BOARD ENLARGES PATROL IN STATE'S SAFETY DRIVE

Davis, Public Safety Director, has said that he would ask the Attorney General for a ruling on whether or not the Patrol may designate speed limits in populous areas outside of the limits of corporate towns and cities.

Concerned since the Supreme Court's decision declaring county speed laws illegal, Acting Gov. M. E. Thompson called a meeting of a highway safety council last week end and laid plans for full coop- eration with President Truman's safety campaign this summer in which member papers of the Georgia Press Association will partici- pate.

It was generally accepted throughout the state that al- though speed limits are now 55 miles per hour on all Georgia's highways by virtue of the court decision, exceeding safe speeds in areas outside corporate cities could—and would—be prosecuted for recklessness where conditions warranted this action by state or county authorities.

"ROGUE'S HOLIDAY"—by Ham- ilton Cochran.

A swashbuckling tale of pirates and plunder, in the early 18th Century, and tailor-made for the movies I can just see Cornel Wilde as the leading character, Robert Maynard, and some fragile blonde for the heroine. It should be done in technicolor to get the full effect. To get back to our story: Robert Maynard, a young British naval man, has been com- missioned a lieutenant but has been assigned to shore duty, much to his disgust. While he is trying to deliver some papers to a ship- lying well off shore, a storm blows up, capsizes the small boat he is in, and he nearly drowns. He is picked up by the "Halcyon," bound for the Carolinas. His com- manding officer assumes that he has been lost at sea. When near- ing the Carolina coast, the Hal- cyon is attacked by a pirate ves- sel, Edward Teach or "Black- beard" as captain. Teach burns the Halcyon with all its crew on board, but takes Maynard prisoner, intending to lash him to death. (It appears he has a grudge against the Navy). Instead, he changes his mind and sails for Hatteras, with the intention of putting Maynard on an island without food, clothing or water.

Instead, the ship runs aground on Albermarle Shoals and May- nard is washed ashore. When he regains consciousness, he has been rescued by Squire Leigh, a wealthy plantation owner, and his daughter, Sharon. Teach and his crew are taken to Bath, where the governor has them sign a paper agreeing not to commit any more acts of pi- racy, and they receive the King's Pardon.

This doesn't mean a thing, be- cause the governor and his sec- retary, Rutherford, secretly form a partnership with Teach.

The pirates form a protective association and force the local planters to join by threatening to burn their homes if they don't pay up. (This sounds like modern day gangsters.) Leigh and Dr. Ran- dolph refuse to pay and Ran- dolph's house is burned, and Teach kidnaps Sharon. Maynard rescues her, but she is thrown out of the country in the attempt, and badly injured.

Realizing that there can be no help expected from the governor or the Carolinas, Maynard makes a trip to Williamsburg to enlist the aid of Governor Spotswood, of the Virginia settlement. He supplies them with an armed ves- sel and a picked crew.

They finally locate Teach and his ship, and after a furious bat- tle, they do for Japan and

bring back the old way of life, once the occupation forces were gone. The ultimate aim is to con- trol Omi. (We can't say we have not been warned. The Japanese have been too deadly. Veterans Corner

Must the Veterans Administration approve a course of education under the GI Bill? Does a veteran have to pay the premiums on his National Service Life Insurance while he is disabled?

Thousands of questions like these come to VA contact representatives every week. Here are the answers to a few of those asked most by veterans:

Q. If I am eligible for three years of schooling under the GI Bill, does that mean three school years or three calendar years?

A. If you are entitled to three years of education or training un- der the Servicemen's Readjust- ment Act (GI Bill) you are eli- gible for three calendar years (36 months) of education or training. This may be used up in four ordinary school years of nine months each.

Q. I understand I can now reinstate my National Service Life Insurance policy without a physical examination.

A. Yes. NSLI policies may be reinstated without red tape or delay until August 1. All that's nec- essary is to sign a simple rein- statement form and pay two monthly premiums. Any contact representative will handle the de- tails, or the reinstatement form may be obtained by writing di- rectly to the Insurance Service, Veterans Administration Branch Office 5, Atlanta 3, Georgia.

Veterans wishing further in- formation about veterans' benefits may have their questions answer- ed by visiting the VA Contact Of- fice at 22 1-2 East Main Street, in Statesboro.

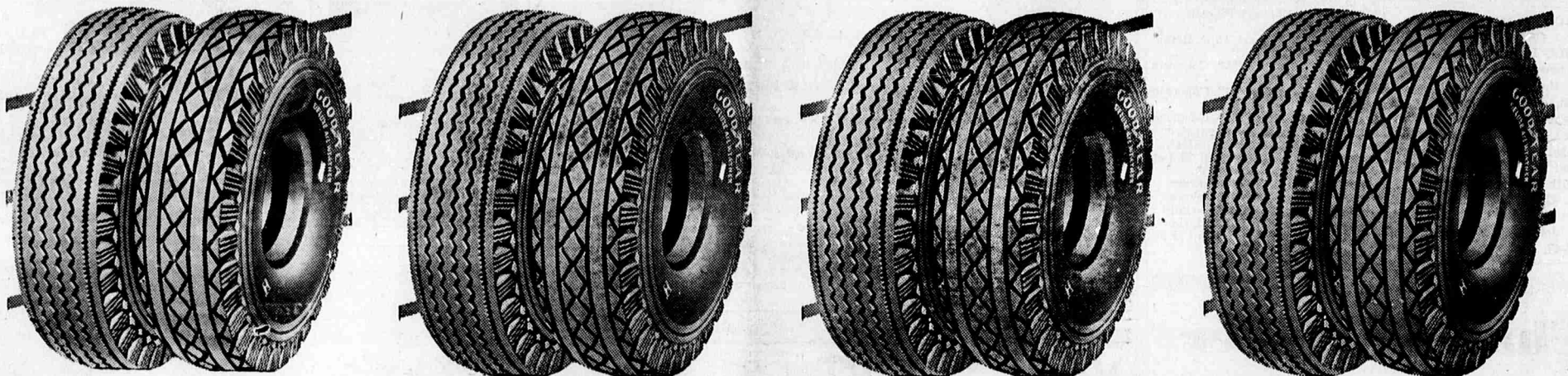
