

Georgia Southern ROTC wins third MacArthur Award

February 18, 2016

The U.S. Army Cadet Command at Fort Knox, Kentucky, announced Tuesday that Georgia Southern University's Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program was one of the eight winners of the prestigious MacArthur Award for the 2014-2015 school year.

Georgia Southern was selected as the top program from 6th Brigade Army ROTC, which includes 39 programs from six states and Puerto Rico. This marks the Eagle Battalion's third MacArthur Award since 2009.

Lt. Col. Erik Kjonnerod, professor of military science, praised the Battalion for its recent accolades.

"Congratulations to all of our cadets, cadre and staff on winning the coveted General Douglas MacArthur Award for 2015," he said. "Your commitment, dedication and determination is evident on a daily basis. I am proud to serve with all of you and thank you for consistently going above and beyond the call of duty! Strength and Honor!"

Cadet Command oversees eight Brigades comprised of 275 senior Army ROTC programs nationwide. The award recognizes the top program from each of the eight Brigades and is presented by Cadet Command and the Gen. Douglas MacArthur Foundation. Awards are based on overall performance, National Order of Merit List standings and cadet retention rate.

"This award is a well deserved honor and a testament to the dedication of those involved in the ROTC program. We are excited to watch these cadets continue to excel in their endeavors," said Interim University President Jean Bartels, Ph.D, R.N.

The Eagle Battalion was also recently recognized by the 6th Brigade for having the Top Nursing Program for 2015, Highest GPA for Mission Set 17, and exceeded the contract goal for STEM Cadets for Mission Set 17.

The Georgia Southern Eagle Battalion ROTC program will soon have a new home on campus with construction currently underway for the University's new Military Science building. The new 32,000-square-foot building, located on campus at the corner of Forest Drive and Old Register Road, will consist of a large auditorium, meeting rooms, classrooms, storage space and faculty and administrative offices. In April 2014, Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal approved the state budget, which included \$9.5 million in funding allocated to build the new building.

Georgia Southern University, a public Carnegie Doctoral/Research University founded in 1906, offers more than 125 degree programs serving nearly 20,500 students. Through eight colleges, the University offers bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs built on more than a century of academic achievement. Caplinger wins national FYE award

Chris Caplinger, Ph.D., director of First-Year Experience (FYE) and assistant professor of history at Georgia Southern, was one of ten educators in the nation selected for the 2016 Outstanding First-Year Advocate Award.

The National Resource Center for the First-Year Experience and Students in Transition at the University of South Carolina and Cengage Learning present the award each year to honor college faculty, administrators, staff and students for their outstanding work on behalf of first-year students, and for the impact their efforts have on the students and culture of their institutions.

"I value my involvement with the national FYE community, which is a very collegial group of faculty and academic and student affairs administrators," said Caplinger. "To be recognized by this group is humbling. But this really is a recognition for Georgia Southern more broadly."

Caplinger says the recognition is a reflection of the 230-plus individual faculty members involved in leading one or more of the program's three primary initiatives: First-Year Seminar, Global Citizens and Conversations with Professors.

"All of our major initiatives are the product of a faculty task force, which not only proposed the programs but then helped to sell the programs to their colleagues," he said. "The team also includes academic advisors across campus, more than 200 student peer educators and a small but hard-working full-time FYE staff."

"I really see my role as facilitating the good work of others."



Caplinger says he truly enjoys the work he does in FYE, not just because of the great team he works with, but also because of the impact they have on students' lives, no matter their needs when they arrive on campus.

"When I can help a student who might have been at risk for dropping out of college, I get a lot of satisfaction from that," he said. "I also really value challenging strong students to push themselves, to squeeze as much meaning out of their college experience that they can."

Caplinger is the second Georgia Southern faculty member to receive the award. Michael Moore, Ph.D., professor of curriculum, foundations and reading, received the award in 1997, and still teaches FYE courses almost every semester.

Dr. Chad Asplund recently joined the Health Services medical staff and serves as Medical Director for the University’s NCAA sports medicine program. He has provided care to athletes at all levels, including professional, Olympic, NCAA division I, II and III, high school and recreational. Dr. Asplund’s research interests are exercise-related sudden death and concussion. He has published and presented on these topics nationally as well as internationally.

Dr. Asplund, a national leader in the sports medicine community, was recently nominated as a candidate for First Vice President for the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine (AMSSM), an organization for which he currently serves on the Board of Directors as the Chair of the Practice and Policy Committee.

Recently, Dr. Asplund represented the AMSSM in front of the Health Subcommittee of the House Energy and Commerce Committee to speak in support of HR 921, the Sports Medicine Licensure Clarity Act, a bill he helped to author that would protect team physicians and athletic trainers when traveling with their teams across state lines.

Georgia Southern University celebrates Arbor Day

A breezy, cool morning didn't deter more than 100 Georgia Southern students from trekking across Veterans Parkway to the new South Campus to help plant more than 1,000 slash pine tree seedlings in celebration of Arbor Day.

Unlike National Arbor Day which is recognized in April, Arbor Day in Georgia is celebrated on the third Friday of February. Because of the more subtropical climate in the southeast, planting this time of year gives trees a better chance at survival.

The day not only provides an opportunity to celebrate trees and the benefits they provide to the environment, but closer to home, it also gives students the opportunity to appreciate their campus, according to assistant professor of biology, Subhrajit Saha, Ph.D.

"This event is not only celebration of trees or sustainability, Arbor Day connects the students to soil and nature. They are getting hands-on experience of planting trees and naming them," he said. "Fifteen to 20 years from now, when they come back as alumni with their family, they will see the how big the trees have become that they planted and named. It is like leaving a mark or a piece of them on campus that will remind and connect them better to the old college days and Georgia Southern University."

The South Campus property is located across Veterans Parkway near Lanier Drive. While the land is undeveloped, Saha said the trees will provide many benefits for the property as it is developed.

"As the trees grow, they will create a live barrier from the road so we will have less noise, it'll provide a wind break, we'll have soil erosion reduction, it'll create a nice view and it will create a great habitat for biodiversity — more birds, small mammals and more," he said. "Altogether this celebration is ecologically, environmentally and educationally an ideal thing to do."

Interim University President Jean Bartels, Ph.D., RN, joined the celebration and helped plant the first seedling of the day.

"If you have been on our campus at any point in time, you know the beauty of our campus," she said. "It is full of green spaces and it's a wonderful place to observe what happens when you take care of the environment in your area.

"Georgia Southern has a long tradition of its association with trees," she continued. "We have an official forestry place on campus that is a document to the fact that Georgia Southern is very dedicated to what happens with the environment. We plant trees every year, we've done this for many years, and it's a way to continue our legacy of building a beautiful, green campus and one that really celebrates trees."

In addition to celebrating trees and helping beautify campus, Saha said the event aids students by giving them hands-on application of what they are learning in the classroom.

"Some of these students are taking classes in biology of plants, sustainable forestry, environmental biology and others, so they learn about trees and see tree management in pictures, but this is the time they get connected to nature, and this is a practical application of what they're learning in class," he said, noting students also added mulch around the base of each seedling, expanding their hands-on experience even more.

Kennard Sutton was among many students who picked up a shovel to help. He's taken more than five classes with Saha, and has participated in the event since its inception in 2013.

"This event is important to me because we're helping out. We're helping out the environment itself, and helping it improve overall here in Statesboro," he said. "With us helping to plant new trees, it makes Statesboro look better overall and we also are helping out the future kids who come [to school] here so they might want to come and help out the environment too."

The annual tree planting is a combined effort from Saha's students, faculty and student volunteers within the College of Science and Mathematics and other colleges on campus, the Division of Facilities Services and the Center for Sustainability. In past years, volunteers have planted trees on the banks of Beautiful Eagle Creek and on campus near the Lady Eagles' Softball Fields.



Alumna Returns to Campus for Bestselling Book Reading

Georgia Southern University graduate and bestselling author Cassie Beasley will be on campus for a book reading Wednesday, March 2 at 7 p.m. in the IT Building, room 1005. The reading is free and open to the public, and books will be available for purchase after the reading.

Beasley will read from her first book, *Circus Mirandus*, which was published to critical acclaim in 2015. Her book is intended for middle-schoolers but is enjoyable for readers in high school, college, and beyond.

Circus Mirandus was named a New York Times Editor's Choice and a New York Times Book Review Notable Children's Book of 2015. The book also received positive reviews from Kirkus Books and School Library Journal.

Librarian Sarah Reid, writing for *School Library Journal*, calls *Circus Mirandus* a “gripping fantasy tale” and says that it “will have readers hooked from the opening scene to the breathtaking—and unexpected—conclusion.”


Circus Mirandus tells the story of fifth-grader Micah Tuttle, his beloved Grandpa Ephraim, his prickly Aunt Gertrudis, and his courageous new friend Jenny Mendoza. Over the years, Micah has heard all about the mysterious *Circus Mirandus* and the equally mysterious Man Who Bends Light, also known as the Lightbender. When Micah’s grandfather was very young, the Lightbender promised him a miracle. Now, many decades later, Grandpa Ephraim needs that miracle, and Micah desperately wants him to have it. So Micah and Jenny set out on a daring quest to find the *Circus Mirandus* and the Lightbender.

Beasley is a graduate of the Department of Writing and Linguistics and earned a M.F.A. in Writing for Children and Young Adults from the Vermont College of Fine Arts.

New Art Exhibit Explores Consumerism, D-I-Y, and Throwing Culture

Georgia Southern University's Betty Foy Sanders Department of Art presents Allison Tierney's *The Things We Keep*, from Feb. 23 to March 25 on-campus in the Contemporary Gallery of the Center for Art & Theatre. The exhibition includes an artist talk Feb. 23 at 5 p.m. in Visual Arts Building, room 2071 with a reception to follow at the Center for Art & Theatre. The events are free, and the public is welcome.

Tierney's paintings employ found materials and non-traditional applications of paint to question structure, material integrity, consumerism, D-I-Y, and the throwaway culture. The works speak to content of domesticity, waste, time, landscape, and femininity.

"Since the majority of my materials are found, they come with their own histories, forms, and physical qualities. I exploit this material baggage to see how far painting can be pushed," Tierney writes.

Tierney's honest use of materials and abstracted brushwork allow the objects used in her work to exist where they are—self-referential, notating their original purpose. The work explores the spatial capacities of painting beginning with the surface. Items embedded within the canvas or sitting flush to the surface become part of the narrative. The work also examines space through what is happening around the canvas or off the wall. This includes indirect effects of the work such as shadows and lighting, but also can involve an extension of the picture plane or free-standing sculptures.

As perspective shifts begin to occur, the viewer has an opportunity to interact with the work in a variety of ways and can interpret their connections with the materials, creating limitless personal narratives.

"Tierney's work is impressive in and of itself, but becomes even more so once you realize just how many of the art world's big issues she's addressing all at once. Among others, these include abstract painting's century-long exploration of geometry; the role of the art object and its co-extensive existence in and among the embodied space of the viewer; and even questions of how to embed an object's history and aura into the creation of an artwork," notes Gallery Director Jason Hoelscher. "These are big questions one at a time, so Tierney's attempt to tackle them simultaneously is pretty impressive. Add the fact that the work is exciting to look at, with or without pondering these big questions, and the result is a must-see exhibition."

Tierney's project is made possible by an Ella Fountain Pratt Emerging Artists Grant from the Durham Arts Council with support from the North Carolina Arts Council, a division of the Department of Cultural Resources.

Tierney is an artist living and working in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. She received her B.F.A. from Winthrop University and her M.F.A. from the University of North Carolina Chapel Hill where she won the Top Prize for Outstanding M.F.A. work.

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

Directed by Georgia Southern Alum Gage Crook, "Twelfth Night" follows lovesick Orsino as he sends his servant Cesario (who is actually the maiden Viola in disguise) to plead on his behalf for the heart of the indifferent Olivia. Meanwhile, an alliance of servants and hangers-on fight a battle of wits against the high-handedness of the pompous Malvolio.

Filled with a cast of unforgettable characters, "Twelfth Night" combines high comedy and the pangs of unrequited love with Shakespeare's poetry.
