MILTON CARLTON ANNOUNCES FOR SOLICITOR GENERAL. Milton A. Carlton, judge of the city court of Milton, and veteran of World War II, this week announced his candidacy for solicitor general of the Ogeechee Judicial Circuit.

Judge Carlton is 34 years of age, with an outstanding record of service in the recent war. He is a veteran of six major campaigns in the European Theatre, including the Battle of the Bulge. His unit was cited three times by the President for "extraordinary heroism in action."

BRANNEN PURSER WINS HIGH JUMP MEDAL IN MACON. Purser and Fee tied for first place at 5 feet and 9 inches in the high jump event. Each was given the first place medal. Purser won the district high jump medal in the district meet held here.

Lions Club Hears Story of Displaced Persons in Europe. Miss Violet G. Bemmel of New York City, was the guest speaker at the Statesboro Lions' meeting on Tuesday of this week.

Miss Bemmel, representative of the Citizens' Committee on Displaced Persons, is appearing before civic clubs, women's organizations and other organizations on behalf of the committee in promoting passage of the Fellow Bill, introduced in Congress by Congressman Fawcett, of Maine, which would allow 200,000 displaced persons to enter the United States from Europe over a period of two years.

Mr. R. C. Strubling, president of the association, will address the meeting regarding the principles involved in the organization.

The aims of the association are: (1) Better pay for bus drivers; (2) Improved roads; (3) standardization of drivers; (4) state to pay all transportation costs.

All school-minded people, especially school officials, are invited to attend this meeting.

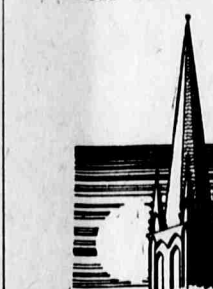

## Gov. Thompson Optimistic For Georgia's Future

Sounding a note of optimism, Governor M. E. Thompson told members of the Statesboro Junior Chamber of Commerce on Thursday of last week that Georgia today is the greatest Georgia it has ever been in its great and glorious history.

Talking to 89 Jaycees and their guests, Governor Thompson reviewed the industrial and agricultural setbacks and recoveries experienced since the period just before the War Between the States.

"Before the 1860's Georgia was known as The Empire State, and justly so," he said. He then told how Georgia suffered at the hands of the Union armies, and of the devastation that came along with the reconstruction years.

"It was in 1900 that Georgia lost two congressmen and North Carolina gained two congressmen because of a change in the population of the two states," he said.

"And then North Carolina challenged Georgia to the right to be known as 'The Empire State.'"

He stated that during World I, 90,000 Georgians served with the U. S. armed forces and with the end of that war more than one-half of those veterans deserted Georgia because of its dull future.

"But it was a different story with the end of 'World War II,'" he said. "400,000 Georgians served their country, and with the war over these 400,000 not only came back to Georgia but there was, an is, a definite influx of veterans coming into our state."

"We are not now making the mistakes we made after World War I," he explained. "There is no fight between rural and urban areas. We have learned that the city and country folks are dependent upon each other—there is no wall between them now—we're cooperating."

He stated that he had rather be Governor of Georgia today than at any time in its great history, and ended his talk on a high note of optimism for the future of the state.

He commended the Jaycees on their interest in promoting recreation facilities for the young people of Statesboro and the promotion of highways within the city and county.

He told them that contracts for paving state highway 67 into Pembroke will be let in June, and with that strip paved there will be only 8 miles of unpaved state roads in Bulloch county.

He also told them that the re-routing of U. S. 80 through the City of Statesboro is ready for the green light. "The money is earmarked and ready," he said, "waiting until the local rights of way can be secured."

Jim Coleman, director of publicity for Governor Thompson, was also a guest of the Jaycees.
