Agronomist Names Southeast Winner In Cotton Contest

A Bulloch county farmer who had to leave for the Army before his crop was harvested has been named winner in the Southeast Georgia district 1950 five-acre cotton contest, E. C. Westbrook, Extension Service agronomist, announces.

A. S. Hunsicutt Jr. won the honor by producing 12,077 pounds of seed cotton on five acres.

Inaugurated in 1947, the contest is sponsored by the Georgia Cotton Crushers Association. Its purpose, Mr. Westbrook said, is to stimulate interest in producing larger, more profitable yields of cotton.

Mr. Hunsicutt planted Coker's 100 Wilt on April 13. A thousand pounds per acre of 0-12-12 was applied on March 15 before the seed was planted in 42-inch rows.

At planting, 480 pounds of 4-8-8 per acre was used. The cotton was side-dressed on June 15 with 200 pounds per acre of nitrate of soda, 100 pounds of muriate of potash and 100 pounds of 0-12-12. It was side-dressed again on July 7 with 200 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre and 100 pounds of 0-12-12.

Mr. Hunsicutt's cotton was positioned 13 times, 11 for boll weevils and two for red spider. Second prize in the district went to Cluise Smith, also from Bulloch county. Mr. Smith grew 10,698 pounds of seed cotton on five acres. He planted Coker's 100 Wilt breeder seed in 40-inch rows.

Hundred pounds of 4-9-9 was applied at seeding on March 31. The crop was side-dressed June 15 with 75 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre and 100 pounds of muriate of potash per acre. Mr. Smith positioned his cotton six times.

Planting from 40 to 50 acres of cotton annually, this Bulloch farmer averaged around a bale per acre for five years.

M. C. Oliver, Screven county, won third place. He grew 10,340 pounds of seed cotton on five acres.

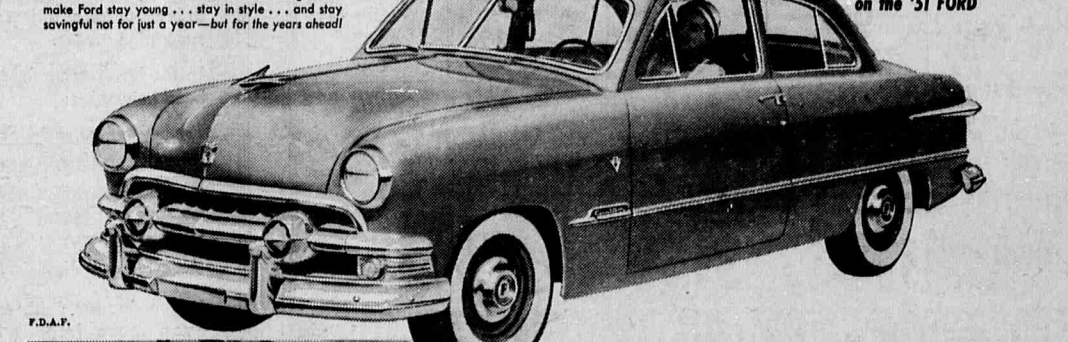

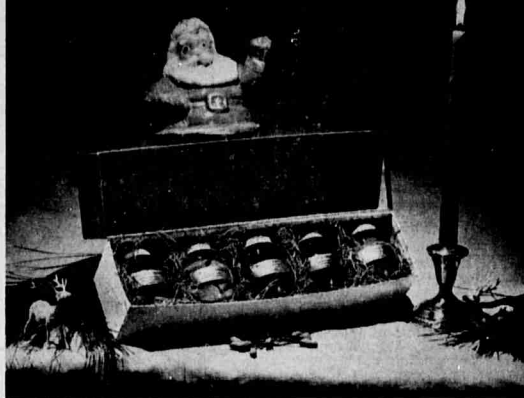

Using the combine enables the Georgia farmer to pick, shell and clean the corn in less than 15 minutes. His neighbors pay from 15 to 20 cents a bushel for shelling plus the picking expense. No, I'm not going to try to get any patent. But I know it'll work. And I'd like to see somebody make a similar machine to sell," he says.

Basic piece of equipment in the new combine is a regular two-row corn picker (Oliver). H. V. took

Max Lockwood Tells Rotarians Of Needs Of Statesboro, Nation's Youth

In a talk to the Statesboro Rotarians on Monday of this week, Max Lockwood, director of the city's recreation program, painted a word picture of the needs of the youth of Statesboro and the state and nation.

Using figures, he emphasized the need of providing proper recreation facilities for young people and adults.

His picture of the local situation looked good compared to other sections. The entire text of Mr. Lockwood's talk follows:

"Most of us are aware of the program we have for our youth in Statesboro and Bulloch county. I would like to take this opportunity to discuss our needs on a broader level and to look at the needs of the youth of the state and national level, and to make comparison where possible.

"In this day and time, it is easier to attract the attention of a group of businessmen when they begin to talk to them through their pocketbook.

"I take just a minute to show you the cost of delinquency to the citizens of our state for both youth and adults for the period of only 12 months.

"The latest figures we have are for 1947, what we might call one of our best years as far as our economy is concerned. In that year, Georgia spent \$2,500,000 on crime delinquency. In the same year, the city of Atlanta alone spent over \$3,000,000 on this same problem. It is easy to see that the total cost to the state in dollars and cents would run into many times this amount. This does not consider the loss to the state in potential contributors to the state welfare or the moral breakdown in our communities, or the anguish to individuals of the community, or the adverse influence on the whole community.

"The sad fact is that delinquency is on the increase all over the United States.

"In 1949, the Georgia Citizens Council released a report compiled with the cooperation of the Attorney General and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, showing that Georgia was in the top ten states in the nation for juvenile delinquency.

"Working Together, We Can Remove the Causes of Juvenile Delinquency, Crime." If we look at this problem only from an economic view, without considering the human element, we can see that it would be well worth our while to do something about the problem facing us. I believe that as Georgians we will survive this situation and will do something about it. It is not a question of whether it can be done; rather, it is a question of whether we will take the trouble to do it.

"This report shows in plain figures that 76 percent of all the juvenile delinquency cases reported in 1947 never belonged to any supervised playground or youth organization, such as Scouts, Y's, or 4-H clubs, or other character-building organizations. This, of course, brings to mind the question of how many of Georgia's boys and girls belong to any of these character-building organizations.

Roy Harris Tells G.E.A., F.B. To Not Forget Local Problems During Crisis

Roy Harris, former Speaker of the House of Representatives of the State of Georgia, told members of the Bulloch county unit of the Georgia Educational Association at Brooklet on Wednesday night of last week that we must

not forget our local problems, the education and training of our youth, the raising of the standards of our living, even in the present struggle for survival against the constant pressure of Communism to dominate the world.

Mr. Harris addressed the Brooklet Farm Bureau immediately after his talk to the county teachers. He was presented to both groups by F. Everett Williams, senator-elect from the 49th senatorial district.

Lester Atkins, president of the teachers' organization, presided at the meeting held in the Brooklet Community House, and presented Mr. Williams. Others at the speaker's table were H. W. Pomack, county school superintendent; J. H. Griffith, principal of Brooklet schools; Sam Graham, representative from Richmond county; Norman Lawrence, of the Georgia Power Co., Augusta; A. J. Trapp, Bulloch county representative; Rev. W. Cassidy, and Leslie Coleman.

Mr. Harris addressed the Brooklet Farm Bureau immediately after his talk to the county teachers. He was presented to both groups by F. Everett Williams, senator-elect from the 49th senatorial district.

Mr. Harris told the county teachers that it is good business to invest in education. He pointed out that in 1948 the average per capita income in the United States was \$1,410. In Georgia, the per capita income was \$971. He added, "If each person in Georgia had received the United States average income, it would have amounted to \$439 more per capita. This would be a total annual increase of \$1,317,000,000 in the income of citizens of the state."

He deplored the fact that Georgia spends only \$112 per pupil (based on average daily attendance), while New York State pays \$312 per pupil in average daily attendance, with other states spending from \$200 to \$300.

He placed the blame for our low per capita income on these figures, for "our per capita income is in direct proportion to the amount we spend on public education (to control red spiders)."

Mr. Harris then reviewed the story of the Minimum Foundation Program for Education. He related how it was conceived, how Dr. C. C. Alderhold made the survey and conducted the study of the idea, and how it was adopted and written into the law in 1949. "But it has never yet been financed," he said.

Mr. Harris is all for the Minimum Foundation program. He believes in it wholeheartedly. He emphasized the need for better school plants, for expanded programs of vocational training, and for providing better salaries for teachers.

"We must make this investment in the education of the youth of our state," he said.

He then told the teachers that Negroes in one-third of the counties of Georgia have filed petitions asking for school facilities equal to those in the white schools. "We are trying to uphold the doctrine of equal but separate facilities," he explained. "And unless we go into the courts with an intelligent plan, and show that we

intend to provide equal facilities, separate, we'll see segregation done away with now."

It was then that he said that it is going to take every man and woman in Georgia paying their equal share, according to their ability, and he said part of the answer is a sales tax.

He revealed that 90 percent of the taxes in the state are paid by 20 percent of the families of the state. The Negroes, constituting one third of the state's population, pay less than three percent of the taxes.

In closing, he said that improving the school situation in Georgia will take many years and a great deal of effort.

In his informal talk to members of the Brooklet Farm Bureau, he again stressed the points made before the teachers' organization.

Abandoned Schools Now Prove Community Boon

Abandoned school buildings can still be the hub of community activities, if the action by various groups in the Ogeechee, Denmark, and Esala communities can be taken as a guide and pattern.

Generally, the school in any community is a point of common interest and is the one community activity in which everyone is interested. Community life, more or less revolves around the school because of the common feeling everyone has for the school. Generally, the type community that exists in any given area can be fairly well predicted by seeing the school and the activities around the school.

When enrollment dropped at Ogeechee, Denmark, and Esala, county with other conditions, and forced the communities to give up their schools, other groups moved into the buildings and made them into community centers. Community life is still centered around the school buildings.

The Home Demonstration Club, Farm Bureau, and Associated Women all cooperated in the Ogeechee and Denmark program. The Farm Bureau took lead at Esala. Ogeechee now has a modern lunchroom, with two large dining halls, an assembly hall, and has converted the old lunchroom into a meeting place for the Home Demonstration Club. Rugs and curtains, along with appropriate decorations, have been used to make the rooms more attractive. Denmark has renovated the lunchroom to take care of large crowds at the Farm Bureau meetings. Play rooms have been set up for the youngsters so that they can be out of the regular meetings. Esala has developed their school building along the same line as Denmark. These three community schools are still active, even though school is not taught there any more.
