His ratproof cement block barn has a false wire floor and a drier made of three tobacco barn heating units. Fans force hot air from these units up through corn piled four feet deep on the false floor.

In 1949, when he entered the Institutional On-Farm training class at Register High School taught by L. G. Boddiford, H. V. set out on a plan to steadily improve his yields over a five-year period. That year he averaged slightly over 50 bushels on 120 acres. Last summer's long, dry spell just when corn was in the "making" stage kept him from equalling that yield in 1950. He has gathered as high as 90 bushels from an acre.

Hogs and cattle harvest any corn that H. V. "wastes" in the fields. Other crops on the Franklin farm include 30 acres cotton, 30 acres peanuts and four acres tobacco.

A self-styled bachelor who lives with his widowed mother; he is president of the Register Farm Bureau and she heads the local chapter of Associated Farm Bureau Women.

"When I was tinkering with my combine last summer," H. V. relates, "she kept protesting that it wasn't going to work and I couldn't waste so much time piddling with it."

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# Bulloch County Bank Increases It's Capital Stock to \$100,000

Bulloch County Bank stockholders today received their sixteenth consecutive dividend since the bank was chartered in 1934. The dividend was for the usual cash dividend of ten percent on \$100 per value.

Dr. R. J. Kennedy, president of the bank, stated today that the announcement of the dividend, together with the dividend check, went out to stockholders in a letter dated yesterday.

He stated that the letter also gave notice that the bank's directors unanimously recommended to the stockholders that the capital stock of the bank be increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

Dr. Kennedy said that the announcement of the increase in the capital stock read as follows:

"We give you notice that our annual stockholders meeting will be held at the office of the bank on January 9, 1951, and that among routine business to be passed on at that time will be the unanimous recommendation of your board of directors that our capital stock be increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000 by the payment of a 100 percent stock dividend and that this be accomplished by the transferring of \$50,000 from our undivided profits account to capital account. This provides Bulloch county with a bank of greater capitalization than currently and which we feel our county deserves to meet its banking needs."

The letter also advised that bank deposits are now insured up to \$10,000 in each account as compared to a former coverage of \$5,000.

Dr. Kennedy further stated that the bank will soon begin a general remodeling program made necessary by plans to install a new vault door.

"The new vault door will be of the very latest design," the bank official said. "By moving the present vault, more floor space will be made available to accommodate the growth of the bank. It is the bank's policy to stay in step with the trend of the times," he explained.

The Bulloch County Bank opened on April 14, 1934. It paid its first dividend on December 20, 1935. In 1941, the first remodeling was done and then again in 1944 and 1948 additional remodeling was completed. The proposed changes are made necessary by the continued growth of the bank, requiring more floor space in which to render adequate service.

The capital increase from accumulated reserves is in line with sound banking practices toward strengthening the banking structure of the nation.

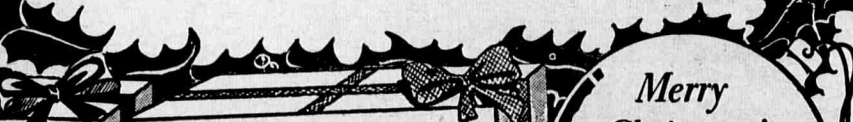

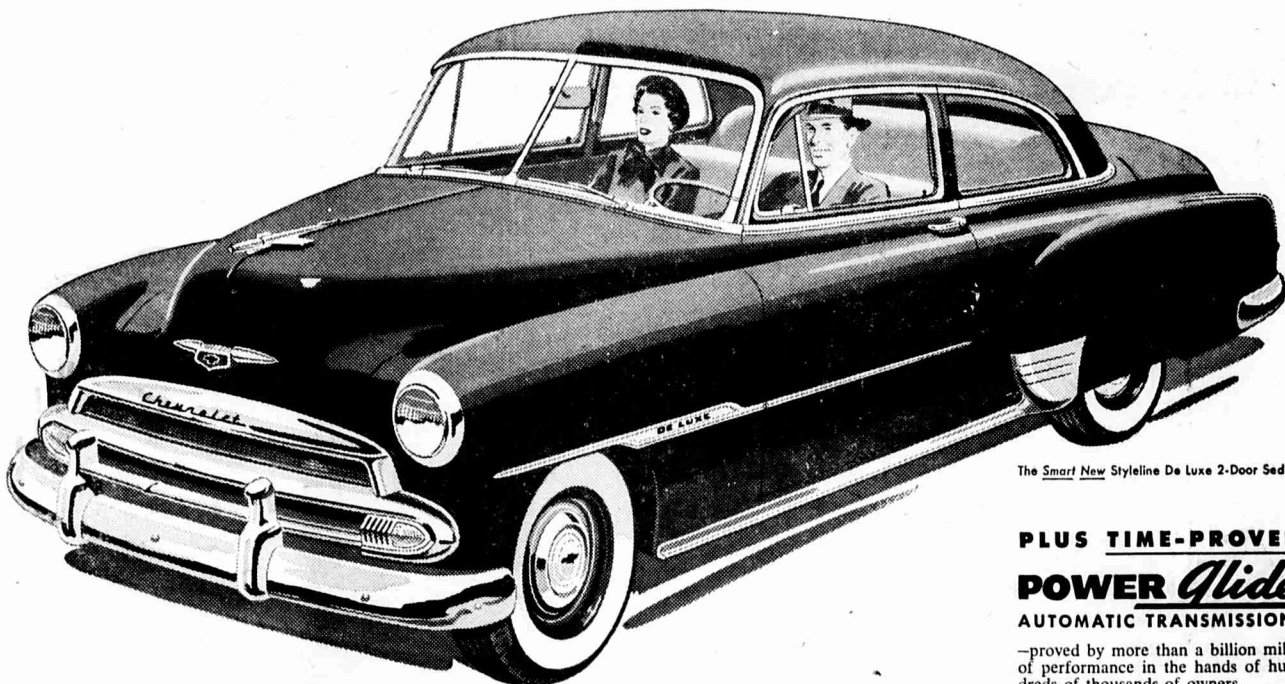
