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A. Dorman Sells Station WWNS

Announcement is made this week that the Federal Communications Commission of Washington, D.C., has approved the sale of Radio Station WWNS of Statesboro by Alfred Dorman to Mrs. Virginia P. Bowen and Robert H. Thompson Sr.

The sale of the station has been pending for some time, awaiting the approval of the F.C.C.

The new owners will take over operation of the station on Monday, May 1.

Mr. Thompson, with several years' experience in radio broadcasting and newspaper publishing, will manage the station. He is married and has four children.

Before coming to Statesboro Mr. Thompson operated a printing office and office supply in Cordele, Mr. Dorman put WWNS on the air December 1, 1946. With Paul R. Saive as manager, the station has served Statesboro and surrounding communities since that date.

The station will continue its affiliation with the Mutual Broadcasting System.

2-Day Cooking School Here May 3 and May 4

Miss Elizabeth Parker, home service director of Georgia Power Company, will conduct a cooking school here Wednesday and Thursday, May 3 and 4, under sponsorship of the Statesboro Junior Woman's Club. Plans for the school were announced today by Mrs. Paul R. Saive, president.

Both sessions of the school will be held at the Statesboro grammar school auditorium, beginning at 3 o'clock p.m. There will be no admission charge.

Miss Parker is a native of Fairburn, Georgia, where she attended the public schools before entering Georgia State College for Women, where she received the degree of bachelor of science in home economics. She has also taken special courses in food freezing at the University of Georgia and the University of Tennessee.

Her practical experience in home management work began in 1929, when she joined the power company's home service staff. Other positions in radio, magazine, and advertising fields, and extensive work on the lecture platform have combined to make her one of the best known home economists in the South.

Miss Parker has conducted many cooking schools in this and other sections of the country. She has lectured widely. During 1938 and 1939 she conducted her own radio program in Philadelphia. Called "The Parker Parade," this program was carried over the NBC radio network and enjoyed a high rating for listener popularity.

Miss Parker returned to the power company in 1940 and was made home service director in 1947. During the war she had charge of the training of new home service employees in subjects having to do with equipment and kitchen and laundry planning.

Last year Miss Parker received the McCall Award, given annually by the McCall's Magazine for outstanding achievement in the home service field.

Local electrical dealers and independent retail food dealers of Statesboro will cooperate with the school.

The ladies of Statesboro and Bulloch county are invited to a cooking school to be held in the auditorium of Statesboro grammar school Wednesday and Thursday (May 3 and 4) of next week from 3 to 5 o'clock p.m.

The invitation is issued by members of the Junior Woman's Club who are sponsoring the school, and the electric appliance dealers of Statesboro who are participating. These are: Walter Aired Center, Hotpoint; W. A. Clinks and Son, Universal; Atkins Appliance Company; Frigidaire; Alfred Dorman Co.; Yukon's Best and Queen of the West; Franklin Radio Temples; Portals, Bobby Joe; Covart; Nevils, Butler Lewis; and first place winners in the pen class were Ronald Fordham, Brooklet; James Blitch, Statesboro; Ray Slaven, Register; Floyd Miller, Norval; James Haywood, Nevils, won a trip to the area show to be held in Savannah. Winners in the board division were: Ronald Dorn, Brooklet; Bailey Findley, Statesboro; John Anderson, Nevils, and Allen Bolter, Register.

The cooking school is free to all who attend.

Attractive door-prizes will be given away each day. Many other prizes, including merchandise, and the meals which will be cooked by the demonstrators of the school.

This is the first cooking school to be held here in a number of years.

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My Heart Is In This Work

"YOU ALL KNOW that my heart is in this work, and I believe we are going to grow, but if we do grow you know that we are going to have to learn, among many things, to put first things first. Organized more than 30 years ago, rural women began getting together in informal groups. With the help of the Federated Club Women of Georgia the first Home Demonstration Clubs were formed.

In Bulloch county the groups found the going rough, and during one period of 10 years they were without a home demonstration agent.

In 1934 there were four clubs with 115 members.

In 1950 there are 15 clubs with more than 800 members.

EMPLOYEES OF THE Motor Vehicle Unit of the Georgia Revenue Department making \$150 a month or more have been "asked" to kick in \$10 to \$50 to the Talmadge campaign fund.

Fix Up Your Box

IT MAY NOT seem very important to you. But to one man it is very important. And its importance to him should make it important to you.

If you live in rural Bulloch county, take a look at your mail box. Does it look like an army surplus hut?

If it does, do something about it. The Post Office Department has set aside the first week in May as "Rural Mail Box Improvement Week."

As a simple matter of appreciation you should have your mail box at the proper height and the proper distance from the road for your mail carrier. He travels many miles every day—rain or shine—to get you your mail, though it be nothing but a circular trying to get you to buy stock in an oil well, not yet dug, in China.

As a matter of personal pride your mail box should be neat, and painted, with your name in plain letters on its side. Weeds, grass and shrubbery should be

cut away from your box and the approach to and from the box should be kept clear at all times.

Postmaster Turner has been requested by the Post Office Department to make an inspection of all rural routes during the first 15 days in May, after which the "patrons should be advised of conditions in connection with their mail boxes which need to be corrected in order to have them comply with the requirements of postal regulations."

Do this for your mail carrier... he's your friend, and he deserves special consideration.

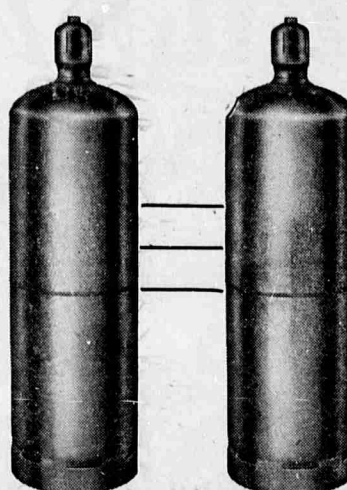

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Local Educational Authorities Learn About Eye Care

NEW YORK—Miss Marjorie A. C. Young, consultant in education for the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, was at T.C. this week to confer with local educational authorities concerning methods for training future teachers to equip them to better guard the sight of the children who will be under their care.

A test survey made by the National Society recently disclosed that an estimated four-and-a-half million children in American schools are in need of eye care. Although these children primarily require the services of the eye-care professions, Miss Young said that teachers can also play an important role by noting and reporting the first signs of eye trouble in children in the classrooms.

The national study now in progress is a first step toward providing teachers of the future with a greater knowledge of the eye problems of children. During the current year, Miss Young is attempting to find the answers to such questions as the following: How well are future teachers being prepared to understand the eye health of children? What facilities are available in the teachers colleges for actual classroom experience in relation to eye problems? What are the colleges doing to promote the eye health of prospective teachers themselves?

Miss Young received her training at Teachers College of the City of Boston, Boston University Graduate School, and the Yale Medical School. She was formerly associate professor of health education at Springfield College in Springfield, Mass., and for a number of years was a teacher in the public schools of Massachusetts.

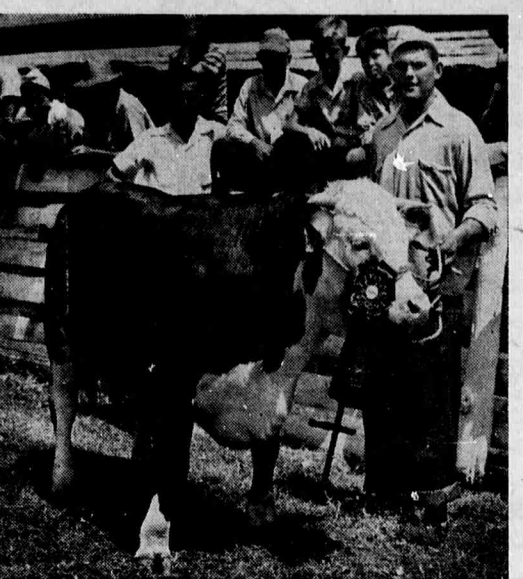
"The Lord Works In Strange Ways"

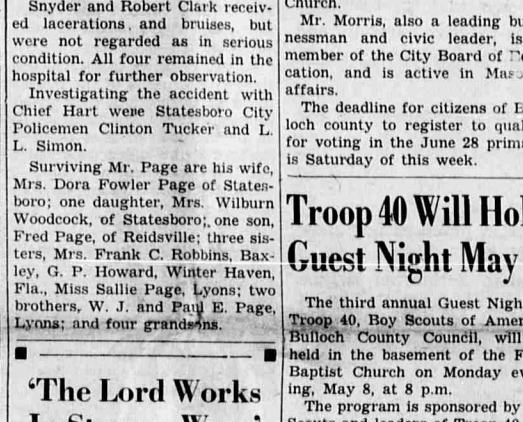

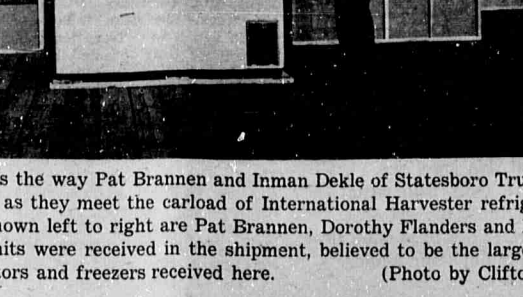

Pete Donaldson Speaks Saturday

George (Pete) Donaldson, president of Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College at Tifton and formerly of Statesboro, will be the principal speaker at the annual meeting of stockholders of the Statesboro National Farm Loan Association here Saturday morning, May 6, at 10 o'clock in the auditorium of the court house.

T. W. Rowe, secretary-treasurer of the organization, made the announcement this week.

Directors will be elected and reports on the past year's operations will be made at the meeting.

"Pete," as he is known in his home county, and abroad, is one of the state's outstanding speakers. He is one of the few holding honorary memberships in both the Future Farmers of America and the 4-H Club.

A graduate of the University of Georgia, he received his masters degree at Ohio State. He is a former representative in the General Assembly of Georgia and for a number of years was executive dean of Abraham Baldwin. In 1947 he was named president.

The Statesboro association is owned by more than 350 farmers engaged in general agriculture, timber and livestock farming who have invested more than \$40,000 in its capital stock. The association has loaned several million dollars to farmers in this area since its organization.

It now services three-quarter million dollars in loans for the Federal Land Bank of Columbia, and has the responsibility of making new loans for the bank available in Bulloch, Bryan, Evans, Effingham, Chatham, Liberty, Long, and McIntosh counties.
