wooden pegs, was built in 1762; additions in the Greek Revival style were completed in 1847. On the facade of this two-story house are four tall Corinthian columns, capped and based with iron, which support a central pedimented portico. The mantels are hand-carved and secured with wooden pegs. At the rear of the Manor House is the Jones Family Cemetery. During the War Between the States General Sherman's men had overrun the plantation, stripped it of its treasures, and started to burn the house. Having no desire to outlive her home, the mistress refused to leave her bed, where she lay ill. Because of her persistence the soldiers extinguished the fire, already mounting from a room in the lower story."

Wednesday afternoon at four o'clock there will be a parade through the business section of Statesboro led by the college band. Riding in open cars will be distinguished guests, members of the press. One large float is planned for the parade which will have as a background a Colonial home with girls dressed in costume. Also included in the parade will be five phantoms, one buggy of the period and older wagons depicting slaves.

Late Wednesday afternoon there will be a reception for those participating in the parade and the pageant will come to a close with an ante-bellum ball to be staged at one of Statesboro's oldest and loveliest homes. The entire festival will be staged in authentic costume, furnished by Brooks and Company of New York, and the phantoms will be sent to Statesboro from Athens.

Burton's Ferry To Get U. S. Highway Number

John C. Beasley wants the Burton Ferry Highway from Summerton, S. C., to the Florida State line given a U. S. number so it will be shown on all road maps as a U. S. Federal highway, and has written a strong letter to the Highway Department of South Carolina asking their support in the matter. The letter Mr. Beasley wrote follows:

Atlanta, Ga., May 13, 1947

Extension of U. S. Route 301 from Summerton, S. C., via Allendale, S. C., Statesboro, Glenville, Jessup, and Folkston, Ga., to Florida State Line.

Hon. J. S. Williamson, Chief Highway Commissioner, State Highway Department, Columbia, S. C.

Dear Mr. Williamson:

This Department and the citizens along the line which above route traverses are extremely interested in securing the approval of the Numbering Committee of the Association of State Highway Officials of this extension of the route. I have been very pleased to advise you that the Georgia Highway Department expects to complete the bridges now under construction on said route by June 1, thereby eliminating the objectionable detours.

In addition to my general interest as Director of the Highway Department, this route traverses the home town of Glenville, and I am personally concerned and shall appreciate favorable action. I am looking forward to seeing you in person sometime soon, and extend to you a cordial invitation to visit me in Atlanta at your first opportunity, or if you could find time, join me at Glenville for a day or two of the best freshwater fishing in the State.
