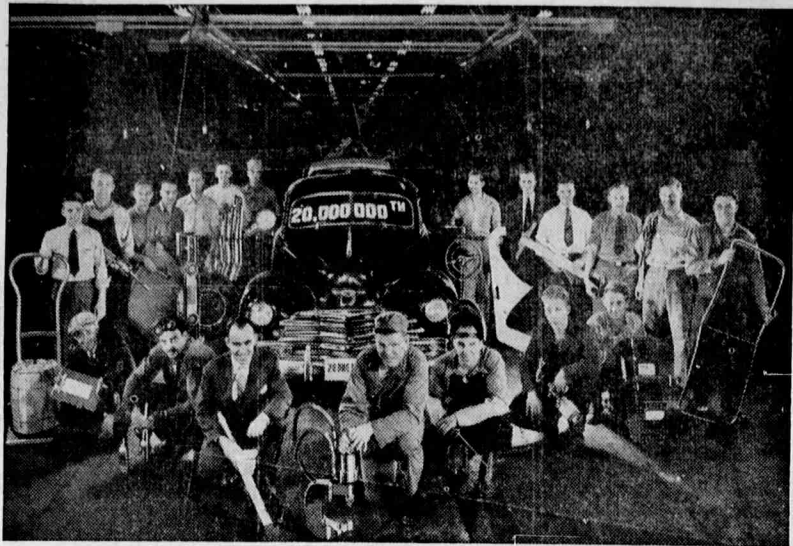

New Program of FHA Is Now In Effect

The new federally insured farm mortgage program of the Farmers Home Administration is now in effect throughout the state. Mr. Hal Roach, County FHA supervisor, said today. Since October 3 when the first insured loan in the United States was made in Georgia, applications have been received in many of the county offices in Georgia and elsewhere. Mr. Roach explained that this new program supplements rather than substitutes for the agency's direct farm purchase loan program in operation for the past ten years. The insured loans are advanced by private lenders. Applications are accepted from qualified veterans and from tenants, sharecroppers, farm laborers and owners of inadequate or underimproved farms—provided they cannot obtain needed credit in any other way. The applicant must have farming experience and be of good character. He must know of a suitable place he can buy at a reasonable price, and be able to pay down at least 10 per cent of the price of the farm and of any needed improvements. This 10 per cent investment gives him an equity in the place. He borrows the remaining 90 per cent from a private lender such as a bank, insurance company, investment firm, or individual, and the Farmers Home Administration guarantees the loan's repayment.

The farmer has 40 years to pay off the loan. If he needs that long, and he pays two and a half per cent interest. In addition, he pays 1 per cent mortgage charge at the beginning of each year, including the first, to the Farmers Home Administration. The farm he selects to buy must be appraised on the basis of long-time prices for farm products, to be sure it is worth what it costs.

"We lean heavily on county committees for advice and assistance in insuring loans," Mr. Roach said. "We do in making direct loans. In the mortgage program, the county committee certifies as to a farm's sound value, and passes on the applicant's qualifications. Committee members for Bulloch county are Mr. Raymond G. Hodges, Mr. W. Lee McElveen, and Mr. Clouse Smith."

Wynn as president of the Warrenton chapter and Delmar Rush as president of the Sikehoke chapter to complete the community elections. The county elections will be held in connection with the annual meeting January 3.

Mr. Mikell succeeds J. A. Hart, first president of the Goechee chapter, who has built it from nothing to around 100 members. E. D. Shaw was elected vice-president of the Goechee chapter and Homer McLean secretary. Mr. Wynn succeeds Floyd Deal at Warrenton, who was also first president of that community chapter which now has some 75 members. Josh Deal was named vice-president at Warrenton, and Joe C. Hodges secretary.

Mr. Rushing succeeds J. V. Anderson of Sikehoke chapter. The group here has some 60 members. R. E. Anderson was elected vice-president and B. T. Brown secretary.

The meeting will be held in the Georgia Teachers College auditorium January 3 (Saturday), at 10:30 a. m.

Farm Bureau members of the First District will be invited, as well as many of the state's leading agriculturists. A report on activities of the county organization in 1947 and plans for 1948 will be presented in addition to election of county officers.

4-H'ers See How Bulloch County Fire Protection Unit Works

Every 4-H club member in Bulloch county knows how the local fire protection unit is set up and its functions.

J. W. Roberts, local forest ranger, accompanied the farm and home agents to all the club meetings last week and demonstrated all fire-fighting equipment the county has at the clubhouses.

The local fire protection unit now has three lookout towers: one at Hopkirk, Arcola and Nevils. These towers are situated so as to give the county complete coverage at all times. Statesboro can be seen from each of the towers, as well as other sections of the county. The county has three fully-equipped trucks; including large pressure pump. The towers are all connected with headquarters by telephone.

Mr. Roberts urged the clubbers to co-operate with timber owners in controlling forest fires. He pointed out that the county contains some 260,000 acres of timber which has some 150 crops to turpentine cups as well as providing a quantity of saw timber and other forest products. This makes forestry one of the major money crops in the county.

Pre-Holiday Co-op Poultry Sale Here Monday, Dec. 22

The pre-holiday co-operative poultry sale will be held Monday, December 22, from 7 a. m. to 1 p. m., at the Statesboro Ginney.

Ralph E. Moore, bidding for a group of out-of-town dealers, entered the high bid, with 40 cents per pound for turkeys under 16 pounds, 35 cents for those over 16 pounds, 32 cents for fryers, colored hens 27 cents, leghorn roosters 16 cents, and geese 20 cents and ducks 20 cents.

The last poultry sale moved some 5,000 pounds of surplus poultry off the local market, thus helping boost prices for farmers with small lots for sale.

'Wets' And 'Drys' Line-up For Election Tomorrow

'Wet' Spokesman Says . . .

"We believe that the people of Bulloch county are going to be sensible in this election," said a spokesman for the Bulloch County Association for Legal Control said yesterday.

"We believe that the people of this county recognize the evils of prohibition with bootlegger control of the sale of whiskey. We believe they prefer what they have now, especially when the present legal control system yields a tax benefit to the people of our city and county and avoids the expense of an extra force of prohibition police. We believe that the \$62,000 of revenue brought into our city and county is worth keeping, especially when prohibition has been tried and found to bring worse instead of better conditions. We do not believe the people of our county want to hand this revenue over to the bootleggers and to license dealers in nearby counties."

"Neither side concedes victory. The 'battle lines' are drawn and the issue will be settled Friday night when the final vote is counted. The Herald requested the leaders on each side to make a final statement, and we give it to you as they prepared it for publication."

If County Goes "Dry" Liquor Stores to Be Closed by State

Should Bulloch county vote dry in the election tomorrow the liquor dealers in the city and county will remain open. It is understood, until the county Ordinary certifies the election returns and mails them to the State Revenue Department in Atlanta.

After the revenue department receives the official notification from the Ordinary they will then send agents to Statesboro to officially close the stores. Most of the liquor dealers now operating stores in the city and county have applied for licenses to operate in 1948. Their present licenses expires December 31.

Upon her return to Ecuador, she plans to organize Home Demonstration Clubs and improve the 4-H Club work.

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'Dry' Spokesman Says . . .

"The other issue is whether the system we have is better than the one we will have. We insist that prohibition prohibits better than regulation regulates. The local citizens who profited so greatly from the sale of whiskey have been serious violators of the law, selling to alcoholics at indiscriminate prices, and many times on Sunday. Driving and its results have startlingly increased. We believe our competent officers will do a splendid job of controlling the bootlegger menace, and we guarantee that there will be much less drinking in our community."

The spirit of Christmas to Americans is as important as our Christ and the Spirit of Christ beating in the hearts of our forefathers was the largest single motivating factor in prompting them to leave their homelands and come to America, a country which at that time had nothing to offer save freedom of speech and freedom of worship.

In true American fashion we have tended to commercialize Christmas as we have other great holidays that should mean so much to us. State Suspends Liquor Permits

The State retail liquor licenses of four dealers in Bulloch County were suspended this week for selling liquor on Sunday and during hours in which sales are prohibited by law.

Revenue Commissioner Glenn Phillips in Atlanta listed the dealers as R. A. Hendrix, C. A. Sasser, Ben Ellis, and J. Floyd Olliff. Both Hendrix and Olliff operate liquor stores on the Dorchester highway, Sasser operates a liquor store in connection with the Anchorage Inn, located on the Metter highway. Ellis operated a liquor store at what was formerly Strick's Place, on the Portals highway and known now as the Green Frog.

The four dealers previously pleaded guilty in the city court of Statesboro and were fined \$100 each.

There are 15 licensed liquor dealers in Bulloch County.

SPECIAL SERVICES AT "SILVER CHURCH"

LIQUOR COSTS BULLOCH COUNTY TOO MUCH. The wets remind us of the \$62,000 they "save" us in taxes; we want to remind ourselves of the million and a half wasted to do it. Over \$25 down the rat hole to get \$1.

Even that \$62,000 isn't savings, because liquor enforcement alone in Bulloch County costs about three times that much, or \$179,000. 70% of all costs of law enforcement—sheriff fees, police salaries and upkeep, board in calaboose and jail, costs to maintain courts—is attributed to liquor by nationally known authorities. So every time our county or city treasury takes one step up-hill they slip three steps down-hill.

NEITHER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS NOR CITY COUNCILMEN have asked for continued licensing of liquor in order to finance the county. Members of both groups have spoken out as wanting the city and county dry. They say they don't need that money.

DRINKING HAS INCREASED TOO MUCH. So has drunken driving and arrests for drunkenness. Alcoholism is spreading. Bulloch County court records show the alarming upward trend. Something needs desperately to be done.

"CONTROL" HAS NOT CONTROLLED. Licensing didn't get rid of the bootlegger as we were promised. And the licensed dealers have sold on Sunday and to alcoholics. Some of them have been caught this year. Others just haven't been caught yet.

PROHIBITION WILL CAUSE LESS DRINKING. We promise

simply that; no more, no less. We don't promise the moon, nor to stop all bootlegging, nor that nobody will take a drink in our of our alleys. But we do emphatically say that we can improve on what we've got now. Fewer people will drink. People will drink less. Drinking will be definitely discouraged and liquor much more inconvenient to get.

ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS SAY IT CAN BE ENFORCED.

Spokesmen of both the Statesboro police and the County officers say that with the co-operation of the people and the courts they can do a good job. They can make it tough on the bootlegger and hard to get liquor.

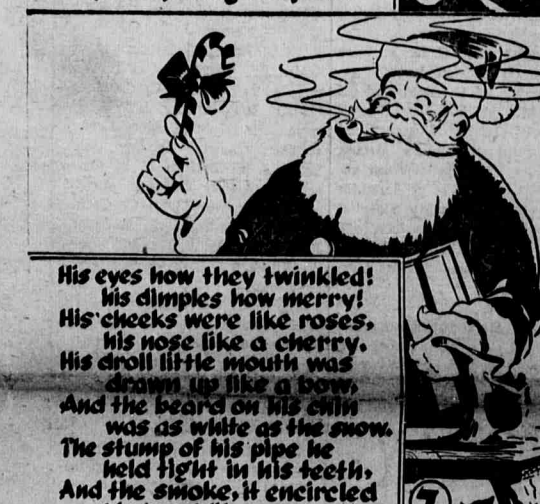
A Missil from St. Nicholas



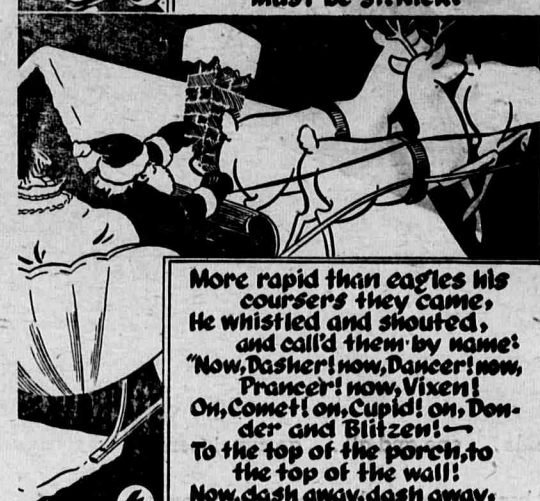

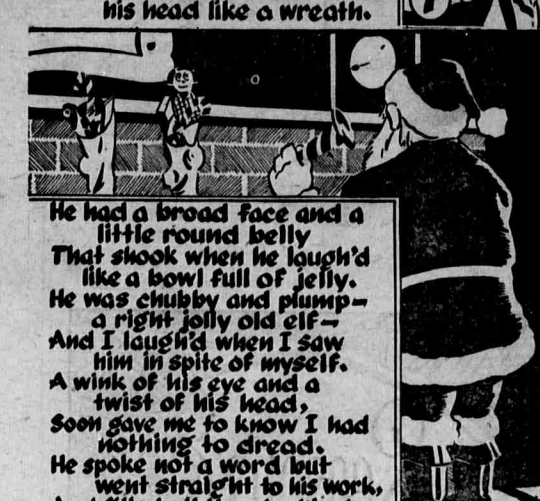

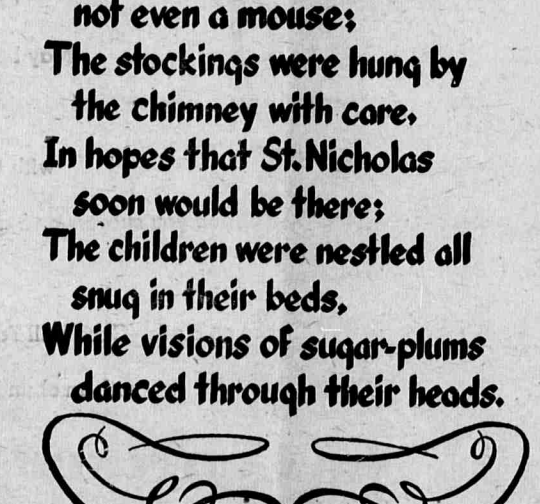
