"Henry" a 1080-lb Hereford steer, belonging to Montrose Graham, 4-H boy of Stilwell, was declared the Grand Champion of the more than 300 head of fat cattle shown at Statesboro and Bulloch county's fat stock show and sale held here last Thursday. The champion was purchased by Rogers Store for \$216 at 20 cents a pound. Young Graham sold three other steers together with the champion, for \$528.72 net. The 304 head of cattle sold from \$8 a hundred pounds up to \$20. The price range ran \$9.75 to \$10.50 for choice cattle; \$9 to \$9.50 for good and \$8.50 to \$9 for medium. The total sale brought \$18,788.62. Garner Hall Fields selected one of his four calves and took reserve champion prize with his F. F. A. steer. The steer was bred and fed here on J. B. Fields' farm in this county. Rogers Store bought this steer at \$14 a hundred pounds. Young Fields sold his four calves for \$518 net.

Montrose Graham, Stilwell 4-H clubster and winner of the Grand Championship in the fat stock show here last week, maintained his record in feeding good cattle for the spring shows and sales. He not only maintained his record but bettered it in quality of cattle and then in money earned. He started the feeding year off with "Henry," a purebred Hereford steer, and "Tex," a western steer. These steers were purchased last summer and kept in good condition until early fall when they were put on full feed. All the calves responded well except "Tex." He was too wild to get to finish out as Montrose thought he should. This calf is being finished out for a special market later on. The steers had all the ground corn (cob and shuck), a little cottonseed meal, some soybean meal, and hay they wanted. When graded at the show and sale held here Thursday, "Henry" and "Alvin" were called U. S. primes, "Mac" top choice, and "Bob" choice. This was the fourth prime this young cattleman had ever finished. However, in the past two years he has had only one prime each year. The calves sold for \$10.25 per hundred for "B," \$10.50 for "Mac," \$11.75 for "Alvin" and "Henry" returned the fancy price of \$20 per hundred. The four steers returned this 4-H club boy \$528.72 net.

"Increasing Our Wealth and Income" will be the first subject for discussion on the Georgia Progress Program at the Teachers' College tomorrow night at 10 o'clock. The discussion will be led by Dr. Harry Vaughn, director, Engineering Experiment Station of Georgia Tech in Atlanta. This discussion will open the sixth annual Georgia Progress Program at the Georgia Teachers' college. The theme of the program is "Planning a Better Georgia."

A number of the state's leading men and women will gather here to take part in one of the most ambitious programs attempted by the college. The program has been arranged by Dr. C. M. Dentler, of the Department of History. The program Friday will be as follows:

Georgia Progress Days Began in 1934

In March 1935 President Marvin S. Pittman, of the Georgia Teachers' college, introduced a new educational program in the form of a Georgia Progress conference. The sixth annual program will be held at the college tomorrow and Saturday with the theme "Planning a Better Georgia." In keeping with other conferences such as the Teachers' conference at the University of Georgia, the college here inaugurated a program with an even broader field. The first program, March 8-9, 1935, was a conference on "The Teaching Profession in Georgia." Chancellor Philip W. Weller was one of the principal speakers. Dr. J. C. Meadows, of the University of Georgia, was a leader of a discussion with educators from all parts of the state participating. The second Georgia Progress Program was held March 12, 1938, with Dr. E. Laurence Palmer, of Cornell University, and Dr. Hanner A. Webb, of Peabody as the speakers. Last year the program was on "Progressive Education in Theory and Practice," with Dr. William H. Kilpatrick, of Columbus University, and Dr. Paul Misner, of Glenwood, Ill., as the leaders. The program this year is based on the reports of the Citizens' Fact Finding Committee of Georgia, with leaders in every field concerned participating in the program.

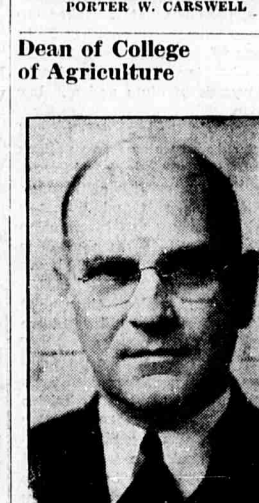

ROTARY DISTRICT GOVERNOR HERE MONDAY

Maynard E. Ashworth, of Columbus, who is governor of this district of Rotary International, will be in Statesboro next Monday on his official visit to the Rotary club of this city.

Mr. Ashworth is publisher of the Ledger-Enquirer paper of Columbus, a member of the Rotary club there, and was elected governor of the 16th district at Rotary's thirtieth annual convention in Cleveland last June.

President A. M. Braswell and Secretary Everett Williams, of the Statesboro Rotary club, and the forty-four other members of the club will confer with Rotary Governor Ashworth on matters of club administration and activities. The Rotary club of Statesboro was organized in 1937 and now meets weekly at Jaekel hotel.

Rotary Governor Ashworth was one of the nearly 200 men who were elected to serve Rotary's 5,000 clubs and 210,000 Rotarians in eighty countries and geographical divisions of the world.

Bulloch's Health Program Recognized

Dr. Philip L. Riley, Cleveland, Ohio, representing the American Public Health Association, came to Bulloch County last week to study the county's organization for health education. The Bulloch County Program had been recommended to the American Public Health Association for its successful techniques in co-ordinating the health activities of many agencies, particularly, the County Health Department, the Public Schools, the local physicians in the County, the dental dentists, and Georgia Teachers' College. The Bulloch County Program was recommended by the Georgia State Department of Education and the Georgia State Department of Public Health.

Dr. Riley visited several schools in Bulloch County. He was especially interested in the following activities: the hot lunch projects which help to provide and educate toward a better diet for children in the rural schools; the work done by departments of agriculture in co-operation with fields to improve the food raised by the people in the County; the successful attempts to immunize against typhoid fever, smallpox, and diphtheria; the co-operation of dentists, teachers, children and patrons in dental health; the attempts to provide adequate hand-washing facilities in the schools; the co-operation of local physicians with the Health Department in the reduction of venereal disease; the work done in co-operation with the county sanitary engineer in the fight against malaria, in making the county water supply sanitary, and in the improvement of sewage disposal.

After the visits in the schools, Dr. Riley observed the work of the Bulloch County Health Department in co-operation with local physicians. At the close of the day, he held a conference with Mr. H. P. Womack, County Superintendent; Dr. O. F. Whitman, Health Commissioner; Mrs. Dickinson, County Nurse, and Jane Franchet, County Supervisor from Georgia Teachers' College. Dr. Riley was especially complimentary of the co-operation which was in evidence among the different health agencies in the County. Special recognition was given to Mr. Fred Hodges, Chairman of the County Commissioners, for his interest in helping to make the program successful.

It is to Bulloch County's credit that she is being recognized for the work and progress made in her Health Program. The American Public Health Association has asked for a complete description of the Bulloch County Health Program. This is now being prepared and will be sent to that Association for study.

Youth Shows the Way

Last Thursday is a day that will be long remembered in Bulloch County as the day when the County's Youth stepped ahead in the Parade of Progress.

At the Statesboro and Bulloch County Fat Stock Show thirty-two of the County's young boys and girls, members of the 4-H Club and the Future Farmers of America demonstrated what can be done in this section in the live stock industry.

Every one of the young people between the ages of 12 and 16. They brought to the show cattle that would win prizes in any fat stock show, and when the sale was over they carried home with them nearly \$15,000.

We wish to congratulate the committee in charge of the Statesboro and Bulloch County Fat Stock Show held at the Bulloch Stock Yards last Thursday.

The show and sale was a success in every sense of the word. More than \$18,000 were realized from the sale of the cattle shown. Thousands of the County's citizens gathered to see its young people show the results of their year's work. Buyers proclaimed the show and sale the best they had ever attended.

Every buyer present at the sale remained until the last steer had been led through the auction ring. This is most unusual for a show and sale like the one held that day, and is a compliment to the live stock growers in this section and the sponsoring groups.

The show and sale which is an annual event promises to become the biggest thing in the County, and it is to those who make it possible that we say "Well Done."

CANCER FACTS

As medical science has conquered one disease after another, the old legends and folklore about bodily ailments have gradually been discarded. Today, however, there are still many curious ideas that are widespread about cancer. A vast army has been organized with the idea of educating the public on facts relating to cancer. This army, known as the Women's Field Army, is now working here in Statesboro.

At a meeting of the local committee held last Saturday, Dr. A. J. Mooney told them that cancer is not an incurable disease. "In its early stages, it is usually curable," said Dr. Mooney. Continuing, he said: "It is not due to a germ nor is it contagious. You can not catch cancer than from one person to another. It is a disease of the cells of the body. It is not a blood disease and there is no test of the blood that will reveal the presence of cancer, except in rare types."

"Though painful in its later stages, cancer at its beginning seldom causes discomfort. Cancer is nothing but an irregular growth of the cells and growth is not a painful process. Pain occurs when the parietic cancer cells interfere with the nerves or the normal functions of the body."

"Medical science does not completely understand the cause of cancer, but enough is known to be able to say with confidence that cancer is not caused by eating tomatoes nor by using aluminum cooking vessels nor by electric refrigeration nor by drinking milk. It is not affected by alcohol. A single blow on the breast will not cause cancer."

"Cancer can be cured in its early stages by x-rays, radium, or surgery, used individually or in combination. It cannot be cured by injections, by serums, by pills, by electric belts, by so-called radium-water. Beware of the quack who advertises, who promises a cure, or demands payment in advance."

Do your bit in this fight to control cancer. When a member of the Women's Field Army sees you, know that what you may give will be used to excellent advantage.

Now that the highway row has been settled, an excellent opportunity seems to be offered for us to really set our caps for the completion of the work on the highways in this section.

Our hat goes off to those policemen who safeguard the merchants' place of business at night. Few people in town know that the police check every merchant's doors at night to see if they are locked. The Man of the Week

EDITOR'S NOTE: In every community there are a few men and women who, when asked to do something, can be depended upon doing it and doing it well. And these are always the community's best people. Our "Man of the Week" is a man who has been a member of the Georgia Teachers' College, as our "Man of the Week."

Born July 27, 1904, in Wynote, a suburb of Philadelphia, Chester McArthur Destler, Chester in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he attended grammar and high schools. He received his A. B. degree from the College of Wooster, Wooster, Ohio, in 1925. In 1928 he received his M. A. and in 1932 his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.

In 1936 Dr. Destler married Katharine Hardesty, daughter of Dr. Irving Hardesty, of Tulane University Medical School, New Orleans, La.

After he finished College of Wooster in 1925, Dr. Destler taught history and coached athletics for three years at the Presbyterian College of the Ozarks, Clarksville, Arkansas. From 1929-30 he was a Henry Wolf Fellow in American History and in 1930-31 he worked with the Research Association on the History of Chicago, doing research on the period 1800-1847. The years 1931-34 he was an Assistant Professor of History and Sociology at Albion College (Methodist) at Albion, Michigan.

In 1934 Dr. Destler came to Statesboro as Professor of History and in 1935 was made Chairman of the Division of Social Sciences, and Director of the Junior Division of the College.

Despite his many duties at the College, Dr. Destler finds time to write. As an author he has written numerous book reviews, articles and edited documents. For the American Historical Review, Journal of Political Economy, Georgia Historical Quarterly, Journal of Southern History, Mississippi Valley Historical Review, Social Education and the Georgia Educational Journal he has eight articles in the 1940 Dictionary.

Dear Editor:

You did a good job of writing up Dan Bland. I'm glad to see that. I haven't seen Dan talk to him since he was written up. The man of the week but I bet he's proud of it. I'm glad that I thought of him for the first time he really is one of the best men we have in the county.

I saw something in a paper recently that I think you ought to read to you readers. It ought to be worth something to other farmers in the county. I tried it out and it works fine. It's a recipe for a whitewash to use about the farm. It was made up at the Georgia Experiment Station and came about because necessity is the mother of invention I heard it said.

There was a cow barn at the station that hadn't been painted for years. When it was built there was not enough money left to paint it, so they got together and began working on it in place of paint. When they finished they found that they sure enough did have a good whitewash.

For the benefit of Bulloch county farmers who don't have enough money to buy paint for their barns, here is what it takes to make this whitewash: Fifty gallons of water, 10 pounds of salt, two pounds of alum and one bar of soap.

First, chip the soap finely and dissolve it into about two gallons of hot water. This is then increased to 10 gallons with cold water and the lime, salt and alum are added one by one and the solution is stirred until all dissolve. It is then set aside for at least 24 hours before it is used.

Roast pork

Sweet potatoes with apples
Crisp stick
Jelly roll with whipped cream
Pork should be roasted, fat side up, with a cover; the fat being sufficient to baste the lean meat without the addition of water. Rub the roast with salt and pepper, sear for 15 minutes and allow to cook slowly for 30 minutes per pound. Baste occasionally with fat. An onion placed on the roast during cooking is a welcome addition. When making gravy, remove most of the fat from the pan. Add 1 cup of water and simmer for a few minutes.
Pork should always be thoroughly cooked, never serve it with any pink color showing. Long, very slow cooking is essential.

Cream of Tomato Soup

2 cups tomato juice
2 teaspoons chopped onion
1-4 teaspoon pepper
1-12 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter
1-12 teaspoon flour
1-2 cups canned milk
1-4 teaspoon soda
1-2 cup water
Cook tomato juice, pepper, onion and salt together 15 minutes. Melt butter, add flour and mix well. Add milk slowly and bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Add soda to tomato juice and stir until dissolved. Pour the tomato juice into white sauce and serve immediately with crisp crackers. Serves four.

Molded Carrot & Pineapple Salad
1 package of lime flavored gelatin
1 cup of boiling water
1-2 cup of cold water
1 small can grated pineapple
1 cup grated raw carrots
1 small bottle stuffed olives
Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water and chili. Add carrots, pineapple (not drained). Slice olives and add to mixture. Pour into individual molds and set in refrigerator until ready to serve. Turn out on lettuce leaves and serve with mayonnaise.

Sweet Potatoes with Apples
6 medium sized sweet potatoes
3 medium sized apples
1-2 cup of sugar
1-4 cup butter
1 cup of water
Wash and boil sweet potatoes, drain, peel and cut in half-inch slices. Pare and slice apples; place alternate layers of potatoes and apple in greased casserole, sprinkle each layer of apple with sugar, add each layer of potato with butter. Add water, cover and bake for 30 minutes in moderate oven.

Jelly Roll
3 eggs
1-12 cups of sugar
6 tablespoons of cold water
1-12 cups of flour
1-12 teaspoons baking powder
3-4 teaspoon salt
Jelly or jam
Separate eggs; beat yolks very thick and light. Add sugar gradually; add water beating well. Sift together dry ingredients; add alternately with stiffly beaten egg whites. Line shallow pan (9x16 inches) with waxed paper. Pour in batter; spread 1-8 inch thick. Bake in moderate oven about 15 minutes until lightly browned. Turn out immediately on damp cloth sprinkled with powdered sugar. Remove paper and trim crusts. Spread with jelly while warm and roll. Wrap in damp cloth until cool. Remove to plate and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Work quickly as cake will crack in rolling if it cools.

BIGGEST SCENE EVER SHOT IN FILM HISTORY!

The filming of the biggest scene ever photographed was made possible by construction of the largest motion picture camera crane. A giant boom with an extension of 85 feet in any direction, including a direct vertical one, was assigned to photograph 1,500 extras on the forty-acre Atlanta, Georgia, set in "Gone With the Wind," the technicolor production starring Clark Gable, Leslie Howard and Olivia de Havilland and presenting Vivien Leigh as Scarlett O'Hara. The picture opened yesterday on the Georgia screen.

So enormous was the crane's weight—140 tons—that a concrete runway two hundred feet long and twelve feet wide was built along the track where the crane moved. The largest camera crane previously in existence had a boom reach of only 33 feet, entirely inadequate for the scenes posed by Director Victor Fleming. It was desired to shoot a close-up of Miss Leigh as Scarlett O'Hara, and swing from that directly to a long shot of Union and Confederate wounded just brought to the Atlanta "railway" station from the battlefield, in July, 1864. Giant Camera Boom.

The giant camera boom was built with a contractor's rigging crane, mounted with its caterpillar tractor on two trailers, and supported by forty-six truck-sized wheels. The crane was designed to handle such heavy loads as structural steel members, tanks and electric signs, so it was rigid enough to support the big technicolor cameras without vibration.

A ten-ton truck supplied the motive power for moving the crane along the runway, and the boom itself was moved by a 100-horsepower motor mounted on the platform of the crane. Because of the noise of these powerful engines, a special arrangement was made for recording sound in the crane shots.
