### Getting Something Done

We congratulate Councilman Glenn S. Jennings on his recognizing the needs of the Grammar School building of the Statesboro school. Ever since building the new High School building 18 years ago the Grammar School building has been rather neglected. With the summer vacation, through the efforts and the vision of Dr. Jennings and with the cooperation of the city council and engineer new hardware floors will be placed in every room in the Grammar School building.

Dr. Jennings is chairman of the property committee of the city council and on a recent visit to the Grammar School building immediately saw the need of something being done to the floors. He found them completely worn out and dangerous to bare feet. Seeing the need he immediately began working on having them renewed. Through his efforts he succeeded in buying enough hardwood floor at approximately one-third of retail cost, and as soon as school is out the work will begin.

It is good to know that the members of our city council are not forgetting their responsibilities.

### Something Must Be Done

This week 129 checks totaling \$2,855.53 were distributed to 129 citizens of Statesboro and Bulloch County. There are four of these checks each year. This money amounting to \$11,421.12 trickles into the cash registers of the drug store, the department store, the grocery store, the jewelry store, the garage man, the auto dealer, your place of business and our place of business.

This \$11,421.12 together with approximately \$3,000 more, at various other times during the year, passes into the channels of business in Statesboro. Now if we were to predict that this total of approximately \$14,000 was in danger of being lost to Statesboro there would be the question, "What is he talking about, anyway?"

Just this. There is in Statesboro a unit of the National Guard made up of 129 men and officers. They own the building known as the Armory, in which more than \$120,000 in brand new equipment, together with an unestimated amount of other equipment is housed. And it is a sad truth that the Armory, because of its run-down condition, does not now provide the proper housing for this equipment placed here by the United States government. And Uncle Sam has a habit of liking for his equipment to be properly taken care of and if Statesboro cannot provide the proper care then there are other cities that would toss up their hats for the opportunity to do so.

Statesboro and Bulloch County must squarely face the fact that unless something is done to help the National Guard recondition the Armory to provide proper housing for its equipment then they stand to lose nearly \$15,000 annually in spendable income.

## Woman of the Week

"Maude" Edge, as she is known all over Bulloch County, is in every sense of the phrase "One of Bulloch County's First Women." She is the eldest of five children of James Alonzo Brannen. She was born in Statesboro on November 7, 1881. She graduated from Wesleyan College in Macon in 1901 and on December 10, 1902 she married and moved with her husband to North Carolina.

From that date until September, 1937 Miss Maude has lived in North Carolina, in Virginia, New Jersey, Maryland, Pennsylvania and Georgia. She is the mother of seven children and the grandmother of four grandchildren. Her children are Miss Mary Allen Edge of New York City, Mrs. R. R. Oran of New York City, Mrs. Roberts Appel of Lancaster, Pa., Walter Edge and Anne Edge of Baltimore and the twins, John Edge at Vanderbilt University and James Edge at the University of Georgia.

During the years 1937 Miss Maude attended John Hopkins University in Baltimore studying for a Doctor of Philosophy degree, which she hopes to receive soon.

The work for which she is best known is her two years as chairman of the Bulloch County chapter of the Red Cross. At present her energies are concentrated upon adult education in the county and the rehabilitation of deserving families whose needs attract her attention.

She is reticent in talking about her work among those unable to

help themselves. She is an inspiration to numerous families who have because of her helping hand have changed from community liabilities to community assets. She is proud of her family and her children are a constant source of satisfaction to her. She knows no high, wide and beautiful road. It is the blending of notes of music which made up the character of Miss Maude, a character lovely to know and an inspiration to all who come under her influence.

SOMEBETTER BRIGHTER  
OUTLOOK FOR HOGS,  
FARM AGENT REPORTS

County Agent Byron Dyer said this week that indications point to an increased consumer demand for pork in Georgia according to information received from L. E. Farmer, state Agricultural Extension Service marketing specialist.

"Although present hog prices are rather discouraging to Georgia farmers, the prices have held up very well considering that the fall and spring crop totals about 83 million head, one of the largest on record for the nation," Farmer said.

"Comparing 1939 and 1940 slaughter with the depression years of 1932-33, the 1939-40 slaughter will probably be slightly larger, yet prices for 1932-33 reached a considerably lower level.

In 1932-33 prices during December and January ranged from \$2.75 to \$3.25 per hundred weight, while in 1939-40 averaged \$4.86 per hundred weight for December and \$5.01 for January."

There is a possibility, the specialist said, that the warping foreign nations will exhaust their supplies and will turn to America for more of their pork and lard, thereby creating a better demand for hogs and by-products.

Farmer urged Georgia hog producers to adopt a long range viewpoint on hog raising and cautioned them not to be discouraged over the present prices. A clam, business-like attitude on the part of the producer combined with good stock, with particular emphasis of good sires, proper feed and proper attention is necessary, the specialist summarized, for a grower to win a favorable position in the rapidly expanding hog industry in the state.

Plans were drawn and suggestions made for the improvement of 678 homes, schools, and miscellaneous projects during 1939 through work of the Georgia Agricultural Extension Service.

# CLEAN UP or CLOSE UP

Georgia's beer industry, which employs more than 10,000 Georgians, has payrolls of \$6,000,000 and pays \$4,000,000 annually in taxes, banded itself together February 14 to eliminate undesirable conditions where they are permitted in a minority of the State's 3,000 legal beer outlets.

Recognizing that beer's good name in Georgia, as in other states, suffered from a law-violating minority, the beer industry organized itself into the Brewers and Beer Distributors Committee of Georgia. This committee represents 98 per cent of the industry in the state. Our purpose is to maintain the beer industry permanently on a respectable basis.

Chosen to head this self-regulatory program was Judge John S. Wood of Canton, Ga., former Solicitor-General and Superior

Court Judge, and former member of Congress. In his hands the industry placed authority to deal sternly with the small percentage of beer retailers who refuse to observe the laws and the sentiment of their community.

Judge Wood will call on state, county or city officials in behalf of the organized beer industry to revoke the licenses of such retail outlets.

The industry will also refuse to sell beer to outlets operating in violation of the law. Public officials and the press praised this program as "definitely in the public interest," a "real public service" and "a move of old, foresight and respect for law." You, the public, can help in this campaign by patronizing only reputable, law-abiding places selling beer.

## ACTION!

On February 15, the day after the Beer Committee's formation, newspapers reported that four high school boys in Spalding County were suspended after buying illegal whiskey from a "hot spot" near the school grounds.

Judge Wood accepted the challenge, obtained evidence against three retail outlets near the schoolhouse, and turned it over to Spalding County authorities. On February 21, the operators were arrested, the beer licenses revoked, and the places padlocked by the County officials, exactly one week after the "clean up or close up" program was launched.

## News of Interest To Bulloch Farmers

**4-H CLUB CARNIVAL**  
College 4-H club members at the University of Georgia are busy engaged in preparing for their fifth annual carnival to be held on March 1. This occasion is a gala affair each year, and has as its purpose to raise money to go into a 4-H club fund for assisting worthy children to attend college. The carnival is sponsored by the College 4-H Club, in co-operation with the various other student organizations on the College of Agriculture campus. Jesse Miller, of Grady county, is president of the club and manager of the carnival.

**SERICEA IS VALUABLE**  
Lespedeza sericea is one of the most valuable soil-conserving plants and will grow where others cannot. A mature stand of sericea will measure four to five feet high and the woody and widely branched roots penetrate the soil to a depth of more than three feet. For hay, it rates favorably with the best quality hay crops. It should be mown before the plants reach a height of more than 15 inches. Sericea also makes good grazing, since its protein content is high. The extensive root system of the plant helps to hold the soil in place while the bushy foliage protects the soil from being rains and reduces run-off.

**RECOGNIZING A NEED**  
Gardens, cows, hogs, and chickens, plus orchards and feed for livestock, form the basis for a home-grown food and feed supply. The 1935 farm census showed that there are about 2,200,000 farms in the nine southern states, 623,000 of which were without home gardens, 638,000 without milk cows, 800,000 without hogs, and 293,000 without even a hen. The Triple-A agricultural conservation program recognizes the extreme need for increased production of food and feed for home consumption in southern farms, and two bulletins have been made available to assist farmers in seeking a better home-produced living from the soil. Copies of both publications, "Conserving Soil Through the Farm Program," and "Feeding Farm Folks," have been sent to all county offices.

**FAT CATTLE SHOWS**  
With spring coming, fat cattle shows are already attracting a great deal of interest over the state. Georgia's first fat cattle show was held in Savannah in March, 1932, with 70 head of cattle being exhibited and sold. It is estimated that not more than 5 per cent of these cattle graded U. S. Medium or better, according to R. E. Davis, extension beef cattle and sheep specialist. In 1939, there were 14 fat cattle shows with more than 2,000 animals ex-

hibited and sold. Eighty-five per cent of these cattle graded U. S. Medium or better.

**LAND-USE PLANNING**  
Land-use planning is a very important phase of every county agricultural program. It is a part of a nation-wide activity, endorsed and supported by all agencies of the Department of Agriculture, to study land-use problems and develop program which fit local conditions and to accelerate action on those programs. It deals with one of the county's fundamental problems. Real constructive thinking by farm people on their land-use problems will assist materially in the formulation of a well rounded county agricultural program.

**B. B. MORRIS NOW OWNS ALL OF BRANNEN BUILDING**  
It was announced this week that Benjie Morris had purchased the interest in the Brannen building on West main street, formerly owned by E. A. Smith and Horace Smith. Mr. Morris now owns the entire building. It is now occupied by the County Agents' office, the Banner State Printing Company, the Bulloch Herald, Crouse and Jones Monument Co. and B. B. Morris Company.

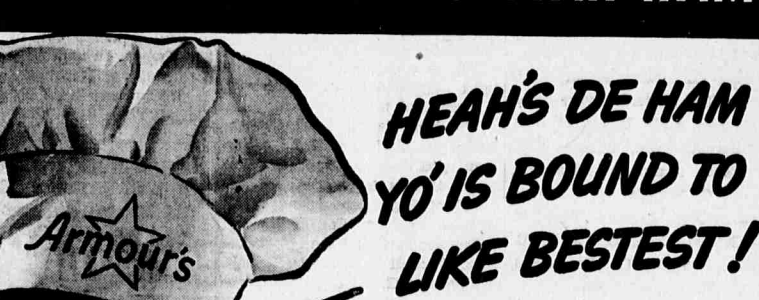

A. boys have the best finished cattle they have ever produced for showing together with the assured cooperation of the leading buyers of good cattle and the possibility of having cattle from other counties in the show and sale, indication are the show here on April 11 will be second to none in the state for 1940.

The Rotary Club, the Chamber of Commerce, the Junior Chamber and United Georgia Farmers are co-operating to put the show and sale on.
