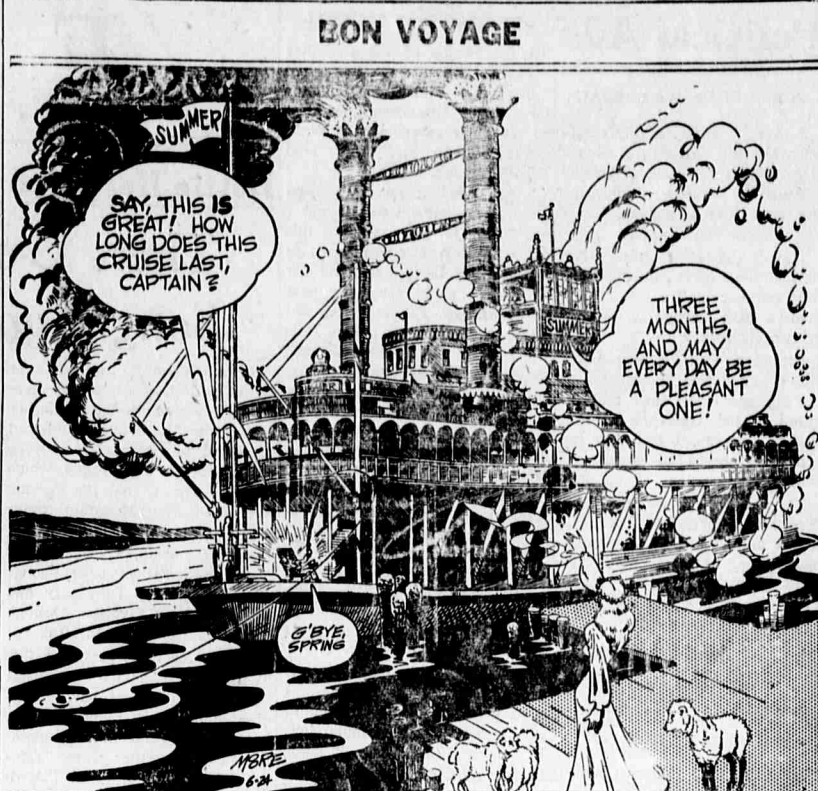

Statesboro Tobacco Market Leads In Pounds On Opening Day Sale

With no fanfare nor folderol, two tobacco auctioneers began their fascinating selling chant simultaneously here Thursday morning, as two sets of buyers lined up to buy tobacco belonging to growers in this section of Georgia and South Carolina.

When the day's sales were over, the Statesboro market had led the state in sales, with 600,000 pounds sold for \$312,000 to average 52 cents a pound. These are unofficial figures furnished the Associated Press.

The 52 cent per pound average is six cents higher than the opening day's average in 1947.

The Department of Agriculture reports highest opening prices ever recorded were paid throughout the Georgia-Florida flue-cured tobacco market today as all top grades brought well over the bids of a year ago.

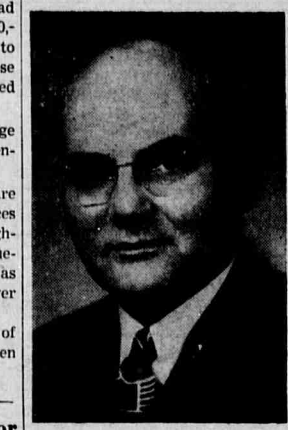
METTER FILES SUIT TO RETAIN GAMES WON

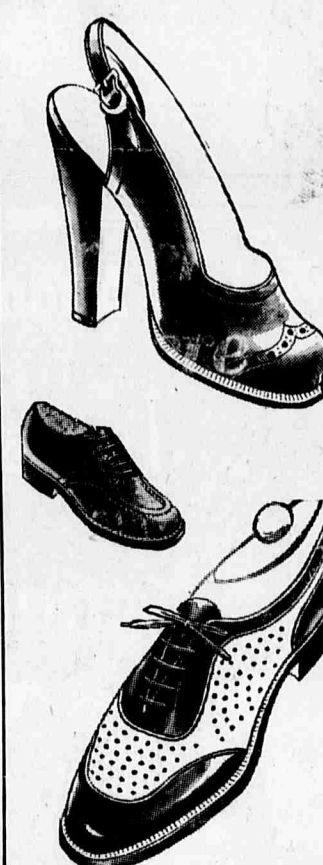

HAPPY DAYS ARE HERE AGAIN—That isn't exactly what Auctioneer Ed Rogers was saying the first sale day at a Statesboro warehouse, but it expresses the way most people were feeling about this year's record smashing opening leaf sales. Auctioneer Rogers, fifth man down left hand side of row being sold, was literally chanting a song of dollars for the growers who are eagerly watching him as he sells to the row of buyers behind him. All over the huge warehouse may be seen part of the approximately 450,000 pounds of good Georgia cigarette leaf that was on the floor when sales began. The leaf, piled on baskets (one of which may be seen in the foreground) is wrapped into sheets and carried away as fast as possible after the sale to make way for the next day's offerings.

This scene was shot by The Savannah Morning News Photographer Les Banks from a point about halfway down the warehouse. Over at the left may be seen a group of warehouse workers waiting for the sales crowd to thin a little so they may remove the leaf. Tobacco to the auctioneer's right has not yet been sold.

The auctioneer, while the most important man in the leaf sales picture, is but one of a large group of checkers, clerks and other warehouse personnel who handle complicated details of the sales. When a farmer sells his tobacco, he gets a check within a very short time.
