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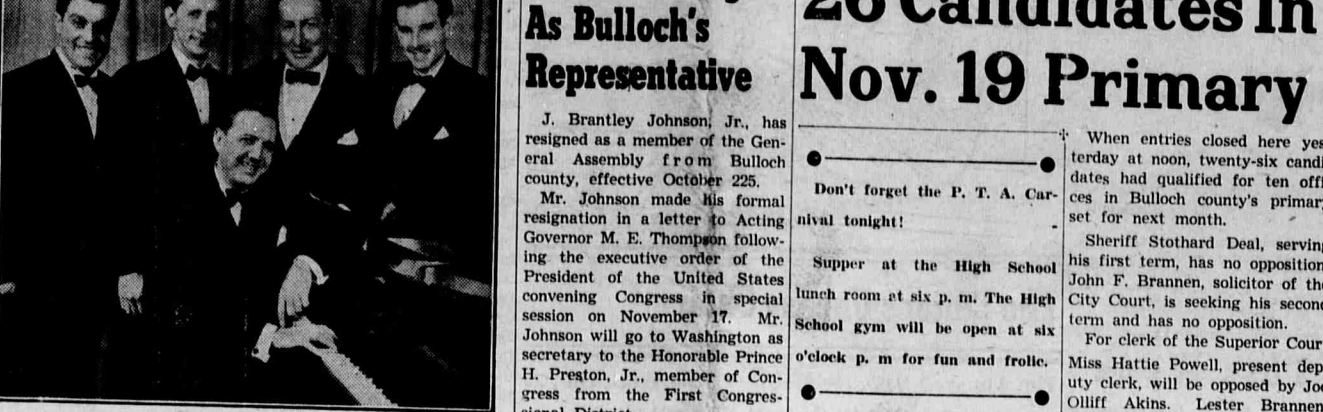

We are now in the preliminary about Dodge county be said about sales of a campaign in which 19 us"—and all Georgia will be in candidates are asking nearly 9,000 voters in Bulloch county to fill nine elective offices in our county government in a primary to be held on November 19.

Edwin Methvin, editor and publisher of the Eastman Times-Journal, and president of the Georgia Press Association, editorially blew the lid off one of the state's strangest, most extraordinary elections, an election where the "mighty dollar bought the souls of men, women, and teenagers at the polls on election day. . . and citizens 'present the frightening and disgusting spectacle of mouths watering at the sight of fresh, green, dollar bills and lacking the courage, the intestinal fortitude, the willpower, and enough self-respect to exert their own constitutional right of franchise. . . an election in which 'at least 30 to 40 per cent' of the voters sold their votes."

They can be bought elsewhere, too—in Telfair, in Pulaski, in Blackley—and in many other counties over the state. But those who have observed elections in past years will swear that never before have they witnessed so much money, such a buying of votes, so many of our own people automatically labeling themselves with 'I was bought by the highest bidder,' as was seen in Dodge county's great election auction."

A Challenge To Us

Often a letter written under the impulse of personal exasperation carries a tremendous wallop and tells a story better than all the editorializing by an editor who writes second-hand.

Last week, a letter came to me in an indirect way, written by Frank Heyward, Jr., who lives in Bogalusa, Louisiana. But let the letter tell its story:

"Nine years ago I purchased some timberland in the Bay District of Bulloch County. The property had just been cut clear for sawlogs. Since that time I have made a great effort to grow another crop of timber both by hand planting slash pine seedlings and by encouraging natural regeneration of pine. Due to my efforts have been only partly successful. These fires have for the most part been set by a group of people entirely indifferent to the property rights of their neighbors. This in spite of the fact that such action is against Georgia law. Fires on my property and throughout the neighborhood have caused thousands of dollars damage during recent years."

"Last month, while spending a few days on my land, two negroes were arrested by the sheriff on suspicion of stealing and butchering several head of cattle. There was no proof against these men. They were jailed on mere suspicion of cattle stealing. Assuming them to be guilty, however, they stole not more than a few hundred dollars worth of cattle. But each year timber worth a hundred times as much is burned by incendiary fires in Bulloch County and the sheriff never makes an arrest even though it is frequently commonly known who starts the fires."

"The sheriff is not to be criticized. It's the fault of a slow-thinking public. And there you have the point in my letter. The law takes action against two men THOUGHT to have stolen cattle, which he is running."

We challenge every candidate seeking office in the November primary to make it that kind of an election. An election in which the candidates may hold up their heads and say: "I ran a good race and the winner is the choice of the people."

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Dodge County On Auction Block

DODGE COUNTY ON AUCTION BLOCK

We write this editorial with a feeling of disgust, because what we have witnessed with our own eyes, and that which has been told to us by the candidates themselves convince us that, in a large degree, Dodge county was placed on the auction block last Wednesday and sold to the highest bidder.

The mighty dollar bought the souls of men, women and teenagers at the polls on election day. Votes were sold to opposing candidates for appalling figures. One man's family of five received \$100; another family of four received \$80; individuals were given from \$2.50 to \$50 each for their votes.

The percentage of votes bought and sold represents an urge even to non-religious people to stretch their arms heavenward and shout the question: "Please God. Tell us to what depths can some of our people plunge themselves?" We stated above that we write with disgust, because some of those who sold their votes are considered in their communities to be among the leading citizens. They know better. It isn't ignorance. It isn't that they need the money for food and clothing. Their attitude is disgusting. . . they just don't care. . .

On the other hand, if the cheap, chiseling voters were not so demanding the candidates would not feel that they must buy the office at auction. . .

So open was the auction on election day, and so freely did the money flow, that we asked several candidates what percentage of the voters in Dodge county could be bought. . . like chickens, hogs, cattle and the like.

The answer we received would make chills run up and down the spine of those who believe in voting their convictions. It was, "and we quote the exact words of a candidate who should know: 'At least 30 to 40 per cent.'"

"COULD BUY ALMOST FIFTY PER CENT"

Doubting this information, and determined to get opinions of others, we accosted another candidate with identically the same question. His answer was even worse: "If I had enough, I believe I could buy almost fifty per cent of them."

As if vote buying and selling were not enough, there was an additional spectacle in the East-voting precinct, at first open for all to see, but later carried on by signs and motions. There seemed to have been a prearranged agreement between two parties that as certain voters were contacted on the outside and later run through the voting room, they were to be "properly" taken care of.

We commend the official who noticed this irregularity and reported it to the chairman. And we commend the chairman who remedied the situation by removing this person from the voting room.

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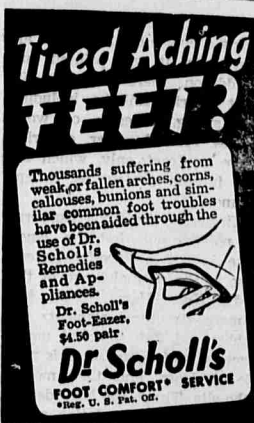

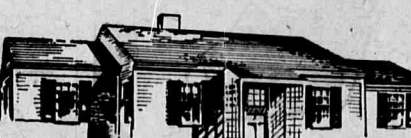

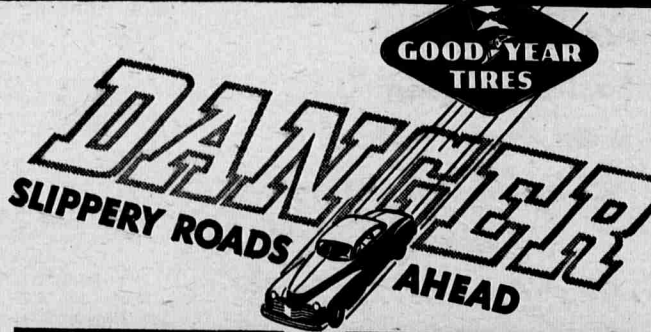

New Quotas Hit Peanut Growers 'Bulloch county peanut growers are being deprived of 40 per cent of what is rightfully theirs,' stated S. D. Groover, of the East Georgia Peanut Commission yesterday in comment on the recent reduction in the peanut allotment for Bulloch county.

According to Mr. Groover, 3.4 per cent of the Georgia peanut crop was marketed here in Statesboro over the three year base period. The new allotment of 11,701 acres that Bulloch county was given for 1948 amounts to only 1.5 per cent of the state's 782,000 acre allotment.

The reduction hits the county peanut growers heavily. Mr. Groover says, and will amount to nearly a ten per cent loss of income for the farmer. He points out that Emanuel and Evans counties are well satisfied with their allotment. Screven and Jenkins are slightly hurt; and Camden, Effingham, Bryan and Johnston counties are badly hurt under the new allotments.

Stores to Close in Statesboro For Armistice Day Statesboro will observe Armistice Day next Tuesday, November 11.

It was announced that all the stores in Statesboro will close for the day to observe the signing of the armistice, ending the First World War. The banks will also be closed.

The body of Lavonne Hodges, 20, first of Bulloch county's World War II dead to be returned to this country, is expected here soon. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hodges of Bulloch county.

The War Department indicated the body would reach here some time this week. Young Hodges finished high school at Savannah High with the class of 1943 and entered the service at the age of 19. He remained in the United States for four months before going overseas with General Hodges' First Army. He lost his life in the siege of Anserm, Belgium, and was buried at Henri Chapelle, Belgium.

The body will be taken to the home of his parents. Funeral arrangements will be in charge of Smith-Tillman Mortuary.
