When the City Election was held here Saturday the six candidates for councilmen were conspicuous by their absence from the court house.

By mutual consent and agreement J. Barney Averitt, J. Gilbert Cone, John Everett, Dr. Glenn Jennings, Dr. J. C. Lane and Bonnie Morris, all candidates, did not last minute electioneering in the court house. Except when each one went in to cast his personal ballot none of them were about the court house.

For years it has been the custom of candidates in any election which is held in the court house to stand at the head of the stairs and the entrance to the court room where the ballot boxes are and solicit votes, using a parroted expression "Don't forget me".

We know of a lady who went to vote in one election and as she started up the stairs in the court house one candidate, in a very pleading voice, begged for her vote. She, had in her mind decided to vote for someone else, but when this candidate sought her vote, she turned and went home without voting for anyone. 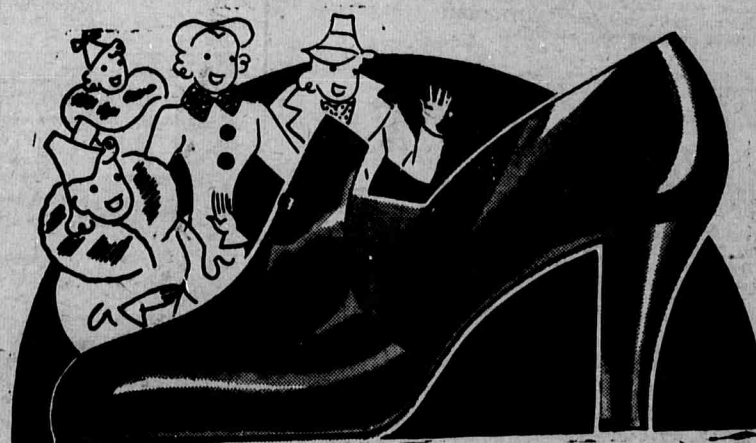

National Guard Maneuvers In Field Training

More than 120 members of Battery C, 214th, C. A. A. Anti-Aircraft of the Statesboro National Guards spent last Saturday and Sunday in active field training.

Candidates Unopposed In Primary

Bulloch county cotton growers asked for continuance of marketing quotas on cotton for 1940 by a 98 per cent favorable vote Saturday. With 1533 votes cast, only 35 were against the quotas and 1475 quots.

The Lochart district maintained its perfect record of not casting a vote against quotas.

In all the referendums held on marketing quotas, the 46th district has not cast an unfavorable vote against the quotas. The Blitch district this year polled 63 votes against the quotas and none against.

The votes returned by the committee from the 44th district showed 70 for quotas and none against; the Emitt district polled 65 favorable votes without any unfavorable votes; the Blitch district polled 100 per cent favorable with 117 votes; and Nevils joined the 100 per cent returns with 95 favorable votes.

In the 45th district 68 favorable votes and 4 unfavorable were cast; in the 46th district only 7 were cast against and 78 favorable; the Hagin returned 5 against and 124 favorable; the Statesboro district polled 452 for and 13 against; the Bay returned 35 favorable and 1 against; the Brooklet district 127 for and 2 against; and the Portal cast 3 unfavorable and 181 favorable.

18,011 BALES OF COTTON GINNED IN BULLOCH IN 1939
